Northern Grampians Withdraws from Five-Council Alliance

Northern Grampians Shire Council has withdrawn from a five-council alliance created to collectively advocate to State Government on issues including transmission lines, renewable energy and mining.

The alliance, formed in February this year, also includes Buloke, Gannawarra, Yarriambiack and Loddon councils, which are all directly impacted, by or near to, the proposed alignment for the Victoria to New South Wales

Interconnector, VNI West, transmission line and proposed renewables.

Northern Grampians Shire deputy mayor Justine Hide said alliance members had been exploring common ground in relation to challenges

created by transmission line, renewable energy and mining projects in their regions.

She said after further discussions, Northern Grampians councillors had decided to withdraw from the alliance.

"Our shire is in quite a different position to the other four councils," she said.

"The vast majority of our farmers are strongly opposed to the proposed VNI West transmission line project, which is not necessarily the case in all the other shires."

"Our overriding priority as a council is to strongly support the wellbeing and resilience of

our farming community, given its vital importance to our municipality and the fact that agriculture overwhelmingly underpins our local economy."

Cr Hide said for an alliance to work, all parties needed to have common interests.

"After our initial two meetings, it became apparent that our council has less in common than the other councils

involved, particularly when it comes to VNI West," she said.

"That doesn't mean we won't work with other councils moving forward. For example, for the past two years we have run monthly online transmission forums, which have proven a valuable source of information for all stakeholders, including other councils."

North-Central is Netball Association of the Year

The winners of Netball Victoria's 2024 Community Awards were announced last week, celebrating the contributions of individuals, clubs, and associations to the sport across the state.

Five individuals, three associations, and two clubs received honours across eight categories, after being nominated by peers and selected by a panel of up to four in each category. The evening was officially opened and welcomed by Netball Victoria President, Carol Cathcart, during the Community Awards presentation.

The North Central Netball Association (NCNA) was named Association of the Year, a testament to its progressive leadership, innovative programs, and unwavering commitment to its members.

The prestigious accolade was accepted by NCNA's 2024 Board of Management President, Kylie Walsh, on behalf of the Board and its members. In her acceptance speech, Kylie highlighted the extraordinary volunteer efforts that have been pivotal to the association's success. "The countless hours given

by our Board volunteers, along with their unique talents and passion they bring to their roles, have set NCNA on a positive trajectory," she said.

Board of Management
After years of careful planning, NCNA transitioned to a formal Board of Management in 2023.

This innovative governance model includes volunteer delegates from each NCNA club, ensuring equal representation and fair decision-making. By reducing the administrative burden on individual clubs, the Board fosters collaboration and sturdiness in its roles, enabling the association to strengthen.

"The continuity into our second year of the Board has brought stability and a renewed sense of direction," Kylie shared. "This recognition reflects the strength of our governance model and

the expertise we've been fortunate to gain, including guidance from AFL Central Victoria during the Board's formation and over the past two years."

Pathway for Juniors

Addressing the evolving needs of the association, particularly amongst the top age junior cohort, to name but one area. NCNA introduced a new "C" reserve competition in 2024. This grade blends junior and senior players, offering a pathway for juniors to transition into senior netball, while regaining confidence and developing skills. Mentorship from senior players in this competition has been pivotal, fostering growth and camaraderie among all participants. The success of "C" reserve has strengthened NCNA's player development pipeline and demonstrated the association's commitment to providing opportunities for players at all stages of their netball journey.

"Our Umpire Co-ordinator Nicole Amos, has been instrumental in creating an environment where umpires feel supported and valued," Kylie said.

"Her passion, time management expertise to assign NCNA mentors and testers

Our Only Bible Museum Reopens

Its pleasing to let the community know, that Australia's only Bible Museum has re-opened.

The museum was established in St Arnaud in 2009, but the collection officially began in 1981, when museum director Ellen Reid and her family spent 6 months collecting Bibles in the UK. Having well and truly been bitten by the collecting bug, her obsession has continued into her 80s.

Since opening the museum in St Arnaud, the eclectic collection has tripled in size,

now comprising over 3,000 items, including 3,000 year old archaeological artefacts, 16th century Bibles and numerous rare and interesting books and models.

Unlike other Bible Museums around the world, the Australian Bible Museum includes a large section of Aboriginal Bibles and extracts, including a very rare

Buloke's Clarification

Recent media reporting has incorrectly suggested that Buloke Shire Council, along with neighbouring councils, has entered into a \$100 million deal with VicGrid in relation to the VNI West transmission project.

This is incorrect.

A Five Shire Alliance — comprising Buloke, Yarriambiack, Northern Grampians, Hindmarsh, and West Wimmera — met last Thursday to agree on three major regional priorities to advocate for in relation to VNI West. They are:

1. Fair and equitable compensation for all affected farmers along the route.

2. Access to wholesale electricity prices for communities hosting new generation and transmission assets.

3. Legacy housing projects to deliver long-term benefit to our rural towns.

The Five Shire Alliance will be meeting with the Victorian Minister for Energy on Wednesday, April 30, 2025, to advance these priorities on behalf of our region.

Buloke Shire Council has NOT entered into any deal with VicGrid, AEMO, or any other entity. Advocacy is ongoing to ensure that the interests of our farming and wider communities are fully protected and respected.

Additionally, comments attributed to Buloke Mayor Cr Alan Getley in recent media coverage were taken out of context. Cr Getley's remarks

related to the importance of securing tangible and lasting benefits for affected communities, not to the acceptance of any funding offer or agreement.

Buloke Shire Council remains fully committed to transparency, to standing up for our landholders and residents, and to ensuring that any future developments respect the wishes and wellbeing of our communities.

If residents have concerns or would like further clarification, they are encouraged to contact Council directly.

translation into Ngarrindjeri from 1864.

Tourists and visitors need several hours to take in the guided tour, with even just highlights taking an hour to observe. You don't have to be religious to enjoy a visit to the Bible Museum though, with history, unusual artworks, along with smelling biblical incense and discovering the possible fate of the lost "Ark of the Covenant" all in the mix.

A new foreign languages library has been added, which includes many early Bibles, including a very large Dutch Bible from 1702, featuring an incomplete map of Australia, and a very battered Russian Bible in early church Slavonic, from 1779, which

survived the Russian Revolution in 1918.

A new addition to the museum is the world first "Room of Prophecies", which includes a 10ft tall statue from a Biblical prophecy, with the Ishtar Gate from Babylon setting the scene, providing a unique experience.

The spiritual aspect of being "born again" is represented by the butterflies in the Butterfly Garden and flight house. Ellen, and her daughter Jean, have been breeding butterflies since the 1970s and in their spare time, nurture caterpillars and maintain the nectar supply in the garden. The Butterfly Garden is only open from November to May, due to the weather.

So we're thrilled to have re-opened, having been shut for covid and then flooding

As Enrolments Open for 2026...

More Kinders and More Free Hours

The State Government is opening more kinders and adding more free kindergarten hours for families across Victoria – adding to the \$630 million that busy Victorian families have already saved through Free Kinder.

Premier Jacinta Allan and Minister for Children Lizzie Blandthorn this week visited Lollypop Creek Kindergarten in Werribee to announce the locations for new kinders on school sites and the opening of kinder enrolments for 2026.

The State Government will open new kinders at Seville Primary School, Willow Grove Primary School and Rochester Secondary College in 2027.

All three will be on school sites – helping more families ditch the dreaded double dropoff and increasing the number of kinders on school sites by 13 in 2027, creating more than 1,900 kindergarten places.

In 2026, the Government is also opening Pre-Prep – additional hours for four-year-old kinder – to 12 new local government areas. This means another 3,000 children at 130 services eligible for up to 20 hours of kinder per week.

Buloke Included

Families in the 12 local government areas of Benalla,

Buloke, Corangamite, East Gippsland, Horsham, Loddon, Mansfield, Mitchell, Pyrenees, Strathbogie, Wangaratta and Wodonga will join families in the six local government areas which started Pre-Prep this year.

The Government is also giving up to 25 free kinder hours each week to priority demographics, no matter where they live. This will help more than 5,000 children including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children, children from a refugee or asylum seeker background and those who have had contact with Child Protection.

More than 145,000 children and their families are saving up to \$2,600 per child each year through the State Government's Free Kinder program, which is available at 97 per cent of funded kindergartens across the state.

Profound Effects

It's important. With 90 per cent of a child's brain devel-

oping before the age of five, early education has a profound effect on the way children develop and gives them the best start in life.

Since Free Kinder started in 2023, the Government has picked up the bill for Victorian families and saved them about \$630 million in education fees. This year, they'll save another \$350 million.

Enrolments are now open for 2026 – for more information families can go to www.vic.gov.au/sending-child-kinder.

Best Start in Life

"We know Victorian families are doing it tough, and Free Kinder puts \$2,600 back in their pockets every year," said the Premier.

"Free Kinder gives our little Victorians the best start in life but it also gives parents, particularly mothers, the freedom to go back to work if and when they choose."

Watchem Progress Association again conducted the service with president Graeme Milne and vice president Jim Petrie sharing the job. Jim gave another of his



What are Cold Calling Scams?

[From Bendigo Bank]

Scammers call customers and appear to have previous knowledge of the customer. This is usually falsified information.

They are convincing in detail and generally engineer the call to align with their claim to be from the Bank's fraud or cyber security team.

CLI Overstamping

Sometimes an SMS alert is also sent prior to a "cold call scam", seemingly appearing like it's from a legitimate business such as Bendigo Bank. They use a method called "call line identification over stamping" (CLI over stamping). CLI over stamping allows the person calling you to display a

different number from the number they are calling from.

For example, an Australian company operating an overseas call centre may over stamp their calls. These calls, even though they originate overseas, appear to be from an Australian number, so that you recognise it as such, and return the call.

CLI over stamping is legal in Australia and the Bank has no authority or ability to counteract it. Please check our "things to remember" when-

ever you receive a call from anyone saying they are from the Bank.

What to Look Out For

There is a sense of urgency or threat to the call – "your bank account has been accessed"; "your bank account has been locked"; "a payment has been made from your account".

You are asked to provide personal and/or account information, for example your password or OTP (one time PIN).

You are asked to transfer funds into a safe account.

Requests to click a link within a text or email, for example "check your settings".

During these types of calls scammers may already have some of your personal and/or account information, potentially obtained illegally elsewhere, or from a data breach.

How to Protect Yourself

Don't be pressured into taking action.

Never provide your password or PIN to anyone even if they are claiming to be from Bendigo Bank and have personal information about you.

Contact your bank or company directly using phone numbers you find yourself (for example, official website).

Always access the official website or mobile app directly, not via a link.

Don't open or download any attachments or apps.

Don't click on links in text messages or emails – we will never send a link in an SMS.

We will never ask you to transfer money into another account to "keep it safe".

Things to Remember

Never provide your 6-digit e-banking security code to anyone – in person, over the phone or online, even if they claim to work for your bank and have personal information about you.





Eighty Years of CFA Fire Stations

From tin sheds, red brick buildings to weatherboard structures and ex-army Nissen huts, the home base for CFA brigades across Victoria has evolved significantly over the last 80 years.

CFA volunteers work hard to protect the growing Victorian community, so it is important they have adequate facilities to support their fire response.

When CFA made its impact throughout Victoria in the early 1950s, and postwar shortages had ended, large numbers of tin shed fire stations began to appear across rural Victoria. Now, to cater for growing communities and response efforts, state-of-the-art features are being rolled out statewide in fire stations.

CFA General Manager Infrastructure Services, Paul Santamaria, said CFA first made the decision to borrow funds from the government in 1951 to put toward the construction of new fire stations.

"While farm sheds were the garages for rural fire brigades pre the 1950s, some primitive stations were also made of fibro cement," Paul said.

"From 1953, CFA embarked on building galvanised iron sheds for rural brigades, renovating and extending urban fire stations and building several new ones.

"We borrowed £50,000 to build 40 sheds for rural fire trucks and urgently needed urban fire stations. Brigades

often erected the two bay or single bay prefabricated iron buildings themselves."

The tin sheds have become landmarks throughout Victoria, appearing in clearings without a house in sight, and were deemed a public sign of a community prepared to defend itself.

"Back then, brigade members lent horses, ploughs and scoops to level the ground of the new sites, and working bees took place to build the stations. Local fundraisers were held to pay for sirens and connect electricity," Paul said.

"All CFA stations conformed to the building standards at the time that they were constructed to ensure alignment with building codes and to provide adequate housing for appliances that were developed for various risk environments.

"Over time, these station design standards have changed and have been amended to include additional functional requirements to support remote rural, rural, semi urban, and fully urbanised areas."

Over the 2000s, a new generation of modern sheds and stations with additional facilities replaced older stations around the state, with


greater consideration for sustainability and of diverse communities and membership.

Today, the latest, fit-for-purpose facilities can include drive-through motor bay rooms and ancillary sheds for equipment, separate toilet facilities and turnout areas that ensure privacy for CFA members.

"It is really pleasing to see the improvements our fire stations have seen over the years. Whether brigades are receiving renovations or a brand-new station, all enhancements will go a long way in accommodating the future needs of the brigade," Paul said.

"Some stations now have adequate room for kitchens, multi-purpose rooms, privacy areas, gender diverse amenities, administration areas, workshops, breathing apparatus maintenance spaces, ICT equipment, laundry facilities, storerooms and hose drying towers.

"The larger, and improved facilities will be of great benefit to our Victorian towns as a whole, with members efficiently able to continue responding to incidents in the local area and surrounding neighbourhoods."

Tribute to World War II Veteran:

At the Birchip RSL Sub-Branch 2025 Commemorations, the following presentation was provided by Kylie Walsh; honouring her grandfather, Warrant Officer Kenneth Kemble Kemp, Distinguish Flying Cross, World War II Flying Officer.

For as long as I can remember, during these services, I would stand across from our beloved Grandad; Ken Kemp and wonder what was going through his mind. What memories stirred as he listened to the words of other veterans? It was always hard to fathom that this quiet, gentle man had once lived through the horrors of World War II.

Like many veterans, Grandad didn't speak of the war, at least not until later in life, and only to a few family members. Yet today, as I stand beside this very monument where his name is etched — Kenneth K. Kemp D.F.C., alongside his titles as a WWII RAAF Flying Officer. A Life Member of the RSL. A passionate Legacy supporter and fittingly, it is 80 years next month, that Grandad was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for his efforts when his Halifax III Bomber was hit over Essen in November 1944.

Today, I am honoured as one of his many proud grand and great-grandchildren, to share a small part of his story.

Forgive me for referring to him as Grandad rather than "Ken", it just doesn't feel right otherwise. And while I've thankfully never experienced war, I remain deeply grateful to those who have. Our forefathers, our current servicemen and women, and even the animals, who have served and sacrificed, so that we may live peacefully in this wonderful country.

Part of a Legacy

Grandad's courage was part of a legacy. His father, Lance Corporal Robert Arthur Kemp, served in the First Australian Division, 6th Battalion, 20th Reinforcement. At just 21, he was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal for an act of extreme bravery in the face of the enemy as a Mark V Tank

crewman during the Battle of Albert in France, August 1918.

The citation from Commonwealth of Australia reads:

"For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on 23rd August 1918 at Herleville Wood during The Battle of Albert, France. His volunteers for tank work in the attack, and when his tank ran into a tree near a dugout and burst into flames under heavy fire, the occupants scrambled out half-suffocated and were met by point-blank machine gun and rifle fire. Grasping the situation, he and a few men dashed forward and, in hand-to-hand struggle, captured the position, rescuing three wounded tank crew members who had been taken prisoner."

So, when Kenneth Kemp enlisted, he was walking in the footsteps of courage. At just 17, he joined the Australian Military Forces. Too young to enter the Royal Australian Air Force, but once turning 18, he formally joined the RAAF on October 10, 1942 and began training at Somerset Wireless School in Ballarat, followed by gunnery training in Sale.

Lucky Charm

Imagine the feelings of his father, retired Lance Corporal Robert Kemp DCM, watching his son prepare for war. As Grandad boarded the ship to England to join RAAF 77 Squadron in Yorkshire, his father handed him a small pouch, inside a "lucky broad bean" he'd carried throughout World War I. It had brought him home safely and he hoped it would do the same for his son.

True to form, Grandad kept that lucky broad bean, and many other treasures from his service. He was a meticulous man, and these mementoes now hold immense meaning for our family.

Tail Gunner

Grandad spoke about how badly he wanted to be a navi-

gator. When 90 enlistees were lined up on parade, the first 30 were told they'd be pilots, the next 30 navigators, and the final 30 gunners. Grandad was number 61 in line. He became a gunner, specifically, a tail gunner, one of the most dangerous roles in Bomber Command.

To put it in perspective:

- The average tail gunner completed just 3 sorties (missions).
- The average Bomber Command airman completed 10 sorties.
- If you survived 30 sorties, you were allowed to return home, your services rendered complete.

Grandad flew 33 sorties (missions) and he had survived 33 missions, against all odds and could have returned home. But he chose to stay and continue serving until the war's end, which was a testament to his selfless devotion to his crew and country.

Based at Full Sutton in Yorkshire, he spent 402 hours in the air as a rear gunner and tucked into the most vulnerable part of the Halifax III Bomber. Reading through his flying logbook, written in his own hand, is both fascinating and deeply humbling.

Near-Death Experiences

Grandad had two near-death experiences that shaped his journey.

In the first, he became seriously ill with a burst appendix right before a scheduled mission. The illness nearly killed him, but it also saved his life. His entire crew was tragically lost in a crash over Halifax. Had he flown that day, he likely wouldn't have returned home.

The second incident is documented in detail:

On the night of November 29, 1944, after dropping bombs over Essen, Germany,



his Halifax III Bomber was hit and burst into flames. Despite the chaos, the fire, the smoke, the explosions; Flying Officer L.E. Smith heroically flew the damaged aircraft 150 miles across enemy territory before ordering the crew to bail out behind Allied lines.

Grandad described this event in detail: "When the bomber was hit, the cushions on the rest positions burst into flames. The crew used extinguishers and even coffee from six vacuum flasks; they could not put the fire out. The draught from the open bomb doors fanned the flames and soon the fabric on the floor and wooden supports of the rest position were ablaze. Part of the oxygen system exploded and the rubber oxygen tubes caught fire. Even the insulation round the bomber's heading system burned away. The 'intercom' failed and the fire reached within an inch or two of the main fuel balance line running along the rear spar. It was then impossible to transfer fuel from the starboard wind tanks because the wires had become too hot. With the cockpit so filled with smoke Flying Officer L.E. Smith could not see his instruments, he flew with the main bomber stream until he reached Allied lines. By this time the electrical system had burned away and all navigational aids had been destroyed. Under the darkness and in such tight spaces the Flying Officer L.E. Smith gave orders to abandon the bomber, unfortunately Flight Sergeant E.C. Norvall's (who was the radio operator) parachute opened inside the plane."

Grandad and another crew member were able to assist to gather up the opened parachute, Flight Sergeant E.C. Norvall then held his canopy in his arms whilst the two crew members threw him out of the plane. Grandad, Warrant Officer K. Kemp, was then able to abandon the aircraft, and where he landed in Belgium (as noted in Grandad's flying log book), his parachute became tangled in a tree. He managed to cut himself free, keeping the ripcord (which he kept for his entire life), he then found refuge with a local family.

Telegram

Back home, his parents, Robert and Margaret received a telegram from RAAF:

"428325 Warrant Officer KK Kemp missing STOP regret to inform you that your son, Warrant Officer Kenneth Kemble Kemp is missing as a result air operations 29th November 1944 STOP known details are he was member of crew Halifax III aircraft detailed to attack enemy target at Essen Germany STOP the crew were forced to bale out and all members with the exception of your son are reported safe in Allied territory STOP your son is stated to have made parachute jump and is presumed safe STOP this information is confidential".

Second Telegram

Three agonising days passed before a second telegram arrived from RAAF:

"Pleased to inform you that your son 428325 Warrant Officer Kenneth Kemble Kemp previously reported missing is now safe and uninjured at his unit."

And then imagine the emotions, when a handwritten message written by Grandad arrived:

"Safe in England. Don't worry. Love, Ken Kemp."

A moment of sheer relief for his parents Robert and Maragaret, and siblings Norman, Gerald, and Pauline.

On December 1st, 1944, with Grandad found, he was flown from Brussels to Swindon in a Dakota aircraft. His logbook records the flight as simply: "passenger." Grandad and crew members were allocated seven days' "survivor leave", he then resumed flying as a rear gunner. His records show 265 hours of day flying and 137 night hours over 33 sorties (missions).

Medals

On May 29, 1945, he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, alongside Flight Officers L.E. Smith and R.B. Sprinall. Other crew members received the Distinguished Flying Medal. Grandad also received a gold caterpillar pin as was now a member of the Caterpillar Club, given to airmen whose lives were saved by parachute.

At the age of just 20 or 21, he had already reached the rank of Warrant Officer which is an extraordinary achievement, especially considering that today, most warrant officers are in their 40s or 50s. Even during the war, this was rare. It spoke to his character, leadership, and dedication.

And yet true to his nature, he never sought recognition. He simply wanted to serve his country.

Grandad was formally discharged on January 25, 1946. His service earned him the:

- Distinguished Flying Cross.
- 1939–45 Star.
- France and Germany Star.
- Defence Medal.
- British War Medal.
- Australian Service Medal.
- And a lifetime membership in the Caterpillar Club.

One More Treasure

He also brought home one more treasure: his English rose and bride, Joan Smith, returning to the Kemp family

farm where they raised four children Robina, Barbara, Jacqueline, and Robert.

Despite what he endured, Grandad remained a kind, and a gentle soul. He didn't speak much about the war, but when he did, it was always with a smile and a bit of humour. I can still picture him telling stories about his time in the UK, laughing at the funny moments, and showing the photos and his "treasures" that meant so much to him. Those are the moments that keep his memory alive for us, in the most beautiful way.

Story of Courage

Today, as I hold a poppy close to my heart, I'm reminded that every petal holds a story of courage, of sacrifice, of loss, and of love. Our

Grandad's story is just one of so many. But to our family, it means everything.

"The poppy reminds us that even in the darkest soil, beauty can grow. That from conflict, peace can bloom. And from the bravery of those who served, we inherit not only freedom but a responsibility to remember".

Thank you for allowing me to honour Grandad – Warrant Officer Kenneth Kemble Kemp D.F.C. Thank you to all who have served and who continue to serve.

Lest we forget.

So, let us hope that At roll call today,





"We didn't know Beth was struggling; if we had, we certainly would have sought help for her, so we want people to know that there are people who care and will listen to you when you reach out."

Since its inception in New South Wales 10 years ago,

Beyond Bitumen has been life-changing for many.

"Rally participants have told us how much the camaraderie within the event has meant to them and given them something to look forward to, and we hope to replicate this in Victoria," said Peter Fehon, who emphasises the importance of the event's accessibility and inclusivity.

For Everyone

"We want this event to be welcoming for everyone, which is why we say, 'Come as you are in your family car'. You don't need a rally car or a 4WD – a regular car is more than enough to join in."

Peter Fehon said the rally is also an opportunity to support local communities in the areas they visit.

"We know local communities in some of the regions we'll be visiting have struggled as a result of bushfires, floods and droughts in recent times, we want to show them our support.

"We stay in local motels and local community groups will be catering for us. It's about giving back."

Since its inception in 2015, Beyond Bitumen has raised \$4.5 million for Beyond Blue. Funds go towards running the Beyond Blue Support Service,

providing free 24/7 mental health support to people across Australia.

Beyond Blue CEO Georgie Harman said she is deeply grateful for the Fehon's efforts.

New Chapter

"For a decade, Trish and Peter's dedication has transformed lives, ensuring people have access to critical support. The Victorian rally adds a new chapter to their incredible story, highlighting the importance of acting early to get on top of poor mental health, so you can bounce back quicker."

"The money raised through Beyond Bitumen goes towards Beyond Blue's Support Service, which is staffed by mental health professionals who are there for anyone who needs to talk, at any time. Every dollar can really help to turn someone's life around," Ms Harman said.

Amy Speaks on Winter Pruning

At the April meeting of Wycheeproof Probus, Amy Turnbull from Amy's Buds and Blooms gave an informative and entertaining talk about her new business and a detailed report on winter pruning.

All members were aware that Amy had taken on the large task of establishing a new gardening and supply business in Wycheeproof, and were most impressed by having such an enterprising person in their midst.

Her talk commenced with an explanation of why we should prune – to remove dead and diseased limbs, promote new growth and increase air flow and light. Most deciduous plants benefit from a big prune in winter, including fruit trees, roses and many ornamentals like crepe myrtle and ornamental pears.




With a very cool start to the day the Under-12 team started out strongly regardless. Luckily the team has a few members stepping up from minkey, already warmed up and ready to get going.
