Does Energy Transition Trample Farmers' Rights?

The Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) has reacted with concern following recent comments from Victorian Energy Minister Lily D'Ambrosio, warning that the State Government's energy transition risks alienating the very communities it needs most.

While the VFF supports the shift to renewable energy, VFF President Brett Hosking said the transition is being derailed by poor planning, worrying rhetoric, and alarming legislative proposals including the VicGrid Bill Amendment, which would allow police-enforced access to farms and fines of up to \$12,100 for landholders who resist.

"Farmers are not opposed to renewable energy," he said.

"We know the world is changing and we're part of that change, but we won't cop being steamrolled in the process."

Deeply Troubling

"The VicGrid amendments are deeply troubling. Allowing police to enforce access and slapping hard working farmers with fines for simply wanting to protect their land is not how you build trust, it's indicative of how trust has been lost," Mr Hosking said.

Mr Hosking said the government's determination to press ahead with major transmission projects without genuine community consultation, including the Western Renewables Link (WRL) and VNI West, is undermining both public confidence and the project's viability.

Failed Projects

"The WRL and VNI West are both failed projects and they should be scrapped entirely. Both have been mismanaged from the start, and communities have made it clear they won't accept it being forced through their paddocks," he said.

"These projects are too important to get wrong and the Victorian Government is risking a smooth renewable energy transmission by attempting to ram these projects through. Acknowledging the mistakes and starting again is the only way to deliver a smooth transition.

"The VFF has directly expressed our concerns with Victorian Premier Jacinta Allan and written to all MPs, urging them to vote down the VicGrid Reform Bill," Mr Hosking said.

Alarm

The VFF is alarmed by the Minister's comments that "transmission lines will be built" regardless of community concerns. It's approaches such as this that foster opposition in our rural communities which only serves to delay meaningful emissions reduction.

"We've had enough of being treated like obstacles, instead of partners.

"Good policy isn't made in a Spring Street bubble or podcast studio, or by using threats of fines and jail or coercion,

rather it is done through genuine consultation with those that live and work on the land."

VFF's Call

The VFF is calling for the Victorian Government to:

- Withdraw or significantly amend the VicGrid Bill to remove coercive powers.
- Scrap the Western Renewables Link (WRL).
- Take VNI West back to the planning table and start fresh with genuine consultation.
- Commit to respectful, transparent consultation with landholders and local communities.
- Recognise and protect agriculture as a vital land use in energy planning.

"The transition to renewables can and should be a win

for everyone, but that means doing it right," said Mr Hosking.

"The government needs to drop the heavy hand and start partnering. Otherwise, they risk doing lasting damage to rural communities and undermining public confidence in the whole transition."

Birchip Art Club Thrives

Creative energy is flourishing in Birchip, thanks to the ongoing success of the Birchip Art Club, an inspiring initiative supported by the Buloke Shire Council through its VicHealth Strong People grant and the Birchip Neighbourhood House LDAT project.

This vibrant community program is helping young people explore their artistic talents, connect with others, and build confidence in a welcoming and inclusive space.

Held at the Birchip Neighbourhood House every Monday evening during school terms, the Art Club has become a fun weekly activity for local children and teens.

With a strong focus on participation and enjoyment, the sessions are facilitated by local artist Kristie Dean, whose experience and enthusiasm bring a professional edge to the creative process.

In recent weeks the children have enjoyed using clay, and their creations have been fired by Kristie in the kiln she uses in her own pottery business, Mudlark & Co. Ceramics. This process adds an exciting element of transformation where children see their fragile clay creations turned into solid, long-lasting artworks.

The Art Club, though, is more than a weekly craft session. Thanks to VicHealth's Strong People grant and Kristie's altruism, Birchip Art Club is turning ceramics, painting and craft, into tools of wellbeing and empowerment.

Young people living in rural communities don't have many opportunities to participate in creative activities and Art Club is providing them with an avenue for self-expression, stress relief, and connection, without pressure or cost barriers.

Transmission Meetings Disappoint Council

Buloke Shire Council elected representatives and officers recently participated in an online meeting with Transmission Company Victoria (TCV).

The request to meet was initiated from TCV and was communicated to Council via email, indicating a public announcement was to be made, regarding the VNI West transmission project.

Council accepted the invitation in good faith, based on TCV's indication that an important update on the project would be shared. However, during the meeting, Council was advised that no announcement

would, in fact, be made. Instead, the meeting was reframed by TCV as an opportunity to strengthen its relationship with Council and improve consultation processes.

Council expressed its disappointment at the lack of transparency and the absence of any substantive information or a detailed agenda for the meeting, particularly given the expectations that had been set. The meeting was concluded shortly thereafter.

Protest

At the time of the meeting, a large crowd of community

members had gathered outside Council's Wycheproof office in protest against the VNI West project and proposed renewable energy developments.

Following the meeting, Mayor Alan Getley and Deputy Mayor Graeme Milne addressed the community, conveying their own frustration and disappointment at the

outcome, and reaffirming Council's commitment to advocating for the interests of the Buloke community.

Minister's Visit

At its July meeting Buleoke Shire Council endorsed the updated Draft Birchip Recreation Reserve Master Plan for public exhibition and invites the community to share their insights and ideas.

This draft plan builds on the legacy of the 2010-2019 Master Plan as a forward-thinking blueprint of shared community vision for enhancing a living, breathing space that will continue to unite generations through sport, celebration and connection.

Birchip boasts some of the highest participation rates in sport across regional Victoria including one of the State's strongest junior AFL and netball communities.

Birchip's Under-14 Girls AFL team was successfully launched in 2022, reflecting the town's commitment to nurturing local talent and gender-inclusive sport.

Prepared in close collaboration with the Birchip Community Leisure Centre Committee of Management, Council staff, local clubs, community members, State Government agencies and peak sporting bodies, the draft plan identifies both current

needs and future opportunities, from upgraded sporting infrastructure to inclusive spaces for broader community use.

The draft plan also aligns with the Council Plan 2026-2029, the Buleoke Inclusiveness Plan and guidelines of leading State Sporting Associations such as AFL Victoria, Netball Victoria and Hockey Victoria.

"The Birchip Recreation Reserve is more than just a sporting venue – it's the beating heart of Birchip," said Mayor Cr Alan Getley.

"From AFL to netball, cricket to hockey and tennis, this Reserve serves as a vibrant space for all ages to connect, compete and thrive."

also serves as the Minister for Climate Action and the Minister for the State Electricity Commission.

The visit presented an hour-long opportunity for discussion and questions, which included members of the community. However, the timing of the visit on Wednesday, June 11, occurred just prior to the release of a proposed

amendment by the Minister to the National Electricity (Victoria) Amendment (VicGrid Stage 2 Reform) Bill 2025 on Thursday, June 19.

Council has found the lack of information regarding this proposed amendment extremely disappointing, despite the significant impacts on our region being made clear to the Minister in person and her mutual agreement to a process that has thus far lacked effective communication, engagement and transparency.

The proposed amendment, adjourned for debate in parliament until July 3, 2025, seeks to consolidate energy infrastructure planning and streamline renewable energy development under a single statutory authority, VicGrid.

The bill grants VicGrid new powers to manage grid access, plan Renewable Energy Zones (REZs) and deliver major transmission projects, shifting authority from the Australian Energy Market Operator (AEMO).

Significant Shift

The legislation empowers VicGrid to implement the 2025 Victorian Transmission Plan and marks a significant shift from the current requirement for voluntary land access agreements, which will have major implications for rural and farming communities like those within the Buleoke Shire.

Council was not informed of this amendment during the Minister's visit, despite its relevance and impact on affected landowners, some of which were present and engaged in the discussion held.

Council remains firm in its position that early, transparent, and respectful communication must be a priority from both project proponents and government agencies.

Council will continue to advocate strongly for the rights of its residents, particularly landowners and primary producers, as developments in the VNI West project and broader energy reforms progress.

Victorian Women's Virtual Health Clinic Now Open

The Victorian Government's women's virtual health clinic is now open to all Victorian women and girls of any age – offering free, expert medical advice, treatment and care for a range of women's health needs.

Led by specialist nurses, the clinic can provide medical advice remotely via tele-health, either online or on the phone – including endometriosis and pelvic pain care, menstrual health, cervical screening, menopause care, breast health care and abortion.

Women in regional and remote Victoria will benefit the most – with services like contraception and abortion traditionally harder to access due to distance from major towns.

Operated in partnership with community health organisation EACH, it will reduce the barriers and delays in accessing care, helping to avoid detrimental impacts on a woman's health, their quality of life and the ability to participate in school and employment.

Assessment

The team of nurses will deliver an initial health assessment and some treatment, while patients can also be connected with a GP or get referred to a relevant health practitioner as close to home as possible.

In addition to treating immediate health needs, referrals can also be made to various mental health and wellbeing, alcohol and other drugs, and family violence community support services.

It comes as the Government's mobile women's health clinic continues to travel across the state delivering care to women in regional and remote communities.

Operated by BreastScreen Victoria, the van is making free healthcare more accessible for all women and girls, with a focus on improving access to care for Aboriginal women.

Range on Needs

It supports a range of women's health needs, including sexual and reproductive health advice, clinical services and referrals for medical abortion, contraception, and referrals to other necessary specialists.

All services are delivered by an experienced nurse or nurse practitioner who works to build connections with women, their community and local health services.

Both the mobile and virtual clinics are part of the landmark \$153 million women's health package transforming the way women's healthcare is delivered in Victoria.

The virtual women's clinic is available Monday to Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., by calling 1300 003 224 or via a simple, secure online form on the EACH website: each.com.au/services/virtual-womens-health-clinic.

It's Free

"We're making it easier for all women and girls to get the specific care and advice they need no matter where they live – and we have made it free," said Minister for Health Mary-Anne Thomas.

"There is no denying the gender health gap is real and it disproportionately affects women living in regional or remote areas of Victoria – our new virtual women's clinic is helping to breakdown this and other barriers to care."

45th Mallee Machinery Field Days

Just weeks out from the Mallee's largest agricultural event, Mallee Machinery Field Days secretary, Matt Brady, said the field days has experienced exceptional growth over the past three years, fuelled by the passion of the Speed Lions Club which organise the event, and the enthusiasm of exhibitors across the country, united in their support for the region's farming communities.

Call for Rethink on Bank Withdrawal

As Bendigo Bank prepares to close the Wycheeproof agency among 28 other locations across regional Australia, on October 21, 2025, Bulette Shire Council is urging the bank to reconsider the withdrawal and instead lead with innovation.

"This doesn't need to be the end – it could be the start of something smarter," said Mayor Cr Alan Getley.

"The Bendigo Bank may see the agency model as outdated, but the relationship certainly is not."

The Mayor cited that the Bendigo Bank has a proud history of community reinvestment and grassroots connection, making it uniquely

placed to be the pioneers once again – one that uses technology to support human connection, not replace it.

While the bank cited reduced service use as a reason for closure, this does not eliminate the ongoing need for face-to-face assistance from trained navigators and provision of secure digital banking services.

The closure leaves Wycheeproof with limited options: Bank@Post services at the Post Office during business hours, and a 24/7 Westpac-branded ATM for cash withdrawals.

"Let's at least have a conversation to see how we can modernise the process such as multi-tiered partnering without erasing the connection," the Mayor added.

Rural Aid Marks Major Recovery Milestone: 200 Farms and Counting

Rural Aid has proudly reached a major milestone this month, with its 200th farm receiving vital support as part of the charity's Farm Recovery Event currently under way in Coraki, in the New South Wales Northern Rivers. The event, running through to August 2, marks a significant achievement in Rural Aid's ongoing commitment to Australia's farming communities.

Since its inception in 2018, the Farm Recovery Events program has provided hands-on assistance to farmers facing hardship, delivering practical help and hope to over 200 farms nationwide. Alongside individual farm support, Rural Aid has now completed 293 community and recovery projects, with the Coraki event marking the latest chapter in this impactful national initiative.

The work has spanned 45 towns and regions, from drought-affected Queensland properties to bushfire-ravaged areas in Victoria. Communities across Queensland (16), New South Wales (19), Victoria (9) and South Australia (2) have welcomed Rural Aid volunteers, who have con-

tributed more than 56,000 hours of skilled labour over the past seven years.

This year alone, volunteers have collectively travelled more than 86,000 kilometres to take part in the charity's FREs.

Commitment

Rural Aid CEO John Warlters said the milestone is a reflection of the charity's commitment to long-term recovery and rural wellbeing.

"Our Farm Recovery Events are about more than fixing fences or building cattle yards," Mr Warlters said. "They restore hope. Every kilometre travelled, every hour volunteered, is a reminder to our farmers that they are not alone."

"Reaching our 200th farm is a significant achievement. It speaks to the strength of the rural spirit and the generosity of everyday Australians who put up their hands to help."

Benefits

The benefits of the program are both practical and personal. Volunteers help with essential property repairs, but the presence of helping hands and listening ears can have

lasting mental health benefits for farmers recovering from drought, floods or fire.

The wider community also benefits, with Rural Aid completing more than 100 projects in public spaces like halls, showgrounds, schools and sporting clubs.

Many businesses have already joined forces with Rural Aid to get their teams involved in on-the-ground recovery, gaining insight into rural life and creating real social impact.





Boost To Mental Health Workforce

The Victorian Government is continuing to expand the state's mental health workforce to meet growing demand and deliver on the Royal Commission's vision of a system where every Victorian has access to the care they need.

On Monday, Minister for Mental Health Ingrid Stitt visited the Whittlesea Mental Health and Wellbeing Local to announce the second round of roles through the Graduate and Early Career Program — supporting a strong pipeline of new workers to deliver the care Victorians need, close to home.

These workers will be placed in Mental Health and Wellbeing Locals across Victoria — helping more Victorians get free mental health support close to home without needing a GP referral or Medicare card.

Established by the Labor Government and acting as a “front door” to the mental health system, the local's offer free support and treatment for Victorians experiencing mental illness or psychological distress, including co-occurring substance use or addiction.

Support
Support is delivered in-person, via telehealth and via outreach services with a care plan designed to reflect a person's goals and preferences — family, carers and supporters can also be involved.

This new intake will establish 66 mental health roles across the community for graduates including:

- Positions in allied health, psychology, and postgraduate nursing.
- Lived and living experience positions.
- Wellbeing support roles.
- As well as clinical educators and supervisors to support and guide graduates.

It follows the first intake which commenced in February and saw 27 roles established at Locals in Greater Geelong and Queenscliff, Bendigo and Echuca, Whittlesea, Frankston and Latrobe.

Major Milestone


Together, the first two intakes of the program mark a major milestone — with every Mental Health and Wellbeing Local across Victoria now allocated early career roles, supported by dedicated supervisors and educators to strengthen care and support across the state.

The program is a key part of the Labor Government's work to implement the recommendations of the Royal Commission into Victoria's Mental Health System, which placed the workforce at the centre of system reform.

The Government has invested more than \$6 billion in the mental health system since the Royal Commission report was handed down and increased the mental health workforce by 25 per cent between 2021 and 2024.



We look forward to the next 100 days of wonder, learning, and fun!


Athletics Practice: Term Three is the time for the Inter-school Athletic Sports! Through a Sporting Schools grant St. Joseph's has secured

"The award is more than recognition; it is a moment of healing, pride and hope. This

achievement shines as a powerful reminder that resilience, beauty and renewal can flourish in even the hardest of times.

"We are beyond proud of our town and our people."

Other Finalists

Cr Hyslop thanked the VTIC and congratulated the other award finalists, including neighbours Dunkeld and Natimuk.

"The energy, innovation and passion in small towns across regional Victoria is truly inspiring," she said.

"To our community, tourism operators, volunteers, event organisers, artists, local businesses – thank you. You are the beating heart of Halls Gap."

Trentham took out the Top Tiny Tourism Town category, for towns with a population of 5000 or fewer. Warrnambool was named Victorian Top

Tourism Town, population 5000-plus, while Mount Beauty won the Top Small Tourism Town Award, population 1500 to 5000.

Acting VTIC chief executive Chris Porter said this year's awards showcased the strength and diversity of offerings in regional destinations across Victoria.

"A theme we have seen this year is that many of the winners are located further out of Melbourne, with destinations showcasing why visitors should travel to enjoy the delights that the winning Top Tourism Towns have to offer," he said.

"The winners are a reflection of the quality visitor experiences that can be found in all parts of the state, with visitors more likely to stay for at least one night, rather than just the day, due to their fantastic offering."




