New Head for EWHS Board

At the July meeting of the East Wimmera Health Service Board, Kylie Thitchener was elected new chairperson.

Kylie takes the place of outgoing chairperson, Julianne Clift, whose final report was as follows:

"I have served on the EWHS Board of Directors for seven years and had the privilege of being chair for the past five years.

"Kylie Thitchener will be stepping into the role of Board Chair and will continue to lead a committed team of Directors.

"At our July meeting, the Board continued to explore options for the old nurses' home in Wycheeproof.

"We also endorsed the budget for the current financial year, aiming for a break-even result."

"EWHS has received correspondence from the Minister for Health regarding our obligations under the new Grampians Health Service Network. This initiative is designed to strengthen regional partnerships and improve patient care pathways, including providing as much care as possible closer to home, where it can be done safely.

"Following our meeting, the Board had the opportunity to meet with the new Secretary of the Department of Health. Discussions included future funding, our work in primary health care services, and the challenges posed by our ageing infrastructure."

Buloke Shares Flood Protection Funding

Communities across Victoria will be better protected from future flood impacts thanks to the Allan Labor Government's \$5.8 million Regional Flood Risk Reduction Grants Program.

Local Members for Bendigo East Jacinta Allan, Bendigo West Maree Edwards and Northern Victoria Jaclyn Symes, this week announced initiatives that will focus on increasing flood protection and mitigation for local communities. This includes the installation of moveable flood barriers, connecting gaps in existing levee systems, improving flood risk mapping

and updating flood studies to reflect current conditions.

These projects aim to address the ongoing impacts of climate change while strengthening existing infrastructure and expanding community knowledge about future disaster risk.

Range of Areas

The funding will be shared by a range of different Local

Government areas and projects including:

- Buloke Shire – LiDAR and Flood Modelling Initiative.
- Campaspe Shire – Flood review & Mitigation project – Phase 2.
- Gannawarra Shire – Kerang Township Protection Levee – Murphy Street Rehabilitation Design.
- Swan Hill Rural City – Pental Island Levee Renewal Project: Supporting community to manage their flood risks.
- City of Greater Bendigo – Updated Climate Change Flood Mapping in the North Central Region.
- Hepburn Shire – Updated Climate Change Flood Mapping in the North Central Region.
- Loddon Shire – Updated Climate Change Flood Mapping in the North Central Region.

Some of its Worst

Victoria experienced some of its worst flooding on record in October 2022, and these grants to further the Labor Government's work to support communities across the state to be better prepared for flood events – and importantly led locally for their unique needs.

One of the key projects will improve flood resilience in Rochester and Echuca by investing in flood mitigation infrastructure, including moveable barriers and flood gates.

This will protect homes, infrastructure and essential services like the Rochester Early Learning Centre – reducing reliance on labour-intensive sandbagging, supporting businesses and maintaining access to medical and emergency services in the event of a flood.

The program is funded by the State Government, through the Victorian Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action and is administered by Emergency Management Victoria.

To Guide Grower Decisions at BCG Main Field Day . . . Latest Variety Trial Data

Visitors to BCG's Main Field Day on Wednesday, September 10, at Birchip, will have the opportunity to hear the latest on wheat and barley varieties being put to the test in the Grains Research and Development Corporation (GRDC) National Variety Trials (NVT) program.

BCG research agronomists Anna Marcus and Ashlee Tierney will present an overview of how key varieties are performing under this season's dry start, and what growers should be watching for as spring unfolds.

"There's always an interest in what came out on top last season, and this year, we're also taking a close look at how early establishment has played out given the challenging conditions in May and June," Anna said.

A Career in Fishing

From Rob, "The Times" has obtained the following observations on his time in fishing administration:

"I joined VRFish as a regional fisher and delegate from Mid Northern Association of Angling Clubs in 1998. I became a Board member in March 2000 and am currently honoured to be the chairman of VRFish."

"I originally joined VRFish to provide an important voice from regional Victoria from the Wimmera-Mallee area and promote the ever-increasing recreational fishing aspirations of regional fishers. Personally, at that time I had no aspirations to become the

chair of VRFish as my goal was to improve recreational fishing and access in Victoria and along the Murray River.

"Some of the best achievements from issues raised have included:

"Led the buy-out of freshwater commercial fishers and having these twenty-eight water storages, lakes and wetlands returned to recreational fishing. Proposed a native fish restocking program with golden perch and yearling Murray Cod. VRFish achieved positive outcomes in 2001-2002 working in conjunction with Fisheries Victoria staff."

"In line with VRFish policy, led the support of banning Opera House nets for fishing for yabbies, introducing yabby catch limits and having female yabbies with berries returned to the water."

"Assisted strongly in having setlines banned. This entailed a comprehensive effort to have setlines banned in the Murray River due to raising and receiving magnificent support from a Murray Cod Forum in Canberra. Also heavily involved with implementing Murray Cod slot limits, catch limits and having Rocklands Reservoir stocked with Murray Cod."

"Achieved strong fully documented support for twelve recreational lakes to receive high recreational water security from the enormous water saving generated by piping the open Wimmera-Mallee open channel system. Also support for returning defined allocations of environmental water back to the Glenelg and Wimmera Rivers."

"I was ecstatic to see a proposal I raised to see a statewide approach in repairing fish habitat using large trees, branches and root balls during road constructions implemented by VicRoads as offsets for Woody fish habitat. I should note individuals often refer to me as "Woody" due to my insistence of renaming "Woody Debris" to Woody Habitat and give it a real fish habitat value."

Attendees can expect updates on top-performing varieties including Shotgun, Tomahawk, Brumby and Rockstar, as well as barley standouts Compass, Neo and Combat. With no significant disease pressure so far this season, the focus will be on growth, yield potential, and agronomic performance.

Early Look

Ashlee said growers will also get an early look at new, unnamed varieties in the pipeline.

"This year we've included two new barley lines," she said.

"One is an IMI-tolerant variety from Intergrain suited to low rainfall environments, and the other is a herbicide tolerant line for low rainfall conditions from AGT."

The NVT program, delivered in partnership with GRDC, provides an independent national platform to evaluate varietal performance across different regions and environments, in non-nitrogen limited conditions.

"The NVT program aims to assist Australian grain growers and advisors in varietal decision making by providing information on commercially available grain varieties, including comparisons of yield performance, disease resistance and grain quality," Anna said.

"It's important for growers to remember that we ensure these trials are not nitrogen limited, so they are indicative of a variety's best genetic potential."

The Probus members were most impressed by the breadth and extent of their new campus manager's experience and look forward to a long association with him in the Wycheproof Hospital.


Christmas in July





It's hoped this adventure has sparked a lasting interest in the alpine environment – one the students may choose to explore further in the future.





Wind Farms Mythbusting

Myth: Wind farms are not compatible with agriculture

Reality: Once constructed, a wind farm typically takes up less than 2% of the project site, and is highly compatible with agricultural operations. Livestock grazing and cropping can continue right up to the edge of all turbines, hardstands and access tracks. When the wind farm is decommissioned, the land is returned to its previous condition

Myth: Renewable energy is increasing the cost of electricity

Reality: In 2024, electricity made from fossil fuels was typically around twice the cost of renewables. The Climate Council has found that power prices are high and rising in Australia because of the ongoing reliance on expensive fossil fuels and continued operation of ageing coal-fired power stations, as well as the need for more renewables and more storage (like batteries) for renewables

Myth: Landholders pay for the costs of decommissioning

Reality: The costs of decommissioning are 100% the wind farm owner's responsibility. This is a requirement of all planning permits for wind farm development. We include conditions in our commercial lease agreements with landholders, so it's clear from the beginning of the project that the wind farm will have the funds to decommission the project. Additionally, the wind farm must pay lease fees to host landholders until all infrastructure is removed.

Myth: Wind farms cause health issues

Reality: Reviews conducted by leading health and research organisations from all over the world, including the Australian Medical Association and Australia's National Health and Medical Research Council, have found no direct link between wind farms and health effects. This is true for both noise impacts and electromagnetic fields.

Myth: Electromagnetic interference (EMI) from turbines affect nearby dwellings and mobile users

Reality: Modern blades are typically made of synthetic materials which have a minimal impact on the transmission of electromagnetic radiation. The strength of the electromagnetic fields around common turbine electrical infrastructure elements (like generators, transformers and electrical conductors) is very low and become indistinct from background within 2 metres of the base.



Myth: Wind farm buffer zones stop neighbours from building new homes

Reality: The setback distances from turbines (sometimes referred to as 'buffer zones') exist to avoid amenity impacts on neighbour e.g. turbine noise. A new dwelling within the setback distance can achieve planning approval where an agreement has been reached between the landowner, wind farm operator and Council to address reduced amenity.

Myth: Host landholders are liable if a turbine catches fire

Reality: Wind farms have their own public liability insurance which will cover damage caused by the wind farm should that occur.



Myth: Renewable energy projects won't benefit regional communities

Reality: A joint study by the Clean Energy Council and Farmers for Climate Action expects large-scale renewable energy projects to contribute around \$1.9 billion to regional communities and councils by 2050. Beyond host landholder payments, WestWind provides funding for neighbour benefits, community benefits and Council rates. Community benefits funding alone for Wilkur Energy Park could total \$5.8 million for the community around Wilkur and Birchip over the project's lifespan.

Myth: WestWind Energy receives government subsidies

Reality: As a developer, WestWind Energy does not receive any Government subsidies. However, renewable energy projects under construction may attract Government support to build and mature the renewable energy sector. The amount of support provided will vary by project. At the same time, the fossil fuel industry also continues to receive billions in subsidies.



Nullawil's Living Heritage Day -

A Living History Day to celebrate the 100th anniversary the historic Auchmore Home, will be held at the Nullawil Heritage Centre on Sunday, August 17.

Nullawil Historical Society members are looking forward to welcoming visitors to the day with an opportunity to "step back in time". President Wendy Spry puts out the invitation to everyone to "Come and share the hospitality of a community that continues to care for the site as those who went before us did".

Auchmore was built in 1925 by William Henry Bennett ("Stumpy") to live in with his new wife, Eliza Marguerita Winfield (Rita). (Full history in previous article)

During 1993, the Watts family offered the Nullawil Historical Society use of Auchmore as an Historical Museum.

Since then, Historical Society members have set about adorning the house with antique furniture and decor used by early pioneers and characteristic of the era.

In the 32 years of caretaking, dedicated Historical Society volunteers have worked to maintain the integrity of the house with minimal disturbance to the original character of the home.

Heritage Centre

While Auchmore is considered the centrepiece, the Nullawil Heritage Centre has continued to expand and there

are now 23 buildings at the site.

Over the years there have been significant "Living History" days where visitors have had the opportunity to step back in time and get a glimpse into the pioneering past of the Nullawil and district. Historical members and school children have dressed in period costumes with an ever-expanding array of displays and working demonstrations depicting a century of Mallee life. The upcoming centenary celebration gives yet another opportunity for the public to visit.

Living History Day

The Heritage Centre gates will open at 10.30 a.m.. With their customary hospitality, Historical members will welcome visitors in the catering area.

The coppers will be "fired up" and morning tea will be available with tea and coffee accompanied by scones with jam and cream. An overview will be given into the origins and establishment of the Nullawil Historical Society.

Following morning tea, guests will be invited to wander over to the former Winston Church to enjoy a performance on the restored Estey Reed organ. There will be some musical items and even the opportunity for a

sing-a-long at the church.

A program of events will be prominently displayed on the day, allowing attendees to select activities of personal interest. Volunteers will be available in the machinery sheds for those who prefer viewing machinery displays before lunch.

There will also be time for visitors to explore the Grange Stable, Drop Log Cabin, old Post Office and Blacksmith Shop. Drop into the Mathske Collection Barn, Gallery Barn and "Holey" Barn displaying items from St Joseph's Catholic Church.

Lunch is scheduled between 12.30 and 1:00 p.m.; giving visitors time to catch up with old friends, and reminisce about days gone by.

Inspection

The Auchmore homestead will open for inspection after lunch.

Visitors will have the opportunity to wander through the beautiful 100-year-old homestead and appreciate its historical ambiance. Each room offers inviting displays, with a new exhibit in the children's and mothers' room with sewing machines, cots, dolls, and other items of interest.

The house gives a glimpse into a "simpler" existence,

without the modern conveniences enjoyed in the present era. The "pioneering spirit" of our early settlers is on display, with a resourceful and resilient approach to the everyday challenges they faced. Their ability to find creative solutions is evident, with a "make do attitude", when money was tight and resources scarce. You will see a "high chair" made with a plough seat; cake tins and drawers made out of kerosene tins, a homemade preserving outfit and other homemade furniture and fittings. The wash house and outhouse are separate from the home, the bathroom is on the verandah with chip heaters for hot water.

Garden

The Remembrance Garden out the front features Nullawil's War Memorial, the World War 1 Centenary Soldier, Gallipoli Roses and the Lone Pine.

The recently painted mural and framed WWI flags will be displayed in the Remembrance Room.

The Towninie School is also open for exploration, showcasing original desks, books, and school cases that evoke strong memories of the past.

Machinery displays, including demonstrations of grain gristing, a hand-operated baler, and chaff cutter, will take place at intervals throughout the afternoon, and the Bulldog tractor will also be operational.

Afternoon tea will be served for those wishing for a hot beverage and a light snack before their departure.

The aim of the day is to create a relaxed atmosphere in which guests can fully enjoy the unique ambience of the Nullawil Heritage Centre.

The Mt of Prevention Respect Round stands against domestic violence against women, children, and families, with a zero tolerance stance. Each year the Charter serves to remind local people to be accountable in keeping safe their own person, individuals, friends and family, and whole communities, and to know that help is always available for anyone experiencing violence at home.

Domestic abuse extends beyond physical assault and includes emotional abuse, sexual abuse, financial abuse, elder abuse, and coercive control.



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


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Sting in the Tail from Redbacks

Wedderburn might have misjudged its run to North-Central finals action, but the Redbacks can exert a significant influence on the finishing order of the top four, with third-placed Sea Lake-Nandaly firmly in their sights tomorrow.

The Tigers must win if they are to have any chance of overtaking second placed Calder United to secure a "double chance" in the forthcoming finals. A loss tomorrow will restrict Sea Lake-Nandaly to a first semi-final showdown against Boort.


