Art and Photography On Show

The opening night of the Donald Art and Photography Show, Friday, May 9, was enjoyed by all who attended.

Accompanied by the background music by Leo Tellefson, people wandered around the 250-plus entries, viewing the beautiful artwork and photography. These were attractively arranged on screens hired from the Charlton P&A Society. Sitting at the base of each screen footing were pot plants from "Goldy's Patch" managed by Karen Goldsmith, adding to the ambience of the show.

The show was organised by the Donald Learning Group. The art judge was Lauren Larkin, Director of the Horsham Art Gallery, whose comments were appreciated by both the artists present and the viewers. Lauren was impressed by the overall high standard of the art.

Awards

Lauren awarded the Best Work of the Show – Any Medium to Leanne Onley for "Unpredictable" – \$1000. Lauren wrote: "I want to get

swept out to sea in this work. It drew my eye, time and time again as I wandered around the room. The touch of white against the harsh blacks and blues of the ocean gives a gentle touch. Truly a wonderful painting."

Best Work of the Show – any Medium – Runner-up was awarded to Tarli Bird for "Kenyan Time" – \$500. Lauren's comments were: "As I looked through the 'flywire' I see the vivid landscape. The colour telling its own story, each time I look at it".

Guest Artist

Tarli Bird was the guest artist for the show with a wonderful display of her work. Tarli's artwork features fine thread sown in parallel lines across the painted background, giving the painting a vibrant finish, catching the light and changing the colours slightly across the artwork. Seedling Survival in Marginal Moisture

The practice of dry sowing has become increasingly common with frequent years of below average rainfall in the sowing season.

Dry sowing, where crops are sown into a dry seed bed before season breaking rainfall, has helped farmers decrease production risk and manage workload.

With persistent warm, dry conditions and no rain forecast on the horizon, concerns on how long germinated crops can survive on marginal moisture is at the forefront of grower minds.

BCG conducted a study in 2008, where seedling survival was observed over 2.5 weeks before follow-up rain was received. The study determined germinated but not emerged crops survived at least 2.5 weeks before further rain was received.

Similarly to the research conducted in 2008, BCG is currently investigating seedling

survival across the region. Initial assessments have been made at grower paddocks in Birchip, Curyo and Quambatook and will continue throughout the season, to determine how long the germinated seed can remain viable, how establishment was affected, and how safe it is to dry sow with no rain on the forecast.

Rainfall

Rainfall received during summer has provided moisture at depth, but crops were sown into dry topsoil. The ANZAC Day rainfall event varied across the region, with totals ranging from 0-5mm in some areas and over 60mm in others. This rainfall proved enough to germinate dry

sown wheat and canola at Birchip and Curyo, and for canola to germinate and emerge at Quambatook. Barley at Birchip, sown 4 cm deep into moisture following the ANZAC day rain has not germinated yet.

Scepter wheat observed at Birchip, sown dry on April 25 to 1cm depth, has germinated with roots and shoot. Hybrid canola at Curyo, sown dry on

April 11 to 2-3 cm depth, showed some germination with roots developing.

BCG will continue monitoring seedling survival on marginal moisture over the coming weeks to determine how long germinated but un-emerged seeds can survive and if establishment is affected.

Farmers Angry at New Levy

Angry Farmers and CFA members from all over Victoria gathered on the steps of Parliament House in Melbourne on Tuesday to protest the proposed new tax by the State Government.

This bigger protest followed the Bendigo and Melbourne CFA member protests on Friday where fire trucks blockaded Jacinta Allan's office in Bendigo and parked at the front of Parliament House in Melbourne.

Local farmers stepped off their tractors and took time out from sowing crops to come together to encourage the cross bench MPs to vote against the Emergency Services and Volunteers levy, which will be collected by Local Government through rates notices for ALL landowners in Victoria.

The proposed levy will replace the already increased Fire Services Levy currently paid by all landowners. The new levy will increase all residential properties by 99%, commercial properties by 100% and all farm land by 189%, it is calculated on the

Capital Improved Value of the property. This unfair and inequitable tax comes from a desperate State Government which is trying to make a bad budget look better when it is released next week.

Rally organiser, Rupanyup Farmer, Andrew Weidemann started proceedings and introduced the speakers. Peter Marshall, secretary, United Firefighters Union, spoke about the need for better funding for firefighting and emergency services, but stated that the billions that would be raised from ratepayers through this levy would not be used to fund FRV, CFA and SES groups as claimed. He also said that it greatly disrespected our volunteer CFA firefighters by asking them to pay for the privilege of being a member, when they willingly give up their time to attend major fires like the recent Grampians fires.

Marshall's comments were supported by Brad Batten, MP, Leader of the Liberal Party and Coalition, Danny O'Brien, MP, Leader of the National Party, Emma Keally, MP, Member for Lowan and Deputy Leader of the National Party, Brett Hosking, VFF President and Kevin Butler, Farmer and Founder of Blaze Aid.

The rally was well supported by MPs from the Opposition and cross benches. Many of the regional MPs have been dealing with the fallout of this proposed tax during community meetings where the farmers appear to be bearing the heaviest burden that would see them paying thousands of dollars at a time when many require assistance due to severe drought, especially in the south-west of the State. There were no Labor MPs attending the rally, despite having been invited.

The vote on this new tax has been moved for a second time to Thursday, 15th, as the Labor Party has not had the numbers to push it through the Senate.

\$400,000 for Donald Power Plant Project

GWMWater is a step closer to trialling a community energy initiative in Donald thanks to \$400,000 in funding from the State Government.

Funding from the 100 Neighbourhood Batteries Program will support the water business to progress a Donald Community Power Plant Project.

The pilot initiative aims to reduce electricity bills and improve local grid stability by installing a grid-connected battery in Donald. If the initiative is successful, this project may be expanded to other towns within the GWMWater service area.

The proposed battery would be installed at the redundant GWMWater water storage site on Racecourse Road in Donald. There are plans to expand battery capacity and include additional solar generation at the site, if additional external funding can be secured. GWMWater has been working with Donald 2000 Inc.

and Powercor Australia to develop project concepts.

In January 2024, GWMWater was awarded \$85,000 from the Water Minister's Climate Challenge to explore the feasibility of a community energy project for Donald. Building on this initiative, GWMWater submitted the application for \$400,000 in additional funding to commence implementation of the project.

Facilitating community energy initiatives is an integral component of GWMWater's Clean Energy Strategy. This strategy outlines GWMWater's commitment to achieving carbon neutrality by 2035, which includes sourcing 100% of electricity from renewable sources by 2025, while ensuring that energy investments do not result in increased water bills for customers.

ACEN Australia is in the early stages of investigating a large-scale wind energy project in Buloke Shire in Western Victoria, called **Corack East Wind**. The development is proposed to be located on privately owned land between Donald, Birchip and Wycheproof.

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Charlton 100 Years Ago

(Information from "East Charlton Tribune")

May 9 to 13, 1925.

Faithful Church-Woman: In the parish Hall the congregation of St Martin's Church of England said farewell to a faithful member in Mrs A. J. Barber. The Vicar (Rev. A. E. Freeman) presided. In connection with the various meetings and functions of the Ladies' Guild she had been a great helper, and had done good work for the Flower Show and Fete. She attended Church twice on Sundays. The Sunday School Superintendent added his tribute, referring with pleasure to how

well-conducted were Mrs Barber's children in the Sunday School. The Vicar then asked Mrs Barber to accept a pair of silver vases, and a set of silver spoons, as a token of esteem and appreciation from the congregation.

Brilliant Ball: A Grand Ball, under the auspices of St Martin's Church was held in the Victoria Hall; and everyone agreed it was a very fine turn-out. The attendance must have numbered 100 couples or more, and all enjoyed themselves immensely. The floor, which had been pre-

pared by men of the Church, was in particularly fine order. The music provided by the Charlton Jazz Trio was of the best. A feature of the Ball was the brilliant array of costumes, eg. Miss A. Hannabry - white satin with scarlet feather trimming; red shoes and white stockings; white feather hair band. The supper was on an elaborate scale - a tempting array of ham and tongue sandwiches, fruit salads, trifles, jellies, cakes, etc.

Refreshing Rain: The dry spell broke when a steady, but mild and satisfactory rain set in - a rain which was ideal from the point of view of the farmer. The man on the land will now be enabled to make excellent progress with his work. On the Post Office gauge, the fall up till 9 a.m. on Monday was 39 points; and the 24 hours following added 74. Rain continued to fall at intervals on Tuesday. We have learnt by telephonic inquiries, the record up till 9 a.m. on Tuesday was: Buckrabanyule, 115 points, Wychitella, 76 points.

Concert and Dance: Probably never before in the history of Buckrabanyule has such a large crowd been seen at a concert and dance as that which assembled for the functions which succeeded the recent Sports Carnival and American Fair. Artists from Charlton, Boort and other parts of the district reinforced the local talent, to provide a

programme that was lengthy, varied and altogether most enjoyable. Items were: songs, recitations, one string violin solo, duets and trios. For the dance which followed, good music was provided by the Wedderburn Orchestra. Mr Joe O'Donnell made an attentive and efficient MC. An excellent supper was provided by the ladies of the district.

Buckrabanyule Effort: In the Hall a meeting was held to report progress in connection with the recent Sports Carnival and American Fair. A profit of about £174 would be the result. The overdraft is £153, so this will clear it off. The meeting was well attended and everyone spoke of the kindly feeling which animated the whole gathering. Special references were made to the donors of Charlton, Barrakee, Woosang, Marmal, and Wychitella, in respect of the many gifts received. Great assistance was freely given by several members of the Woosang Sports Committee.

An interesting Announcement: Country people and town residents will note with pleasure that, from now onwards, Melbourne Bitter, as well as Carlton Ale and Victoria Bitter, is on draught at McAuliffe's East Charlton Hotel.

Tennis Club Cannot: At the meeting of the Tennis Club Committee the proposal of the Golf Club that the Tennis Club should join with that organisation and the Cricket Club in extending and improving the present Golf Club House was carefully considered. The Tennis Club decided that it was unable to join in. It is considered that a Tennis pavilion, to be of any real value to the members, must be right on the courts - and this would not be so in the case of the Golf Club House.

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

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White Card Training for Charlton Students

This week, together with the North Central LLEN, Charlton College Year 10 students took an important step toward future careers in the construction and trade industries by completing their White Card training – a nationally recognised certification that prepares individuals to work safely on construction sites across Australia.

The training, formally titled “Prepare to Work Safely in the Construction Industry”, is essential for anyone wishing to step on to a construction site, including students undertaking work experience in building, carpentry, plumbing, electrical, and other related fields.

Led by accredited trainers, the one-day course covered vital topics such as:

- Identifying and managing workplace hazards.

- Understanding safety signage and protocols.
- Using personal protective equipment (PPE).
- Knowing workers’ rights and responsibilities under WHS laws.

Students engaged in a mix of theory and hands-on learning and demonstrated strong commitment to understanding the importance of safety in high-risk environments.

Upon successful completion, students received their official White Card, giving

them the green light to participate in construction-related work experience and setting the foundation for future apprenticeships or trade pathways.

Vehicle intercept: Just after midnight on Saturday the 10th of May, police intercepted a vehicle on the outskirts of Swan Hill. Vera Woods Celebrates a Remarkable Century

Vera Woods celebrated her 100th birthday anniversary last Friday surrounded by love, laughter and four generations of family, relatives and friends.

The festivities stretched across several days and locations, starting with lamington cake at Sharp's Bakery, followed by a joyful gathering with residents and staff at the Birchip Nursing Home, and culminating in a special celebration in Bendigo on Mother's Day with 80 relatives and friends.

A highlight of the celebration for Vera was receiving a letter from King Charles and his wife Camilla, although she said she would have preferred one from the Queen.

Born on May 9, 1925, in Edithvale, Melbourne, Vera was one of six children born to Adelaide and Alfred Roberts. Her early years were spent in Aspendale, where her family ran a Palais and picnic grounds.

After finishing school, Vera took on a variety of jobs, testament to her spirit of adventure. She worked in the office of a hops garden in Myrtleford, took on roles in Warwick, Queensland, and later found work at Myer in Bendigo.

During World War II, Vera's two older brothers enlisted and served in New Guinea, tragically losing their lives in service to Australia.

Her connection to the rural community of Wilkur South began through visits to her Lang relatives. It was there that she met Norman Woods, her future husband. The couple married in Bendigo in 1953 and together raised six children, Graham, Jeanette, Dianne, Cheryl, Debbie, and John while farming at Wilkur South.

Vera and Norman eventually settled in Warracknabeal after their son John took over the family farm. Vera and Norman cherished their years there, although life brought its share of heartbreak. In 1998, their daughter Debbie died in a car accident near Glenorchy, and just four months later, Norman passed away. Another tragedy struck in 2006 when their grandson Jack, son of John and Ros Woods, lost his life in a car accident at Wilkur South.

Despite these deep personal losses, Vera has remained an enduring symbol of strength and warmth. Small in stature but generous in spirit, she is admired and loved by all who know her.

Her family credits the reason for Vera's longevity, apart from good genes, to her ability to accept things in life and to smile and be happy.

Now residing at the Birchip Nursing Home, Vera expresses heartfelt gratitude for the kindness and care she receives from the lovely staff. As she reflects on her century of life, Vera remains a beacon of resilience and joy, a woman whose life has touched many and whose stories will continue to inspire generations to come.






V/Line Timetable Discrepancy

Victorian Farmers Left High and Dry?

The Victorian Government has yet again failed to commit to support Victorian farmers grappling with worsening drought conditions.

This week, in question time, Minister for Agriculture, Ros Spence, refused to commit to key relief measures as farmers across the state battle relentless dry conditions.

Shadow Minister for Agriculture, Emma Kealy, has slammed the Government for its continued failure to adequately support Victorian farmers.

With South Australia stepping up with a \$73 million drought support package, Victoria has offered farmers \$60m less – a mere \$13.5 million – despite the same devastating dry conditions impacting both states.

“Our farmers have been left high and dry by the

Government, which is more focused on delivering another cruel tax blow for farmers rather than giving them the support they need,” Ms Kealy said.

“The Government has forgotten about our Victorian farming families facing crop failure, livestock losses, and rising debt due to relentless dry conditions.

“It’s diabolical negligence and will have an impact on not just our farmers, but also drive up the cost of food for all Victorians.

“If the South Australian Government can provide meaningful, immediate support for their farmers, then why can’t Labor do the same here in Victoria?”

Tax Hike

Making matters worse, the Victorian Government is attempting to ram through a massive emergency services tax hike this week that will see farmers paying up to 189 per cent more – at the very moment they are facing drought conditions and financial hardship.

The Minister’s refusal to commit to waiving the emergency services tax hike – a key measure adopted in South Australia – shows the Government is out of touch with the realities on the ground.

“Farmers in drought-hit regions should not be hit with crippling tax bills while they struggle to keep their stock alive,” Ms Kealy said.

“Labor’s refusal to act shows a fundamental lack of care and compassion for the same people who put food on our table and contribute so much to the state’s economy already.

“Six weeks ago, the South Australian government extended their drought support. Our Victorian farmers can’t wait any longer for Labor to provide support on this side of the border. Every extra day without support puts stock, farms and farmers’ mental health at risk.”

Local and General Cultivation near channels: The Water Commission for some time been contemplating the passing of by-laws and regulations to prevent clearing, grubbing, cultivating, or fallowing of the land in the Wimmera Mallee District situated within one chain of any channel located in country where there are likely to be “blows”.

The Commission would, of course, only deal with those channels which are liable to be sanded up and would not enforce the by-law where there is no danger of the channel being affected. The reason for the by-law can be well understood when it is known that the cost of clearing out those channels runs into many thousands of pounds a year, which in turn has to be met out of water rates charges, and thus the water rate may have to be increased if the heavy expenditure of channel cleaning is not in some way reduced. The Commission proposes enforcing the regulation in a reasonable manner, but it feels that it is essential in quite a number of districts.

To the Editor.—The movement in connection with the building of a Hostel for the Higher Elementary School seems to be at rather a standstill, for which I am disappointed. My personal view is, that Birchip and District have an opportunity that should be grasped with both hands and make the town the scholastic centre of the middle north. To the citizens out of Birchip it is more important than it is, but the Birchip people should take the initiative in getting it started. I would suggest to Rev. Whitworth and all the ministers of different churches that they call a meeting for some Saturday afternoon and see that everyone was invited to be present. This matter is important to parents,

especially those who want to see their children receive a good secondary education—and all fathers and mothers whatever their means, should attend and support the object to the best of their ability. After the Birchip meeting, other meetings should be convened at Watchem, Massey, Curyo, Watchupga, Woome-lang and Lascelles, or any other place along the line. By this means a large committee could be formed with power to collect and get promises of assistance. I feel this matter to be of paramount importance. At present the greatest drawback the school has is lack of accommodation for the children and teachers. I feel sure if the citizens will find the necessary money to build the hostel, it will not be long before the Education Department makes the Higher Elementary School into a fully fledged High School, and Birchip will then become the educational centre of the Lower Mallee.

• Continued from page 16. team to beat, having won all its games, including surviving probing challenges from Sea Lake-Nandaly and Calder United, teams also expected to feature prominently this season.

What makes Birchip-Watchem such a formidable force is its combination of a powerful midfield, a most efficient defence that has conceded the least number of goals so far (36), and a potent attack which has scored the heaviest of any team (106 goals). The Bulls also have three of the competition's top 10 goal kickers, Ben Edwards 39, Joe Reid 16 and Nic Rippon 15.

As its current position indicates, Boort is next in line, its defence, led by Keiren Wilson, having conceded 44 goals, while its attack, featuring Jye Baddeley-Kelly (28 goals), Kane Rutley (16) and Peter Barbopoulos (12) has registered a combined 95 majors.

Calder United, after a steady start, is starting to hit its straps, restricting all opposition to just 38 goals, whilst its forwards, including Jack Exell (15) and Jordan Humphreys (11) out of a combined total of 77, are having a more dynamic impact on the scoreboard.

The recent return of Humphreys has provided a game changing fillip for the Lions, his on-field contribution in just two games elevating his team to previously unattainable heights.

Sea Lake-Nandaly's stuttering start to its title defence can be gauged by the number

of goals for and against. Its defence is as frugal as ever, conceding just 36 goals, the equal lowest across the league, but its attack has accumulated just 59 goals, led by Tyson McKenzie's contribution of 11, ranking the Tigers well behind the three teams above it, and only marginally ahead of fifth-placed Wedderburn.

Wedderburn has been very good, defensively, led by coach Tom Metherell, conceding just 43 goals. But the Redbacks have struggled to capitalise in front of their own goal, booting just 54 so far, twenty of which were scored against Charlton. The injured Mitch Jensen is their leading contributor with 13, which includes one bag of 10.

Road Ahead

Looking at the next four rounds, Birchip-Watchem has games against Boort (A), St. Arnaud (H), Charlton (H) and Donald (A), and will start a firm favourite to win all four.

Boort needs to perform well against the Bulls to regain the momentum, which it had been building until last Saturday's reality check against Calder United.

It then has winnable games against Wedderburn (the Magpies' only realistic challenger for a top four finish), St. Arnaud and Charlton, both of which it defeated comprehensively in earlier rounds.

Calder United can continue to build its confidence and percentage at the expense of St. Arnaud, Charlton and Donald, before venturing up the Calder Highway in round 9 to confront Sea Lake-Nandaly.

It's a midseason clash that has all the hallmarks of a final, between a proud champion and one of its most serious would-be challengers.

Sea Lake-Nandaly's lead up to round 9 consists of games against Charlton, Donald and Wedderburn.

Wedderburn has two important clashes it needs to win in coming weeks, against Boort in round 7 and Sea Lake-Nandaly in round 8, as well as games it should win against Donald and St. Arnaud, if it is to remain in touch with the top four.

The gulf that currently exists between the top five teams and Charlton (2 wins), St. Arnaud (1) and Donald appears destined to widen, given the injuries all three teams are currently experiencing, increasing the stress on their already limited resources.

One positive for the Navy Blues, Saints and Royal Blues is the game time all three are being able to provide for young footballers, who can only benefit from the experience.


