This year, the Craft Section has undergone a thoughtful revamp, with updates made in response to community suggestions and feedback. Whether you're an avid knitter, an enthusiastic recycler, or a talented patchworker, there's a category for every crafty soul.

The changes aim to better reflect the diverse skills and creativity of local artisans, and organisers hope the revised section will align perfectly with the projects already under way in lounges and craft rooms across the region.

Wide Range

The Craft Section now includes a wide range of categories, from traditional knitted and crocheted garments to innovative entries made from recycled materials and diamond art. Quilters, painters, woodworkers and even cross-stitchers will all have their time to shine, with categories recognising both hand-crafted and machine-assisted work.

Article of Patchwork; 7. Quilt, any sizehandmade or machine made; 8. Christmas Article or Decoration; 9. Article Suitable for Gift; 10. Article made from Recycled Goods; 11. Soft Toy, any medium; 12. Utility Bag; 13. Article of Diamond Art; 14. Painting, under A4 size; 15. Piece of Canvas Art; I 16. Item of Woodwork, exhibitor to supply display unit; 17. Article of Handmade Clothing; and Tapestry/Cross-stitch.

Musical Interlude Delights at the Rex

The life and times of Edwardian composer Liza Lehmann was brought to life through narrative and song in the presentation of "In A Persian Garden" by the Dunolly Gilbert and Sullivan Society at The Rex Theatre last Saturday afternoon.

A quartet of accomplished vocalists, along with pianist Geoff Urquhart and narrator Rachel Buckley related the evolution of the composer's life and her journey as a singer before her transition into the creation of songs and song cycles.

As a "maker of songs" Liza's privileged upbringing and connection with the musical elite through her parents and extended family made for fertile ground upon which to build her career. Through quotes and anecdotes Rachel Buckley wove the narrative. which during the first half of the program, showcased a number of the composer's whimsical and heartfelt songs.

Singers Helen Hill, Amelia Le Plastrier, Ian Woolford and Brett O'Meara presented individual numbers

ranging from the quirky ("If No One Ever Marries Me") to the rousing ("Constables of Hammersmith"), the nonsensical ("Lobster Quadrille" for four voices), the touching ("When 'er a Snowflake Leaves the Sky") and finishing with Rachel Buckley's rendition of "There are Faries at the Bottom of the Garden".

This introductory segment not only revealed the caliber

of the performer's talents, but also set the scene for the song cycle of "In A Persian Garden" which comprised the second half of the performance.

Featuring words selected from the Rubaiyat of Omar Khayyam – a medieval Persian poem which gained great popularity following its translation and publication in 1859 - Liza Lehmann's handling of the text and using four voices instead of just one to portray elements of the poem was an unusual approach. The program notes explain the breakdown of singers as follows: "the tenor represents a young lover, the bass, a philosopher, the contralto, something of the harbinger of doom, the soprano, again a lover, but with a tendency towards spiritual exploration."

While only a short piece (just 40 minutes), the work is vocally demanding as pianist Geoff Urguhart explained after the show. The opportunity for the audience to meet and talk with the cast following the performance was also bonus for both, and something which was very much appreciated by the singers who spent time conversing and receiving praise as the crowd dispersed.

The Rex would like to acknowledge the enthusiasm which Rachel Buckley has shown for the venue and which, through her many musical networks, has created opportunities for bringing quality musical content to the region.

From the audience response last Saturday there is a strong appetite for more of the same!

Plan to Cut NDIS **Travel Allowances**

The proposed changes to travel allowances for allied health providers under the NDIS Pricing Arrangements and Price Limits 2025-'26 raise serious concerns for rural, regional and remote communities, severely impacting the delivery of essential support services.

the proposed Under changes, providers will face limits on the travel they can claim when supporting participants in harder-to-reach areas. This poses a major threat to clinicians working in rural Australia assisting people with disability, where long-distance travel is a necessity, not a choice.

"These changes effectively discriminate against people based on their location of work or home, or mobility challenges," said National Rural Health Alliance (NRHA) Chief Executive Susi Tegen.

No Choice

"Clinicians will have no choice but to reduce or cease services to rural areas due to the financial disincentives created by these new pricing arrangements. Rural, regional and remote communities are already facing persistent healthcare access challenges, where service access is well and truly below the urban average, especially in MMM 3-7 regions or towns, which have between 100 to 50,000

The National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) had only begun to make a difference by supporting more equitable access to allied health and disability services in rural areas. The proposed cuts risk undoing that progress.

"We were just beginning to see a positive momentum. Rather than building on the progress, these changes could reverse it. The government's good work in extending care and equity could be severely undermined," Ms Tegen said.

Hardest Hit

Smaller providers, many of them locally owned businesses employing local staff, will be the hardest hit. Small and medium enterprises play a vital role in maintaining the health and economic wellbeing of rural towns. Faced with tighter margins, many may be forced to close or scale back. This would result in no service or make way for larger, city-based providers who operate at scale but with less local connection or understanding of local context. It will be a revolving door of people who fly/drive in

fly/drive out with little continuity of care.

"This is not just a health issue. It's a social and economic one too," said Ms Tegen. "Removing or reducing viable services from rural towns has ripple effects far beyond healthcare, affecting employment, community resilience, and quality of life."

The NRHA urges the government to reconsider these proposed changes and to consult with rural providers, consumers, and communities to ensure equitable access to disability support, regardless of postcode.

Net Zero by 2050?

(The Editor, "The Times")

Dear Editor. – For starters I won't be here, if I am, I will be 110 and net zero won't happen anyway.

How a country so blessed with natural resources can reject using such a resource for its energy needs "beggars" belief. And then to export the resource so that others can use it for whatever because of the fiscal gain is morally unacceptable.

Sure, renewable power seems cheap, when the sun shines and the wind blows but the need for a secure backup makes the whole equation very expensive and will result in a lower standard of living for us in the west, famine and starvation in the third world.

Added to the cost of back up is the cost of the original infrastructure to build the solar and wind farms, and as well, the cost of replacement panels, and blades, let alone the huge interconnect towers and lines.

The question of climate change and the use and implementation of renewables such as wind and solar and new transmission infrastructure connectors have divided our communities and serves no useful purpose, I believe.

Just as humans need oxygen to survive, plants need carbon to survive and thrive.

Quote from NIPCC (International Institute Panel on Climate Change): "From a quarter to half of Earth's vegetated lands has shown significant greening over the last 35 years, largely due to rising levels of atmospheric carbon dioxide," according to a new study published in the journal

"Nature Climate Change" on April 25. An international team of 32 authors from 24 institutions in eight countries led the effort, which involved using satellite data from NASA's Moderate Resolution Imaging Spectrometer and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Advanced Very High-Resolution Radiometer instruments to help determine the leaf area index, or amount of leaf cover, over the planet's vegetated regions. The greening represents an increase in leaves on plants and trees equivalent in area to two times the continental United States.

"Results showed that carbon dioxide fertilization explains 70 per cent of the greening effect," said coauthor Ranga Myneni, a professor in the Department of Earth and Environment at Boston University. "The second most important driver is nitrogen, at 9 percent. So, we see what an outsized role CO2 plays in this process."

Close to home, the high yielding barley crops last year showing above average water use efficiency could well be the increasing atmospheric carbon available.

The warming effect of carbon is real and is a lot better for living than being cold.

Scientists tell us the medieval period was warmer, and I figure humans did not cause it then, and I am sceptical about humans causing it

The good book we were raised on, the Bible, in the very beginning tells us the earth and all its vast resources was made for us to use and enjoy. My task as a farmer

and manager is to leave my land better than when I first worked it.

The challenge is to quietly sift through the information readily available and find the real inconvenient truth.



These offences occurred during the same times as the copper cable theft mentioned last week.

During that same period 200 litres of hydraulic oil have been reportedly stolen from a rural property in Charles Street, Wycheproof. The investigation into these recent thefts is ongoing.

BCG Expo to Deliver Practical Innovation

Farmers, researchers, advisers, and agribusinesses will come together on Wednesday, July 16, for Birchip Cropping Group (BCG)'s highly anticipated Ag Tech Expo, a full-day event showcasing cuttingedge digital tools and technologies designed to support the future of farming.

Held in Charlton at Charlton Park, the Expo will spotlight automation, precision agriculture, sensor technologies, and weed control innovations through a practical, grower-focused lens.

"With tighter margins and more data than ever, it's critical we help farmers translate technology into decisions," said event organiser, BCG's Jess Bidstrup.

The sessions will provide handson demonstrations in VRT, data mapping, and system integration.

A highlight of the day will be a panel discussion addressing "The future of weed control technologies" featuring Charles Sturt University's Professor Michael Walsh, Ben Single (Single Agriculture), Bailey Kilpatrick (Swarm-Farm Robotics) and Warakirri Cropping's Baingarra site manager, Jono Robinson, and "on-farm sensors for more informed decision making" with Gallagher Animal Management and INCYT.

Korean War Anniversary:

Flags Raised at Birchip Cenotaph

On Wednesday, the Birchip RSL sub-branch quietly marked the 75th anniversary of the Korean War with flags raised in solemn tribute.

While no formal service was held, the sight of the Australian and Returned Services League flags flying served as a dignified reminder of a war that profoundly shaped the post-World War II era yet is often referred to as the "Forgotten War".

The Korean War began on June 25, 1950, when North Korean forces crossed the 38th parallel and invaded South Korea. In response, United Nations forces, including over 17,000 Australians, were sent to defend South Korea.

The war continued until the signing of an armistice on July 27, 1953. During those three years, Australian troops served with distinction in some of the conflict's most intense battles, including the Battle of Kapyong and the Battle of Maryang San. More than 1,200 Australians were

wounded and 340 lost their lives.

Birchip RSL sub-branch president Shane McLoughlan and wife Debbie oversaw the symbolic flag-raising, ensuring that the sacrifice and service of those involved in the Korean War continue to be honoured, even in the absence of ceremony. The gesture provided a quiet but powerful moment of reflection for the community.

In coming months the Birchip Cenotaph will see some exciting developments as the committee's refurbishment plan comes to fruition. Birchip RSL sub-branch committee members Noeline Hogan and Debbie McLoughlan have been working diligently to secure grant funding for a major upgrade of the site and their efforts will result in a revitalised memorial space that incorporates interactive historical elements.

Support for Victoria's **Proposed Fair Fuel Plan**

RACV welcomes mandatory fuel price reporting but urges the Victorian Government to share pricing data to support more Victorian motorists.

RACV this week announced its support for Victoria's proposed Fair Fuel Plan, subject to the data being freely available to all platforms so that fuel price data remains open and accessible through existing consumer platforms.

In a submission to the Department of Government Services, RACV endorsed the plan's goal of improving transparency and access to real-time fuel prices but stressed the critical importance of sharing this data with third-party applications that Victorians already use to find cheaper fuel.

"We strongly support mandatory fuel price reporting across Victoria, but the real benefits will only be realised if this data is made available to all platforms that help consumers save money," said RACV Head of Policy, James Williams.

"RACV's fuel finding apps already help our 2.2 million members find cheaper fuel, but we're currently missing about 25 per cent of the market because some independent retailers don't participate in voluntary reporting schemes. The Fair Fuel Plan addresses this gap."

Immediate Consumer Benefits Through Existing Apps

RACV operates two fuel finding platforms - the RACV App for members and the free Arevo app - which together provide real-time fuel price comparisons updated every 15 minutes. Unlike the proposed Service Victoria

platform, these apps also provide access to member fuel discounts, including up to 5c per litre savings at EG Ampol stations.

"Victorian motorists are already using our apps to save money on fuel. If the government shares its comprehensive data with us, we can deliver immediate benefits to consumers rather than asking them to download yet another app," Mr Williams

"The more places consumers can access this pricing data, the greater the potential savings across the community.'

Victoria Risks **Creating Commercial** Monopoly

RACV warned that Victoria would become the only Australian state with a commercial monopoly on fuel price data if third-party access is not provided. Every other jurisdiction with mandatory fuel price reporting, including New South Wales, makes this data available through public APIs from day one.

"When New South Wales introduced fuel price transparency, they made the data feed available to third parties immediately, in line with their open data policy. Victoria should follow this proven model," Mr Williams said.

Key Reasons

The organisation highlighted three key reasons for sharing fuel price data:

- Improved competition and consumer choice through multiple access points.
- Alignment with Victorian Government's open data

principles under the DataVic Access Policy

• Built-in redundancy if the Service Victoria platform experiences technical issues

Change to Road Rules

RACV is reminding Victorian motorists that from Tuesday, July 1, 2025, they will be required to slow down to 40 kilometres per hour when passing incident response vehicles that display flashing lights of any colour.

The change, announced in April this year, has been welcomed by RACV and its roadside assistance following a two-year campaign to review Road Rule 79A.

RACV General Manager Automotive Services, Makarla Cole, urged motorists to be aware of the rule change so that they could create the safest environment possible for roadside and incident response workers.

"We're grateful that the Victorian State Government has made this change to improve the safety outcomes and working conditions of roadside and incident response workers," Ms Cole said.

Since 2017, Victorian motorists have been required to slow down to 40 kilometres per hour when passing stationary emergency services vehicles displaying red or blue flashing lights.

This rule has now been expanded to include:

- Accident towing vehicles.
- · Breakdown towing services.
- Roadside assistance operators.
- Peninsula Link Incident Response vehicles.

• EastLink and Transurban Incident Response vehicles.

"Now that we have had an important and much-needed update to 79A, it's up to Victorians to do their part and ensure these vital workers can do their jobs without fear of harm and get home to their families safely," Ms Cole

Non-compliance with the updated 79A rule may result in a maximum fine of \$961.

Visitors Hit New Heights





Jhye Baddeley-Kelly, one of the early favourites for this season's Feeny Medal, Jayden Dick, Carlos Egan and Kane Rutley are some of the Magpies' most talented contributors who will need to be kept in check by Donald, to prevent a blow out on the scoreboard.

At home, and with a full head of steam generated by three successive wins, Boort will be very hard to beat.

Fifty-fifty Opportunity

Both host St. Arnaud and the visiting Charlton have an opportunity to savour a rare success this season when they clash at Lord Nelson Park. The Navy Blues hold a slight psychological advantage, having narrowly won their previous clash this season, in round 3, but from the first bounce, it will be game on.

Ben Xiriha, Pat Soulsby, Rhys and Jed Thompson have been in good form for Charlton, but will need plenty of support if the Navy Blues are to overcome the determined efforts of an improving Saints outfit.

Brad Organ, Kurt Torney, Owen Lowe and Jackson Needs provide plenty of run, generating scoring opportunity for St. Arnaud's big guns in attack, including Max Hungerford, whose influence could be the deciding factor.

If Hungerford fires, St. Arnaud can win, narrowly.

Redbacks Must Keep Winning

With its prospects of playing finals football virtually extinguished, Wedderburn needs a small miracle if it is to get back into calculations, but if it can set its sights on winning every game, starting tomorrow against a belowstrength Sea Lake-Nandaly, the Redbacks' finishing position will take care of itself

Knocking over the Tigers would see Wedderburn take a giant stride towards closing the gap that currently separates it from the top four.

To do that, they need to make every post a winner, from Mitch Jensen booting a bag of goals, to Joe Lockhart, Mitch and Jackson McEwen, Noah Furlong, Darcy Jackson and Hamish Lockhart controlling the midfield battles against the beating heart of the Sea Lake-Nandaly machine, as well as Adam Postle nullifying Ryan O'Sullivan and the Tom Metherell-led defence limiting the influence of the opposition attack.

Having suffered a comprehensive defeat at the hands of Calder United last round, Sea Lake-Nandaly can be expected to come out breathing fire, as it strives to reverse its downward spiral.
