More Clarification

(The Editor, "The Times") Dear Editor.- I write to respond to two matters raised in the letter entitled "clarification" attributed to Daryl Warren, and published in the April 15 edition of The "Buloke Times". At the outset, I have no wish to involve myself in the underlying politics of the issues raised by former Councillor Warren. My comments are confined solely to those comments which relate to the office of the Municipal Building Surveyor (MBS), and its relationship to Council.

First off, as Mr. Warren says, the office of MBS is a statutory office which is required to exist by, and perform duties in compliance with the Building Act 1993. Appointees to the office are not necessarily employees of Council; the holder of the office may also be appointed or nominated by Council, implying that they may be contractors, and that they may hold other appointments.

Secondly, whether a MBS is "independent". In 2021, the Victorian Building Authority introduced a mandatory Code of Conduct for Building Surveyors. Two of its Principles are relevant here. First, building surveyors must comply with all relevant laws and prioritise public safety in their professional activities. Secondly, they must act independently; they cannot submit to undue influence, from wherever it may emanate.

The Municipal Building Surveyor-Victoria Charter, to which Mr. Warren refers, notes the following: "The statutory duties and functions of a MBS are specified in the [Building] Act and the regulations, are unique, and in many instances distinct and separate to those of the council. In many cases, generally with regard to matters of compliance, safety and risk to life and property, a MBS may have a legal duty to act in a manner that should not be subject to the direction or impediment of the Council". It goes on: "The MBS may be subject to legal direction from the Victorian Building Authority or the Minister from time to time."

So, the MBS is in fact independent when it comes to the exercise of judgement and the performance of functions ascribed to the office by the Building Act and its associated regulations.

resources and staffing are allocated to the office of the MBS for the statutory roles and functions under the Act and the regulations to be properly carried out". In short, Council's function is not to direct or control the professional work of the MBS, but to facilitate the performance of their duties. Council does retain the right to remove an MBS for cause...for example, for failing to declare a conflict of interest. A MBS is classified as a registered building practitioner in Victoria and may be subject to disciplinary action by the VBA in the event of a breach of their statutory duties. That might also provide a ground for a Council to remove them for cause.

Example Case for an Australian Republic? (The Editor, "The Times")

Dear Editor.- Regarding mining the Donald mineral earths and the like. [a good investment for shareholders?]

Historical inherited rights, associated with the crown invests state and territory governments in Australia, ownership of all resources underground. AFTER licensing approval, there are no veto rights afforded the property owner. A singular recourse procedurally to this circumstance, is put a good best-case for compensation, FULL-STOP.

Chinese prices for rare earths exported is low, artificial and grossly undervalued, ie., very cheap. Effective Chinese government subsidies result in very poor economics of compensation worldwide for competing production of these more rare essential minerals required throughout our modern-life. Australia and the USA have much resource, uneconomic to recover, without subsidy. China's practice of loss leading to degrade competition is prevalent, e.g. world steel production, such Chinese state practices attract interest from the WTO, world trade organization.

So then to the case of the mining of Donald and environs becoming a sand pit, for rare earths. I had always conjectured that this region to be 'safer" due to the critically low availability of the quantities of water required for minerals processing, apparently this is not so.. [which water from where? Or who's water and how so? For forty years? I am uninformed as to water resource matters, balances or provisioning or discretion in times of rural/town development or drought.]

An end point of processing here is a current-low-value slurry/concentrate to be exported overseas, together with gold and other minerals involved for final processing in perhaps Idaho or Utah in the USA or China, based on entity ownership. A pricey costson enterprise?

It occurs that mining knowledge, needs to be added to the farmers' BURDEN of requisite expertise. Perhaps property owners, knowing about land access laws or their right to apply for their land to be exempt from any mining and or obtaining the relevant mining rights for affected property themselves etc., might wake to this new addition to due diligence prior to any purchase.

Infringement Notices Sent to Non-Voters

Infringement notices will be sent this week to Victorians who either didn't respond to the Victorian Electoral Commission's (VEC's) request for an explanation or didn't have a valid reason for failing to vote in the 2024 local council elections.

More than 530,000 Victorians were sent an "Apparent failure to vote notice" by the VEC in February and March. Of those, 15% have been excused for valid reasons.

People who did not respond to the "Apparent failure to vote notice", or who did not provide a valid and sufficient excuse, will be issued an infringement of \$99.

People who receive an infringement notice must respond within 35 days - by either paying the fine, requesting an internal review, or electing to go to court.

"Take It Seriously"

Electoral Commissioner Sven Bluemmel is urging people who receive an infringement notice to take it seriously.

"The most important thing is that you respond to the notice before the deadline - otherwise, you could be issued a penalty reminder notice, which carries the original penalty plus an additional administration fee," Mr Bluemmel said.

The VEC encourages nonvoters who are unsure what to do, or require assistance throughout any stage of the

infringements process, to call 1300 551 575 or visit vec.vic.gov.au/voting/finesand-reviews

Voting Compulsory

Voting in local council elections is compulsory for all enrolled voters in Victoria, and to make sure no one misses a future election, the VEC encourages Victorian voters to sign up for VoterAlert, our free SMS and email reminder service. The service alerted 2.5 million Victorians about key election dates in last year's local council elections. To sign up visit vec.vic.gov.au/voteralert

Sometimes an SMS alert is also sent prior to a "cold call scam" that seemingly looks like it is Bendigo Bank.

How to Protect Yourself

Take a minute and remain calm: consider what vou've learned about different kinds of scams, then ask yourself 'who's really there?".

The Bank will never ask you to transfer/pay money into another "safe" bank account.

Never provide your password or PIN to anyone, even if they are claiming to be from Bendigo Bank and have personal information about you.

Check that the message is real by contacting the person or organisation directly using

Install anti-virus software on your computer/device to help detect suspect websites being accessed by your computer or device.

Always access the official website or mobile app directly, never via a link.

Don't open or download any attachments or apps.

Don't click on links in text messages or emails; we will never send a link in on SMS.

Look out for changes in caller IDs. This could include unfamiliar numbers, special characters, or calls from different locations.

Let us know ASAP if you think you have been the victim of a scam.


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Historial Enquiries

[From the Donald Archives] Among March enquiries, Erin Grumand wanted information on her ancestors George and Eliza (Hewlings/Poole) Carret who were proprietors of the Mt Jeffcott Hotel from 1868 until George's death in 1873. We were able to oblige with plenty from "Now and Then, Volume One".

The March History meeting had Isabel Flett as the guest speaker. Isabel had fully researched the history of St Andrew's Church, which celebrated its centenary on March 16 and she presented it to the meeting to the great pleasure of all who attended. A full report on the centenary, complete with Isabel's history, was printed in "The Buloke Times" on March 28th, 2025. Isabel was interested in finding out the history of the original Presbyterian Manse, "The Willows" and we agreed to research it for her. It is almost complete and will be printed at a later date.

Memorabilia

Linton Reilly attended the March History meeting and rabilia of Robert Dunn, one of his three Dunn great uncles who were in World War One. Robert was wounded in the thigh and gassed just prior to the Armistice.

Linton had a hand written letter from the King, still in its envelope, thanking Robert for his faithful service and wishing him a return to health.

Robert's 1923 obituary states that his death came as a happy release for him. Robert's siblings were Charles, Corack; John, Lah; William, Trawalla; Percy and Archie, Donald; George and Les, Buloke; Mrs. Fraser, Watchem; Mrs. Williamson, Donald; and Mrs. A.R Boyd, Beaufort. On this page is a photo of Robert and his letter from the King.

Chris Sellick came into the archives. He had been told that the mud brick house he lives in, which is at Granite Flat, was built soon after the family selected the land. He wished to know the year of selection, and Ron Falla's books on the selectors of Corack East told him that it was 1882 not 1872 as Chris

brought in some War memo- had first thought. It's still an old house, though.

How the Australian 2024 Winter Crop Wrapped Up

In the latest episode of Bendigo Bank Agribusiness podcast, Unpacking Ag, agricultural analysts Sean Hickey and Joe Boyle discuss the results of the 2024 winter cropping season and check in on several regions hit by drought conditions last year, before looking ahead to what conditions farmers might be facing in the upcoming season.

Bendigo Bank Agribusiness Agricultural Analyst, Joe Boyle, formerly of Wilkur, said wheat production saw mixed results from around the states.

"From a national perspective, we had a strong season with the third largest wheat crop on record, assisted by big production increases in WA, NSW and Queensland," Mr Boyle said.

"Ouality overall was skewed towards the lower end, with an increased percentage of feed wheat and ASW, while the percentage of AH wheat was lower, so from a tonnage perspective, feed

than 50 per cent chance of having below median rainfall, however, the rainfall outlook is a bit more positive for northern New South Wales and Queensland and generally more favourable for Western Australia through May to July."

wheat was the major change, up from about 1.5 million tonnes nationally in 2023 to around 5.8 million tonnes in 2024," he said.

Extremely Dry

"The extremely dry conditions in South Australia have led to what is estimated to be the lowest production figure for the state since 2008 and Victoria has also seen the lowest level of wheat production since extremely adverse conditions in 2018, with both states down around 40 per cent year on year."

"Looking ahead, the threemonth outlooks for April to June and May to July, currently have large areas across the southern states at a greater

Forecast

"Unfortunately, South Australia and Victoria are forecast to have a well below 50 per cent chance of exceeding median rainfall in May at this stage, paired with a forecast for warmer than average weather, which is also likely to feed into drying conditions."

"Australian Crop Forecasters is projecting wheat, barley and canola production to be lower this year, reverting closer to the longer-term average levels." Mr Boyle concluded.



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Restrictions, Penalties, Still in Force for Parts of Victoria

Ahead of the Easter break, CFA is reminding Victorians that fire restrictions are still in place across many parts of the state, and burning activities should still be put on hold in these areas.

The Fire Danger Period (FDP) is a designated time in each Victorian municipality when fire restrictions apply due to increased fire risk. During this period, a written permit is required to burn off for farming practices, including grass, undergrowth, weeds or other vegetation.

While some municipalities have now exited the FDP, many areas remain under restrictions due to dry autumnal conditions and unpredictable fire behaviour.

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan said this was made evident on the weekend when CFA was called in to support the efforts of Forest Fire Management Victoria, after a planned burn jumped containment lines southwest of Daylesford, leading to a Watch and Act warning and potential impact on private properties.

"This was a clear reminder of how quickly conditions can change and communities



must not become complacent, despite temperatures starting to drop," Jason said.

"Conditions remain very dry in certain parts of the state, and the fire risk is certainly still present.

"We know that the Easter break can prompt clean-up efforts for property owners, but it's important that people check their local fire restrictions before lighting any fire in the open air and ensure weather conditions are suitable."

Penalties

Under the CFA Act, penalties for lighting an open-air fire during the Fire Danger Period can include fines up to \$23,710, 12 months' imprisonment, or both.

"The consequences for individuals can be severe, and the impact of an escaped fire on local communities and emergency services can be devastating," Jason added.

Since fire restrictions began easing in some municipalities on March 17, CFA has responded to 37 escaped burn-offs, requiring members to turnout 403 times and spend over 550 hours containing these incidents.

"These are preventable incidents that tie up our crews, damage property, and divert

resources away from other emergencies," Jason said.

"We need everyone to take personal responsibility and help us reduce the risk."

Controlled burns may be visible in parts of Victoria over the coming weeks as part of fuel reduction activities by CFA and Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic). To find out if there is a planned burn happening in your area, visit www.plannedburns. ffm.vic.gov.au. Residents are reminded that these are carefully managed and permitted operations. Seeing smoke or flames from a planned burn does not mean it is safe or acceptable to conduct your own private burnoff.

Apply for a permit to burn off at firepermits.vic.gov.au and check if the Buloke Shire municipality is still under the FDP at cfa.vic.gov.au/firedangerperiod.


