Hundreds Converge On BCG's Main Field Day

More than 500 farmers, advisers and industry representatives converged on BCG's Main Research Site on the Sunraysia Highway, Birchip, for the 2025 Main Field Day.

A highlight of the day was the acknowledgement of the Hunt family, with Bronwyn and Geoff Hunt inducted as BCG life members, and their son Dr. James Hunt presented with the prestigious Harm Van Rees Award by Harm himself.

The honours were warmly applauded by the large crowd, recognising the family's long-standing contribution to agriculture and the Birchip Cropping Group.

The event also featured insights from host farmer and agronomist Spencer Weir, who spoke on behalf of his family in the warmth of the marquee. Spencer an-

swered questions from BCG chairman John Ferrier on the paddock history and more generally on the Weir farming enterprise, including their decision to transition from fine wool Merino sheep to continuous cropping.

"It is great to see the trials and results in your own back yard, including the soil pit, which has provided some great insight and learnings for us," Spencer told the crowd.

"It's also been good to give back to BCG and support all the great work they are doing, both in research and in bringing people to the community."

Alongside the recognition and reflections, the day showcased hands-on trial tours, expert presentations, and discussions on disease control, herbicide innovation, yield optimisation and soil management.

Attendees also enjoyed a delicious hot lunch prepared and served by Mrs. Kristy Knights and Year 9 and 10 students from Birchip P-12 School, while making the most of the many networking opportunities and the trade stalls set up around the gathering area.

Vehicle theft: Between 2 p.m. on Monday the 1st of September and 10 a.m. the following day, it is alleged that offenders have attended a property in Cullen Street, Kerang. A 2001 silver Toyota Landcruiser wagon has been stolen from the address.

Theft from motor vehicle: Between 10 a.m. on Thursday the 4th of September and 3 p.m. the following day, it is alleged that a number plate was stolen from a vehicle parked in Horace Street, Sea Lake. The offenders appear to have also gained entry to the vehicle, rummaging through compartments. At about 3.30 a.m. on Friday the 5th, it is alleged that a number plate was also stolen from a vehicle parked in Mudge Street, Sea Lake.

Swan Hill

Vehicle theft: At about 4.30 a.m. on Monday the 1st of September, it is alleged offenders have attended a carpark off High Street, Swan Hill. They have smashed the window of a 2024 white Toyota Rav4. They have then accessed a second Rav4 (2020 model) and stolen it, direction of travel unknown.

Vehicle theft: At about 11 a.m. on Friday the 5th of September, it is alleged a red Ford ute was stolen from a carpark in Beveridge Street, Swan Hill. Police observed the vehicle, which still hadn't been reported as stolen, being driven along the Murray Valley Highway, just south of Swan Hill. Police attempted to intercept the vehicle for a routine check, at which time it is alleged that the utility attempted to overtake a turning vehicle, colliding with the driver's door. Both vehicles left the roadway, with the occupants of the stolen vehicle fleeing the scene on foot. Several Police units responded, resulting in two 18-year-old males being arrested. One of the males was remanded in custody to appear in court on Monday. The male passenger was charged and bailed on a number of offences and will appear in the Magistrates Court at a later date. The driver of the second vehicle was assisted from the vehicle by the Swan Hill SES, due to damage to the driver's door and taken to hospital for assessment where she was later cleared by medical staff.

R U OK? Day

Dear Editor.— Thursday, September 11, marks R U OK? Day – an important reminder to check in with friends, family, colleagues, and neighbours. While it's an important day to raise awareness, the message is clear: Asking someone "Are you OK?" can make a real difference every day of the year.

Mental health and suicide are issues that have touched so many, and I feel deeply connected to this cause. Through my own lived experience, I know how much a simple question and genuine conversation can literally save a life.

Mental health pressures affect our entire community. Households are feeling the strain of rising energy bills, groceries, rent, and new taxes, while farmers manage the ongoing challenges of their seasons and livelihoods. Life can be tough, and the struggles people face aren't always visible.

It's ok to not be OK. It's also ok to be honest when someone asks if you are.

Research shows that people who are regularly asked how they're going report improved wellbeing, and nine in ten Australians feel supported when someone genuinely asks. Even a simple conversation can help someone feel less alone. A caring question from a friend, neighbour, or family member can be a lifeline.

There are many services available, not only for those experiencing difficulty, but also for those who want to help and support someone in need, including our own Lifeline Sunraysia call centre.

Dementia Week

Dear Editor.— With an estimated 433,300 Australians living with dementia and 1.7 million people involved in their care, chances are you know someone who is impacted by dementia.

My mum was diagnosed with dementia about a year after she moved into the Goodwin Village. As a nurse, hearing her diagnosis was devastating. I was living in Queensland at the time and Covid meant I was unable to visit for long stretches. When the borders opened I realised that I was losing, not just little pieces, but chunks of my mum with each visit. I decided to move back to Donald, and it was one of the best decisions I've made. I got to spend the last 18 months of my mum's life seeing her on most days.

Being on the journey of dementia with my mum was hard, painful, but incredibly rewarding. I saw my regular visits having an impact on her. But I also realised that they had an impact on me, as I learnt to just be present with her. We didn't have to talk and most of our time together was walking around the Goodwin Village gardens as I recited Psalm 23, or played songs that she'd sing along to.

Next week is Dementia Action Week. In recognition of this, Goodwin Village is having an open morning tea.


This change of venue will be something the committee will handle with the support of the Park Committee.

A Celebration of Sport, Community and Youth

Country sport is built on contributions, camaraderie and commitment and this weekend the Birchip-Watchem community will celebrate all three.

On Sunday at the Birchip Community Leisure Centre the Birchip Watchem junior and senior netball, hockey and football clubs will commemorate the 2025 season, which culminates on Saturday with five Birchip Watchem teams across the three codes playing in grand finals.

The day will begin with junior vote counts and presentations from 10 a.m., followed by a free two course luncheon featuring hot meat and a smorgasbord of salads and desserts served between 12 and 1 p.m..

Lunch packs with chips and nuggets and ice cream will be available on the balcony for the younger children, supported by a Look Over the Farm Gate grant provided by Agriculture Victoria under the Victorian Government's 2025 Drought Support Package.

Children's Entertainment
After lunch, young people will be able to enjoy entertainment on the oval, with a bouncy castle, rock climbing wall and cha cha, while the adult players, parents and volunteers can remain in the Leisure Centre for the senior vote counts and presentation of awards.

More than just an activity to keep children occupied, the entertainment is a thank you to acknowledge the vital role

young people play in community sport and the countless hours they and their families give throughout the season.

Partnership

The rides will be provided free through a partnership between the Birchip Neighbourhood House and the Birchip-Watchem netball, hockey and football clubs, with funding being provided by the Bulls' joint catering committee, National Centre for Farmer Health "Look Over the Farm Gate", the Neighbourhood House's LDAT and Amplify programs and the State Government's Youth Fest funding.

Manager of the Birchip Neighbourhood House, Simone Christie, said: "The partnership reflects our organisation's commitment to supporting young people to be actively engaged in their community, while also giving parents and volunteers a chance to relax and enjoy the afternoon with their compatriots.

"The Australian Drug Foundation LDAT program works to build protective factors for young people and reduce the risks associated with alcohol and drug use, while Amplify gives young people opportunities to lead creative, inclusive activities in their community, so it is great

opportunity to combine these initiatives with the efforts of the local sporting clubs".

Research shows that while alcohol can sometimes be normalised in sporting environments, community sport itself is a powerful protective factor. By engaging multiple generations together, it builds belonging, provides positive role models, and gives young people purposeful activity that reduces the risk of alcohol misuse.

Youth Fest

September is also Youth Fest, a Victorian Government initiative held every September to celebrate and support young people across the state, making it the perfect opportunity to highlight the importance of their involvement in sport and volunteering, by providing them with some fun activities they wouldn't normally have access to in rural communities.

These programs and community partnerships underline the importance of recognising and celebrating the efforts of young people, not only on the sporting field but also as active, valued members of the community.

Community members of all ages are encouraged to attend, but children must be accompanied by an adult.

Call to Give Farmers Interest Free Loans

Farmers' drought relief still hanging as Labor Government dithers on investment review.

This week's Drought Forum in Gawler, South Australia, has only reiterated the need to restore the former Coalition Government's initiative to give farmers interest free loans, Member for Mallee, Dr Anne Webster said on Wednesday.

"Farmers at the Drought Forum are crying out for action and outcomes, not just more talkfests, and I am hearing similar from farmers across Mallee" Dr Webster said.

"Drought conditions have been a major setback for Mallee and Wimmera farmers and I note Australian Dairy Farmers are reiterating our calls for interest free loans for a minimum of two years. Why is Labor hosting drought forums, but then not giving farmers what they are asking for?"

Two-Year Period

In 2020 the Coalition introduced a two-year interest-free period for loans up to \$2 million through the Regional Investment Corporation (RIC)

for farmers experiencing drought hardship.

The Coalition established the RIC in 2018 to support farmers and help them grow and diversify. It is important legacy funding, to support farmers through drought hardship.

The zero per cent interest rate applied to new and existing drought loans under the RIC, and enabled farm families to refinance existing debt from commercial lenders, to save on cashflow and give them time to restock and replant.

The measure helped farmers from going bankrupt.

Meanwhile farmers are waiting for the Albanese Labor Government to respond to a formal review into the RIC. The review began in November 2023 and a report was published 13½ months ago, but the Government has not published its full response.

"While the Minister stated the Government's response to

the RIC review will be released late this year, for many, that may be too late," said Dr. Webster.

"Farmers complained to me this week that the RIC criteria is time consuming and restrictive, serving as a disincentive to access RIC – so much so, that farmers end up getting a quicker and better deal from their bank.

"I am very concerned that Labor's mismanagement has meant RIC funding has not all been allocated in the recent reporting year – during drought conditions – and that RIC is not valued by the current Government like it was by the Coalition."

\$13 Million Machete Bins Fiasco Slammed

The Nationals' Member for Mildura, Jade Benham, has slammed the Allan Labor Government for wasting \$13 million on 45 "machete bins" across Victoria in a misguided attempt to reduce violent crime.

"Forty-five bins will be rolled out across Victoria at nearly \$290,000 each, alongside a public awareness campaign that runs for just three months," Ms Benham said.

"Crime is escalating, Victorians are worried, and yet Labor has chosen to spend millions on a scheme that won't stop criminals."

Ms Benham said Labor's priorities are completely out of touch.

"Victoria Police are critically underfunded. More than 1,100 frontline positions remain unfilled, mental health support services have been slashed, and regional courts are struggling to operate.

"In Mildura, the bin is so poorly placed it's actually hidden behind a pillar, and

we're told some bins were even allegedly constructed through the prison system, outside of Victoria. The government needs to answer the question: Where has this \$13 million gone? We want itemised costings and invoices.

"This is taxpayers' money, and Victorians deserve to know why the bill is so high."

Ms Benham said this wasteful program is a perfect example of misplaced priorities.

"This is exactly what happens when governments lose touch with the real issues facing Victorians. Regional communities do not have a machete problem. They have a law-and-order problem caused by insufficient police, under-resourced courts, and a

government that fails to back our frontline officers.

"Instead of gimmicks, Victorians need proper investment in policing and community safety. The Liberals and Nationals will back our police, fill frontline vacancies, restore services, and make sure dangerous offenders face justice."



New Blood Helps CFA to Impressive Tally

CFA members from across the state have saved around 2,877 lives by making more than 950 donations during this year's Emergency Services Blood Drive.

Team CFA's contributions included more than 590 plasma, 330 whole blood and 30 platelet donations between June 1, and August 31, 2025.

Notably, there were 19 first time donors this year.

One of those donors was Mernda Fire Brigade member Stephanie Tamer, one of four members from her brigade to make their first donation.

Stephanie said donating plasma was an easy way to make a big difference.

"For me, it's just about being able to help someone," she said.

"We do much harder things to help people in our role as a CFA volunteer, so sitting down to give blood felt like such an easy way to make a difference for someone who might need it."

Simple Process

Stephanie said the process

was simple and supported every step of the way.

"The lifeblood team was fantastic. We had someone co-ordinating for our area and making sure we were organised, and both donation locations, Bundoora and Eltham, were lovely," she said.

Stephanie's already encouraging her fellow brigade members to get involved next year.

"I've been encouraging everyone in my brigade to give it a go. Anyone who has the capacity to donate should; you can't put into words how important it is," Stephanie said.

As for whether she'll return to the donor chair... "Absolutely, I'll be back. If you can do it as often as you're eligible, you should. It only takes about 10 minutes and it's such an easy way to help others."

Third Place

CFA finished the national challenge in a strong third place overall, behind only NSW and Victoria Police.

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan, who also donated, said volunteers are always willing to go above and beyond.

"Our volunteers selflessly give up their time every day to help others, so it's great to see our members continuing to get behind this vital initiative," Jason said.

"I encourage our members and the broader community to continue to give blood all year round when they can."

New Leader and Format for St. Arnaud Playgroup

St Arnaud playgroup will resume next month with a refreshed program, led by a new facilitator with extensive early years' experience.

The playgroup, launched by Northern Grampians Shire Council earlier this year, has been on hiatus for term three.

It will resume on Monday, October 6, at St Arnaud Early Learning Centre and run for the school term.

The playgroup has a new time slot, moving from a morning session to an afternoon session, between 1.30 p.m. and 3 p.m.

Mayor Karen Hyslop said she encouraged St Arnaud and district families to make the most of the shire's playgroup program.

"Our playgroup leaders have revamped the St Arnaud program, which now caters for children up to school age instead of being aimed at babies and crawlers," she said.

Wide Range

"Playgroups offer a wide range of benefits for parents as well as children, including opportunities for social connection between people in similar stages of life. They aim to remove barriers associated with leaving the house with young children, by offering a supportive environment with an experienced facilitator on hand."

Lisa Gillard, who spent 25 years working in early years roles in the UK, Northern Territory and Victoria, has been appointed St Arnaud playgroup facilitator.

Mrs Gillard first experienced playgroup as a mother of three young children and went on to work for Playgroup Victoria as a rural playgroup development consultant.

For three years she supported existing playgroups in

the Grampians and Wimmera, hosted pop-up sessions during Playgroup Library Week, worked with playgroups to host events during Children's Week and supported the creation of new playgroups.

At the end of the funded project, Mrs Gillard stepped in to run Playgroup Victoria's Rural Transition Playgroups Project.

"During this second project I worked directly with community members to start up new playgroups with the aim of actually transitioning myself out of the playgroup, as the parents now had capacity and skills to run these playgroups themselves. That was extremely rewarding," she said.

Role Models

"Parents are always children's first teachers and role models. I see my role as a playgroup facilitator as supporting that work by sharing my knowledge in the playgroup setting in a fun and relaxing environment."

"I do this in various ways, but my favourite is through play, singing and sharing stories through books and imagination."

"I'm excited to be stepping back into playgroups with Northern Grampians Shire Council and I'm looking forward to working with families in the shire, as well as our great playgroup team, to bring the annual Children's Week events to St Arnaud and Stawell later in the year."

People can follow Northern Grampians Shire Council on Facebook and Instagram for updates about Children's

Week, which runs from October 18 to 26.

New Faces

Cr Hyslop said "new faces" were welcome at all playgroups in the municipality.

"Our council playgroup leaders also work collaboratively with community playgroups throughout the shire, which families can attend on different days," she said.

"Our Maternal and Child Health team also plays a role at council-run playgroups and attend sessions to talk about topics such as feeding, sleeping and dental health. This means if new mums did not attend the more formal mothers group program, they are still receiving some of the same information."

Cr Hyslop said playgroup facilitators could also offer independent support for families.

In-home Support

"They can actually provide in-home support to anyone who may need an extra hand navigating situations such as challenging child behaviour or families navigating the changes that come with going from one child to two," she said.

"They focus on building parents' confidence and providing support that is less formal than seeing a GP or mental health practitioner."

Call to Guarantee Future Egg Supply

In light of Coles' decision to delay the phase-out of caged eggs until 2030, citing bird 'flu related supply issues, the Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) is calling on retailers and the government to take a realistic approach to guarantee the future supply of eggs for consumers.

VFF Egg Group president Brian Ahmed said recent outbreaks have highlighted the need for all three farming systems (caged, barn and free range) to be maintaining food security and food affordability for all Australian families.

"The harsh reality is recent bird 'flu outbreaks decimated egg supplies across the country and it won't be for the last time. Our biosecurity safety net is good, but due to the nature of migrating wild birds, we can't stop everything."

"In times of bird 'flu outbreaks, caged egg systems are vital to ensuring a reliable supply of eggs across Australia. A phase-out of caged eggs only accelerates the uncertainty for farmers, disrupts supplies, and puts massive

pressure on food affordability for consumers.

"We encourage retailers and policymakers to work closely with farmers to ensure that animal welfare standards improve, without compromising farm viability or consumer access to affordable eggs."

Mr Ahmed also called on farmers and domestic chicken

owners to remain vigilant as we enter the peak migratory bird season, which traditionally heightens the risk of diseases entering the country.

"Migratory birds from all over the world begin arriving en-masse during spring, which increases the risk of foreign diseases such as bird 'flu landing on our shores," he said.

"We've seen how damaging bird 'flu can be and I'm encouraging everyone to have a biosecurity plan in place and alert authorities if your birds become sick."

"Biosecurity is a shared responsibility between everyone and is a vital defence to protect both our industry and the natural environment."

“Cayley” and “Bailey” Lead the Way

Over four days Lead the Way ran three different programs at Donald High School.

Denise brought with her Cayley and Bailey and it was hard to pick a favourite.

Happy Paws

Eight sessions were run over 4 days. The Happy Paws was the small group program which consisted of eight students from Year 7, 8 and 9. As part of this program students created an artwork with Cayley or Bailey.

Happy Paws is a wellbeing group designed to help students improve their skills in managing stress, anxiety, and worry, and to build confidence working with others. Students learned about how to create a happy healthy life by learning the life lessons of dogs.

Denise guided the students through dog-led experiences, each linked to key wellbeing skills, including play, relaxation, dog-training, and developing an obedience/agility routine.

Friendly Paws

Twenty-two students from Year 7, 8 and 9 were involved in this program.

Friendly Paws is a wellbeing session designed to enhance engagement, acceptance and inclusion. Students met with Cayley and Bailey in small groups and developed an understanding of each dog's different personality, strengths, preferences, learning style, and family situation.

After meeting the dogs, students worked together to create fun activities with the dogs that matched the dogs' skills and abilities.

Peaceful Paws

This program is aimed at the older students and included 19 students from Year 10, 11 and 12.

Peaceful Paws is a wellbeing session designed to support students with managing stress through interactions

with therapy dogs. Students observed the unique ways that dogs manage physical and mental stress via “life lessons of dogs” such as living in the moment or “shaking it off”.





Stage Set for Hockey Grand Finals

Mr. T. P. Howley, of Port Fairy, paid a visit to Birchip last week and renewed acquaintances with this many Birchip and district friends who were pleased to see him looking so well. Mr. Howley was Postmaster here for several years and was transferred to Port Fairy about three years ago.

Birchip's first S. M.

Mr. T. Cotter, Birchip's first stationmaster, paid a visit to Birchip last week after an absence of 27 years. In the course of an interview Mr. Cotter said he opened the local station here for about five years. During that period Birchip was the terminus to which long tiresome journeys were made in order to catch the train for the city. In those days the S. M.'s practically made their own regulations and a rather crude state of affairs existed. Railway officials were a veritable law unto themselves and the things they did then would speedily earn them their dismissal if perpetuated in the present advanced era.

Mr. Cotter remarked that there was no railway platform during his stay here and all the buildings were portable ones, including the post office, which was dumped behind three other railway buildings. There was only one hotel (the Birchip), three stores, two banks, and a few private houses. Ten years after his arrival Birchip created a shire and a shire office, which

now stands near where the Birchip Hotel was erected.

Mr. Cotter expressed pleasure and surprise at the progress of the town and district since he left. He asked after a number of early settlers including Messrs. Lockwood, Barber Bros., N. McDonald, W. J. Stevens and J. Phelps.

Since retiring from the Department last year, Mr. Cotter has spent six months in Suva on a visit to his son, Robert.

Mr. Cotter worked his way to the top of the tree in the Railways Department and was S. M. at Spencer Street when he resigned.

Bulls Reserves Book Grand Final Berth

The Birchip-Watchem reserves earned redemption on Saturday, defeating Boort, which in round 13 had cost them second spot, forcing them to go the long way round.

However, after two impressive finals performances they have now booked a place in the North Central reserves grand final, the Bulls' first at this level since 2008.

In front of a large parochial crowd on the hill and under the yellow hue of the R U OK? Conversation Convoy, Boort captain Jordan Sheahan won the toss and elected to kick with the wind.

With Fraser Millar prominent, Boort was controlling territory, but could only manage one behind for its efforts. Addis then intercepted across half-back, and combined with Riley Hogan to swing momentum. Ty Colbert's pressure forced a turnover and his neat pass found Connor Lee for the Bulls' opener.

Stefan Pye was influential at both ends; bursting from the centre, he linked with Joe Reid and finished the passage himself for Birchip-

Watchem's second. Boort steadied late and following a free kick and 50 metre penalty Jack Baker slotted its first and at quarter-time the Bulls led 2.2 (14) to 1.3 (9).

Bulls coaches Jake Noonan and Matt Ryan urged their side to keep up their good work and use the breeze to their advantage in the second term.

The second quarter was tight and scrappy along the town side boundary, but the Bulls gradually took control. Hogan intercepted a kick in and fed Reid, who, getting more involved as the game progressed, snapped truly.

Jack Lee drove the ball forward from the next centre bounce, though only a behind resulted. At the other end, Matthew Rickard clunked important defensive marks, while Ben Edelsten was solid as the Bulls repeatedly repelled.

The Colbert brothers combined and Bodie's skidding kick took an awkward bounce and went through for a handy goal. Boort pressed via Patrick O'Rourke, Baker and Cameron Ross, but managed only a solitary behind for the quarter and Birchip-Watchem turned for home three straight goals ahead at the long break.

Boort coaches James Byrne and Will Perryman demanded greater pressure and work rate, and the Magpies responded. Setting up with a spare forward and moving the ball quickly from stoppages, Harry Weaver snapped their first major of the third stanza.

Millar and O'Rourke kept the surge going but three consecutive behinds blunted the comeback. Under fire, Birchip-Watchem struggled to clear cleanly, with many balls going out on the full. Lindeback remained composed as play swung to the grandstand side.

Against the run, Ty Colbert and Callum Goode combined to find Riley Hogan, who steadied and kicked a goal that stung the Magpies. From the restart they got a quick centre clearance and a goal which had them back within two goals.

The ball pinged from end to end with O'Rourke and Millar busy, while Connor Lee and Riley Hogan stuck their tackles, and Tyson Wiantara was clever inside 50. On the siren, Jack Lee spun out of a tackle and got the ball to Riley Hogan, who booted to restore the Bulls' buffer, and at the final change the Bulls were ahead 6.5 (41) to Boort 3.7 (25).

Sensing the end line and the enormity of the result, the Bulls won the centre clearance to open the last and scored early, albeit a behind. The game became a series of rebounds in the grandstand pocket until Connor Lee laced out Matt Berry, who, back from injury, was delighted to rejoin the goal kicking list.

Boort refused to go away, converting a free kick before Ross lifted in the midfield and Willem Toose snapped truly to keep them in contention. The Bulls' defence, led by the sure hands of Rickard and the resolute James Lindeback, held firm and launched counter attacks.

Wiantara's speed got the ball into space and Ty Colbert ran on to the bouncing ball and finish smartly, giving Birchip-Watchem breathing space.

The experience of the Bulls came to the fore with their ex-senior players remaining composed and hold-







Lions Hunt Crowning Glory, As Bulls Seek Redemption

Premiership glory, the ultimate reward in any team sport, awaits Calder United and Birchip-Watchem tomorrow at Wedderburn, when they clash in North-Central football's 2025 grand final.

It promises to be a battle for supremacy worthy of a season defining clash between the competition's two best combinations.

The Lions have the rare opportunity to savour success in their first season, a tribute to the reconciliation achieved between two communities with fierce sporting rivalries.

The Bulls' focus is in reversing the result of their second semi-final loss to the Lions, the only combination to defeat them this season.

On review, it was only a brilliant first quarter at Boort by Calder United that brought about Birchip-Watchem's undoing.

During last Saturday's preliminary final, apart from one or two brief periods, the Bulls imposed their physical dominance over the Tigers, the previous game no doubt serving as a wake-up call.

Grand final day will be a very special occasion for North-Central's newest club, Calder United, an amalgamation of Nullawil and Wyche-proof-Narraport.

The Lions have nine teams engaged in grand finals – two football, three hockey and four netball, out of a possible 15 – a remarkable achievement by any standards.

And Calder United served notice, via its 30-minutes of brilliance, that it has all the at-

tributes needed to finish its first season as North-Central's premiership team.

But that victory also served to provide the Bulls with the jolt needed to remove any complacency that may have set in after 16 consecutive victories, and reminded Ash Connick's charges that the biggest challenge of their season has arrived.

The return from injury of Nic Rippon has added a harder edge to Birchip-Watchem's attack that already features Ben Edwards, Rhona Conboy and Tom Gibson. And with Joe Reid also successfully completing a comeback via the reserves' preliminary final, the Bulls will have almost a full list from which to select their senior and reserves combinations.

A fortnight ago, Mitch Farmer ensured Calder United got off to a flyer with 3 quick goals. Dale Pearce also loomed large, supreme in the aerial duels, as the Lions dominated scoring in the first half. The potential return from injury of Jack Exell would add another scoring weapon to an already potent attack.

Defence will play a pivotal role in tomorrow's clash, and both combinations are well served in this crucial area.

A fortnight ago, Lions defenders, including Oscar Madden, Boe Bish, Daniel

Watts and Dane McLennan, were able to keep a tight rein on the Bulls' key forwards. The possible return of Josh Walsh from an ankle injury would further strengthen what is a very resilient combination.

Last Saturday's dominance by Birchip-Watchem's defence over the Tigers, led by Ben Lakin, Ben Hogan (who produced possibly the best performance of his career), Angus Butterfield and Dale Hinkley, indicated very clearly that any lethargy from three relatively easy home-and-away lead up games and a week's rest had been replaced by the hard-nosed approach that contributed to the Bulls being the most frugal in the competition in terms of conceding opposition scores.

Calder United spearhead Pearce will again be a major challenge for the Bulls through his ability to mark incoming footballs at their highest point. His influence could be match defining, particularly if his midfielders, including Matt Wade, Steven Kennedy, Zane Keighran, the versatile Jordy Humphreys, Koby Hommelhoff and Kobe Lloyd, can control the flow of the game.

Their battle with Birchip-Watchem's ultra-impressive engine room that includes Daniel Bell, Marshall Rippon, Charlie Frank, Meyrick Buchanan, Sam Simmons, Jacob Christie and blonde-headed dasher Austin Dean, promises to be a rolling and relentless struggle for supremacy.

The ruck wrestle between Calder United's Dean Putt and Birchip-Watchem's Hamish

Hosking (these two giants no longer run at each other at centre bounces . . . they lock arms and grapple for best position), will be one of the most pivotal one-on-one battles of the overall contest.

Hosking was hampered by a leg injury last weekend, but continued to make his presence felt, and his influence around the ground will be telling.

Lions' coach Daryl Wilson showed part of his carefully constructed hand of cards a fortnight ago, but will have numerous strategies in place to combat opposition coach Ash Connick's equally considered game plan.

From a tactical perspective, the off-field contest between two very experienced coaches will add an element of intrigue to one of the most eagerly awaited clashes of the season.

Both teams are as well prepared as they can be, with the bounce of the ball being one of the very few things they cannot control.

A Calder United victory would strengthen the bonds of matrimony between Nullawil and Wyche-proof-Narraport, each with an incredible record of premiership success. It is a union that now looks capable of forging a footballing dynasty that can launch its own significant record of achievement.

If Birchip-Watchem wins, it will be the crowning glory of a very impressive season. It will also the realisation of the potential that has promised so much since the Bulls' last premiership, but so far has failed to materialise.

Scratcher's Lament: "You

never pick us" is the regular opening comment to this scribe from one of Calder United's most passionate supporters. Pre-empting any conversation tomorrow, if the Lions can reproduce their opening quarter burst of a fortnight ago (some of the best country football any unbiased spectator could wish to see), they can get the jump on the Bulls and will be almost impossible to run down. They just need to maintain the rage over four quarters.

Should Birchip-Watchem hit the ground running, however, the Bulls' momentum generated last Saturday, combined with the return of Nic Rippon, might give them a match winning edge.

Reserves' Reflection

In many ways, tomorrow's reserves grand final between Calder United and Birchip-Watchem is almost a mirror image of the senior game, the only difference being that it was the Bulls who inflicted the Lions' only defeat this season.

Calder United, due to an abundance of players with plenty of senior experience, has been the benchmark of reserves football all season, with players of the calibre of Joel Turner, Brent Barker, Billy and Angus Forrester, Tom Trewin, Spencer Allan, Rylie Botheras and Cody Green putting the Lions in a strong position to take out the premiership, potentially the new club's first ever football crown.

Birchip-Watchem has worked its way into premiership contention via two im-

pressive finals performances, and might be generating the necessary momentum needed to thwart its opposition's end goal.

Stefan Pye, James Lindeback, Callum Goode, Matt Berry and George Addis provide plenty of physical strength, while the young legs of Riley Hogan, Ty and Bodie Colbert and Connor Lee generate the pace needed to put enormous pressure on the Lions' defence.

The presence of Joe Reid, depending on how coaches Matt Ryan and Jake Noonan look to shape their final line up after the senior team has been selected, could add further weight to the Bulls' chances of success.
