But there it was, in the garden of their home, "Glen-gar", close to the high bank of the Richardson River, north of Donald.


Before this photograph was taken by the "Times" on Wednesday, a very parched wombat had had its thirst assuaged when Peter turned on the garden hose.

Urgent Advice from the RACV: Understand Your Vehicle's Dashboard Warning Lights

RACV is urging motorists to familiarise themselves with their vehicle's dashboard warning lights, as ignoring these critical alerts can lead to expensive repairs and potential safety hazards.

RACV Driver Education and Development Manager Silvia Morris said this week drivers regularly ignore dashboard warning lights, with many not understanding what the symbols mean or the severity of the issues they indicate.

"Dashboard lights are your car's way of communicating potential problems before they become serious," said Ms Morris.

"Understanding these warnings can be the difference between a minor repair and a complete engine replacement."

Guide

RACV has shared a guide to the 14 most important dashboard symbols that drivers should never ignore, including:

- Red warning lights, indicating serious issues requiring immediate attention.

- Yellow/orange advisory lights, signalling problems that need addressing soon.
- Green/blue information lights, confirming systems are operating correctly.

Most Critical

The most critical warning lights include the check engine light, oil pressure indicator, battery warning, and brake system alerts.

Restart Needed for Unfinished Inquiry

The Albanese Labor Government must re-start the unfinished inquiry into the sustainability of over 530 Australian shires and councils as soon as Parliament returns late next month, Shadow Minister for Local Government Dr Anne Webster MP said this week.

"Fourteen months ago Local Government Minister King said she had referred the

local government sustainability inquiry to the Standing Committee on Regional De-

velopment, Infrastructure and Transport because local government faced 'pressing issues' and that the inquiry was 'long overdue,'" Dr Webster said.

Feedback

"Fellow Minister Kristy McBain welcomed the inquiry saying it built upon feedback received in the preceding 18 months. Yet the Labor-dominated Inquiry only delivered an interim report 11 months after it started, and the Inquiry was then prorogued for the election.

The call comes amid criticism of the lowest number of parliamentary sitting days in 20 years this calendar year, with parliament currently on a 10-week break.

No Recommendations

"The Inquiry's interim report made no recommendations, but submissions suggested changes to the Financial Assistance Grants, the Intergovernmental Agreement on Federal Financial Relations, horizontal equalisation, natural disaster mitigation preparations and even National Cabinet," Dr Webster said.

"I call upon the Minister as a first order of business when Parliament resumes to re-open the inquiry and let it deliver a final report."

Struggling

"In my own north-western Victorian electorate of Mallee, small shires consistently tell me they are struggling financially – and I am putting that mildly. Faced with a myriad divisive energy project proposals, some have sought funding for additional staffing to cope with all the analysis and community consultation expected of them. On Sunday, South Australian councils spoke out about their struggles to keep up with backlog road maintenance and developing community infrastructure."

Meanwhile, ABS data in February analysed by money.com.au indicated that in capital cities, Canberra's rate increases had been up 83

per cent over 10 years, compared with Hobart's 46 per cent, Brisbane 43 per cent, while Melbourne matched Australia's overall average increase of 39 per cent.

Volunteer Equipment Grants Now Open

Applications for the 2025-26 round of the Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program (VESEP) are now open.

This year the government has announced an additional \$15 million in funding for VESEP.

Under the program, the Victorian Government matches every \$1 paid by volunteer groups with a \$2 co-contribution to a maximum contribution of \$250,000 (up from \$150,000).

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan said brigades and groups from across the state are encouraged to apply for the life-saving equipment which help protect communities.

"VESEP supports volunteers by providing funding to replace or purchase equipment such as vehicles, trucks, tankers, watercraft, trailers, and can also include minor facility improvements," Jason said.

Five Categories

There are five categories under which funding is available:

- Tankers.
- Specialist and Support Vehicles.
- Operational Equipment.
- Volunteer amenities costing less than \$5,000.
- Minor works costing less than \$250,000.

Key Focuses

"One of the key focuses of the program will be aiding those brigades that have not previously benefitted under VESEP and may face challenges with fundraising," Jason said.

In the previous round of funding, CFA received more than \$11 million across 167

successful VESEP projects, including six light tankers, 15 Ultralight tankers, six new Big Fills and the replacement of 18 Field Command Vehicles.

The 2024-25 round also funded more than 40 brigades received grants for minor works at their station.

Brigades/Groups can only apply for one project per funding round as per Emergency Management Victoria guidelines.

Application documents, vehicle flyers, the program guidelines and further information is available on Members Online.

Applications for the 2025-26 funding round close July 28, 2025, with the announcement of successful projects expected later in the year.

In March, the Essential Services Commission of South Australia's regular review indicated more councils were potentially unsustainable, including the Adelaide City Council and the District Council of Loxton Waikerie.

Sydney's Northern Beaches Council recently secured a 25.2 per cent rate increase after the NSW Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) acknowledged its current position was unsustainable long term and had an infrastructure backlog. The Council had sought a 39.6 per cent increase.

Future Fund

"The Nationals fought hard last month to ensure the Coalition remains laser-focused on a Regional Australia Future Fund which will deliver funding, in perpetuity, for regional Australia," Dr Webster said.

"Regional councils and shires often depend on grants to deliver infrastructure – they don't have the alternate means of raising revenue that city councils do. Rural councils increasingly are also the only organisation in town that can end childcare deserts, deliver appropriate home care services for the aged and NDIS users. Shires are holding back because they are being fiscally responsible, fearing for their long-term viability.

"I also fear for regional communities suffering record low rainfall, drought, flooding or other unfolding natural disasters that will make it even harder to approach their ratepayers to stay financially sustainable."

"While The Nationals will advocate for the Regional Australia Future Fund policy right through to the next election, this Local Government Sustainability Inquiry – and

the evidence of shires and councils on the brink of collapse – must be presented and debated urgently."

Terms of Reference

The inquiry's Terms of Reference were:

- The financial sustainability and funding of local government.

- The changing infrastructure and service delivery obligations of local government.

- Any structural impediments to security for local government workers and infrastructure and service delivery.

Trends in the attraction and retention of a skilled workforce in the local government sector, including impacts of labour hire practices

The role of the Australian Government in addressing issues raised in relation to the above.

According to RACV roadside assistance data, ignoring these particular warnings accounts for approximately 40 per cent of all major breakdown callouts.

"Modern vehicles are sophisticated machines with dozens of sensors monitoring everything from engine performance to tyre pressure," Ms Morris explained.

"When a warning light appears, it's because a sensor has detected something operating outside normal parameters."

RACV's guide provides clear explanations for each warning light and practical advice on what action to take, from safely pulling over immediately to scheduling a service appointment.

Drive School

RACV's Drive School also addresses car maintenance in their six-stage program, which focuses on developing better, safer, more confident drivers and equipping them with lifelong skills – like basic car maintenance checks – to help

keep them and their car safe on the road.

"We understand that seeing a warning light can cause anxiety for drivers," said Ms Morris.

"RACV's Drive School focuses not only on skills to help drivers be safe on the road but we also go through skills like basic car maintenance checks to help drivers understand what their car is telling them and make informed decisions about when professional help is needed."

The guide, available on RACV's website, also advises drivers on preventative maintenance to avoid triggering warning lights in the first place. Regular servicing, proper fluid levels, and maintaining correct tyre pressure are essential practices highlighted in the guide.

RACV Emergency Roadside Assistance providers are equipped to perform diagnostic tests when warning lights appear and can often resolve minor issues on the spot, potentially saving motorists from costly repairs.



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

These sessions form part of a wider project being undertaken by the Mallee CMA to improve flood preparedness and inform future planning by reviewing and assessing levees on public land.

They provide a valuable opportunity for local residents to share their lived experiences, observations, and knowledge of past flood events – particularly the 2022 floods – which will help refine current flood maps and planning tools.

We would greatly appreciate if you could consider promoting the following upcoming drop-in sessions through your newspaper and community notices: Culgoa, Thursday, June 19, at the Mallee Bunker, 1.00 p.m. to 2.30 p.m.; Nullawil, Thursday, June 19, at the Recreation Reserve, 3.30 p.m. to 5.00 p.m.; Berriwillock, Friday, June 20, at the Community Centre, 9.00 a.m. to 10.30 a.m.; Sea Lake, Friday, June 20, at the Community Complex, 11.30 a.m. to 1.00 p.m..

These consultations are part of a \$2.715 million Victorian Government investment to support CMAs, including Mallee CMA, to work in partnership with local governments and VICSES to strengthen flood emergency management and infrastructure resilience.

Local participation in these sessions is vital to ensure the accuracy of that work and to inform decisions around the future management of levees and emergency response strategies.

Drought-Affected Farmers in Need of Interest-Free Loans

Member for Mallee Dr Anne Webster MP is calling for Labor to bring back interest-free loans for farmers from the Regional Investment Corporation (RIC), impacted by current drought-like conditions.

Dr Webster said farmers across Australia have been simultaneously devastated by record low rainfall, drought and – in other parts of the nation – recent floods.

"I was speaking with affected farmers in Mallee and the Leader of the Nationals and Shadow Agriculture Minister David Littleproud MP in Wodonga on the weekend remembering how, in 2020, the Coalition introduced a two-year interest-free period for loans up to \$2 million for farmers experiencing hardship during the drought," Dr Webster said.

"The zero per cent interest rate applied to new and existing drought loans and to refinance existing debt from a farmer's commercial bank, to give farmers some breathing space, saving them cashflow and giving them time to restock and replant."

Initiative

"The Coalition's 2020 initiative stopped a lot of farms from going bankrupt. It is clear recent rain and drought

events are really hurting farmers, which is why I am calling on Labor to revisit this RIC loan product once again."

Mr Littleproud has written to Agriculture Minister Julie Collins, requesting support for the thousands of farmers dealing with floods and drought.

Dr Webster said current assistance doesn't go far enough and farmers would get much-needed reprieve by having access to a \$2 million loan with an initial 2-year interest free period, then 3 years interest only, then 5 years principal and interest.

Deficiencies

"Mallee farmers are suffering severe rainfall deficiencies, and some are in drought, and I have been speaking with farmers across the electorate in recent weeks about the distress they are experiencing," Dr Webster said.

"Late last year I sent out information on all the programs available to help them, but quite rightly they have pointed out the offering from

Federal and State Labor Governments are simply not enough.

"Worse still, it's taken farmers' courageous mass protest against the Victorian Government's terrible new 'emergency services' levy increases to get the Allan Labor Government to give a temporary reprieve from the callous new tax grab.

"Our farmers are feeling significant pain, and it is now time for the Victorian Government to make this loan product available for drought-affected farmers."

Sledgehammer Takes to Housing Affordability

The State Government has taken a sledgehammer to the construction industry, introducing the Building Legislation Amendment Bill 2025 which will push the cost of building a home up by as much as \$30,000.

Rather than fixing Victoria's housing crisis, Labor is making it worse – failing to protect consumers, punishing reputable builders, and putting the dream of home ownership even further out of reach for young Victorians.

Shadow Assistant Minister for Planning and the Building Industry, Wayne Farnham, said the bill was just the latest example of Labor siding with fringe parties instead of backing Victorian families.

"At a time when young Victorians are finding it harder and harder to build a home, the Government – along with the Greens, Cannabis Party and Animal Justice Party – have again voted to make housing more unaffordable," Mr Farnham said.

The Real Problem

"This bill does nothing to fix the real problem of consumer protection. The only thing it achieves is to push up construction costs."

Master Builders Victoria CEO, Michaela Lihou, said the bill failed to deal with the real issues in the building sector.

"Let's be clear – this legislation will do nothing to protect consumers from

unregistered and uninsured operators delivering substandard work," Ms Lihou said.

"Piling more legislation on decent builders is just another way of pushing them out of the industry, at a time when we've never needed them more."

Housing Industry Association Executive Director, Keith Ryan, warned the bill unfairly targets one side of the legal process.

Legal Process

"Our legal process for resolving disputes, be it a domestic building dispute or any other matter, can be easily

abused by an unscrupulous party to a case," Mr Ryan said.

"The new legislation tries to resolve that general flaw in the legal process by limiting the rights of one side – builders – to a fair hearing.

"It is not reasonable or necessary that all home builders stand to suffer due to the misbehaviour of a minority."

As housing approvals collapse, costs continue to rise, and builders leave the industry in record numbers, the Government's answer is more red tape, more cost, and no solution.

EWHS Board Meeting

The EWHS board met on Monday, May 26, and among the items discussed was the recent strategic planning consultation that included EWHS staff and members of each community.

Conversations highlighted a number of themes to inform future planning that mostly centred around access to services delivered in the community.

• The board approved a number of maintenance projects that included painting across all campuses, repairs to the pathology building at St Arnaud and IT equipment replacements.

As in previous years, EWHS has worked with St Arnaud Medical to facilitate arrangements for the upcom-

ing leave period for the doctors. St Arnaud Medical will publish service arrangements that include limited coverage from both a GP and a Nurse Practitioner each week.

EWHS would like to remind all service users to consider contacting the Victorian Virtual Emergency Department or Instant Script to access care from home, and to remind everyone that the Urgent Care facility remains available every day.



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In Its Current Form... Transmission Line Project Rejected

Northern Grampians Shire rejects VNI West project in its current form
June 3, 2025 Northern Grampians Shire councillors will call on the State Government to find an alternative to its VNI West transmission line project amid fears for the nation's food security along with community mental health and wellbeing.

Victoria to NSW Interconnector West – known as VNI West – is a proposed new 500kV double circuit transmission line connecting high-voltage electricity grids in New South Wales and Victoria.

The project's preferred route affects landowners in Northern Grampians Shire, with the proposal involving developing major overhead transmission lines through prime agricultural land, from Bulgana to north of St Arnaud.

At Monday's council meeting in Stawell, councillors carried a notice of motion "that the council does not support the VNI West project in its current form".

The notice of motion, brought by Cr Murray Emerson, also resulted in the council agreeing to continue to:

- Advocate to the State Government for an alternative to the VNI West project.

- Bring to the attention of the government their responsibilities under the Paris Agreement, where it specifically protects farming land from alternative energy projects.

- Strongly advocate to the State Government on the importance of food security in Victoria and the wellbeing and mental health of our community. Cr Emerson said his notice of motion followed the council completing due diligence on the project, which travelled through large sections of prime farming land.



"I have been directly involved in closely monitoring its progress for approximately two-and-a-half years. There have been numerous discussions over this time, with community, people who are affected by the path of this transmission line, and the so-called experts on this topic," he said.

"I am unable yet to understand what benefit this development brings to our shire and its constituents. Yes, we need energy as the coal stations are closing, but not at the expense of prime farming land."

"We, as public representatives need to robustly advocate to the government, both state and federally, for this development to cease forthwith and seek a better outcome for all."

Cr Emerson said councillors were of the opinion that alternative projects and transmission lines were required for the benefit of Victoria.

"However, due to the overwhelming objection by our local farming community over an extended period of

time I believe we should be taking a stance against the project," he said.

Crs Jack Blake and Karen Probst also spoke in favour of the motion, echoing Cr Emerson's points about a lack of consultation, mental health concerns, cost blow-outs on other projects; and companies having "money at heart" rather than community.

Deputy mayor Justine Hide – who chaired this section of the meeting because mayor Karen Hyslop had declared a conflict of interest – also voted in favour. Cr Jenny Greenberger is on a leave of absence.

Cr Hide said the decision was a popular one among the gallery.

"There has been significant opposition to this project in our community," she said.

"As Cr Emerson said, we are yet to see the benefits the transmission lines will offer our region but have been inundated with people deeply concerned about the mental health impacts, along with the physical impacts of taking over prime agricultural land."

"We didn't make this decision lightly, we did do our due diligence, and we will be advocating to the State Government to come up with an alternative proposal."

Cr Hide said the council did not support the compulsory acquisition of farmland or native vegetation for transmission-line construction.

"The state and federal governments need to take a hard look at our food and water security; our supply chains are already vulnerable," she said.

"Having Australian farmers producing Australian food for Australian mouths is something the government is taking for granted. The government should respect the signed Paris Agreement – it states that primary producing land should not be compromised by renewable energy."

Cr Hide said councillors were also dissatisfied with elements of the consultation process to date.

"Our officers are engaging at all available levels to obtain the fullest information possible and to keep both councillors and residents informed," she said.

To Support Farmers and Rural Communities... VFF Unveils Drought Framework

Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) president Brett Hosking has unveiled a comprehensive and scalable drought response framework designed to deliver timely, targeted support to farmers and regional communities battling prolonged dry conditions.

"Our farmers are doing it tough. With rainfall in some regions falling below the tenth percentile for months on end, we need a clear plan that delivers help where and when it's needed most," Mr Hosking said.

Three-Tiered Approach

The VFF's framework, developed in consultation with Agriculture Victoria and submitted to the Victorian Government, reflects months of policy engagement with the Victorian Agriculture Minister. It outlines a three-tiered approach to drought support that is evidence-based and ready to implement. Measures include infrastructure and reseeding grants, municipal rate relief, water security initiatives, and dedicated mental health services. The model is built on empirical climate triggers to ensure support is equitable, transparent and responsive to escalating conditions.

Meeting

It comes as VFF president Brett Hosking gets ready to meet directly with Victorian Premier Jacinta Allan to discuss the request this week.

"We've got the Premier's ear and now it's time to deliver for regional communities which are really struggling."

"This isn't just about handouts. This is about keeping rural communities on their feet, safeguarding food production, and making sure that no farming family feels like they have to go it alone," Mr Hosking said.

The framework also urges the State Government to address longer-term strategic barriers, including the relaxation of pest control restrictions, improved freight access for fodder transport, and the fast-tracking of critical pipeline infrastructure projects.

"Drought doesn't just affect paddocks. It affects people. That's why our framework includes support for kids to keep playing sport, families to stay connected, and farmers to access the mental health care they need," Mr Hosking said.

Mr Hosking welcomed recent public interest in supporting farmers and called for a whole-of-government

approach involving state and federal leadership.

"We are also calling on the Victorian Premier, the Prime Minister, and both the State and Federal Agriculture Ministers to visit drought-affected communities in Victoria, he said. It is vital that leaders see first-hand what these communities are experiencing in order to understand the challenges and identify how they can best support them.

"We're ready to work with all levels of government to implement this framework. With the right plan and the right partnerships, we can get through this together," Mr Hosking said.







A lot of clubs are now having to run six race programs. It still costs the clubs basically the same amount of money whether it is 6, 7, 8 or 9 races. At least they are having a go!

I have been told two big stables have gone from the Sunraysia area to interstate for a lot better prizemoney.

HRV is running roadshows in four key areas of Victoria this month, wanting input from participants. Well, I

know of one trainer who sent an email with what seemed to be a very good idea... No response. Will this be the same at these "roadshows"?
