Charlton College Tops Regional High Schools

Charlton College has been listed as the top regional school for Victoria in the “Herald Sun” newspaper’s Top 100 Public High Schools, having ranked eighth in the whole state.

Each year, “The Herald Sun” publishes its “Top 100 Public High Schools” list, a ranking that has gained considerable attention among students, parents, and educators in Victoria.

Drawing on a range of data sources, particularly academic performance metrics, the list aims to identify and celebrate government-run

schools that demonstrate excellence in education.

While these rankings provide valuable insight to school performance, they also raise important questions about what constitutes a “top” school and how such judgments are formed.

The list does not rely on academic results alone. It frequently takes into account socio-educational advantage,

a factor that measures the relative socio-economic status of a school’s student population.

This metric helps contextualise academic results by recognising that schools in more disadvantaged areas may face greater challenges. By including this information, the list acknowledges that academic performance is not the sole reflection of a school’s effectiveness or the

efforts of its teachers and students.

In an article in the “Herald Sun”, journalist Rebecca Borg wrote that Victoria’s country students are making their mark at the highest level, with rural and remote schools seizing more than a fifth of the spots in the top 100.

While Charlton ranked the highest regional school, listed as eighth out of one hundred (and only headed by metropolitan schools), other institutions included Wycheproof P-12, ranked at number

25; Boort, 85; and Donald High School, 94.

Charlton College has only 132 students attend from Prep to Year 12, and it also has the lowest fees of any institution in the top 10 list, with an extraordinary student to teacher ratio.

Acting principal at Charlton College, Craig Kelly, said “We’re really proud to see our school ranked so high on the list. It’s a real reflection of the hard work everyone puts in – students, teachers, and the whole community. This

shows we’re heading in the right direction, and we’ll keep doing our best to make sure every student has the support and opportunities they need to succeed”.

Sharee, a Bulls Member for Life

Stephanie Coffey, secretary of the Birchip-Watchem Football Club had the privilege of awarding Life Membership to Sharee Dobson at the club’s vote count and presentation day on Sunday.

“This recognition is not given lightly. It is reserved for those whose service, commitment and contribution to our club has been nothing short of exceptional,” said Stephanie.

“It is reserved for those whose name has become synonymous with the purple, green and white, whose efforts have shaped the very fabric of who we are.”

Sharee’s dedication, hard work and passion for the Birchip-Watchem Football Club has been one of consistency, reliability, and selfless dedication.

Sharee began her formal involvement with the Birchip Football Club when her son Derek started playing under-14s in 1994. As a parent of a player she undertook the usual rostered roles of time-keeper and goal umpire.

At the same time, she was heavily involved in the Birchip-Watchem Hockey Club as a premierships player, junior coach, committee member and “B” grade badged umpire.

Formal Roles

In 1999, Sharee began 25 consecutive years of formal roles within the Birchip-Watchem Football Club when she was elected secretary of the junior committee. Her chief role in this position was to be team manager of what was then under-14s and under-16s. This role included submitting team sheets, handing out vote cards, collating votes for weekly awards and organising sponsors for weekly awards. Sharee was junior secretary for Birchip-Watchem’s 2000 under-16s premierships.

For eleven years Sharee was secretary of the BWFC Ladies’ Committee. As part of this role, she undertook the huge responsibility of co-ordinating Thursday night dinners on a weekly basis. This was before the days of Thursday night teas being shared with other community groups, so once you put your hand up you were locked in to cooking every week. Sharee co-ordinated orders from wholesalers and supermarkets on a weekly

basis and was in the kitchen every Thursday night cooking and co-ordinating the kitchen crew. On some of her years on the Ladies’ Committee Sharee also coordinated orders and rosters for Saturday night teas and the canteen.

In 2005, Sharee’s son Derek finished his playing career with the Bulls, having settled at university and a new football club in Ballarat. For many empty nesters, having children no longer involved with the club would mean they were freed of their volunteer roles. For Sharee, if anything, she ramped up her involvement.

Sports Trainer

In 2009, Sharee began her role as a sports trainer for the football club. Throughout 15 years in the role, Sharee kept up to date with all relevant certificates (and ensured other trainers were, too). Sharee was regularly present for all four football matches on game days plus training days when required during both pre-season and the season proper.

The selection of drinks she would prepare for pre-season training was a sight to behold. Both powerade and water were available in big Daddy Cools, all freshly iced and available in players' choice of cups or drinkers. Ziplock bags of mineral bath salts were ready for any player to take home if they wanted or simply a recommendation and reminder of the powers or Radox.

Jumpers

During pre-season Sharee also helped with the inventory of footy jumpers, ensuring all numbers and sizes were checked off before the season began, chucking out the jumpers that needed binning and ensuring we knew which new ones we had to order.

Sharee was diligent with overseeing the treatment of injured players and regularly followed up with players during the week to check on their progress. Sharee would pack the trailer for away games and ensure the trainers' room was organised and well stocked.

Last to Leave

Sharee was frequently the last to leave the changerooms after a game on Saturdays, ensuring they were left neat and tidy and that lost property was collected. Birchip-Watchem never get any complaints about how their rooms are left

after an away game and that is largely due to Sharee's time spent picking up lost property, drink containers and rubbish.

Sharee would ensure any lost property was returned to its home rooms and a post went on Facebook as to what was left behind. If ever anyone had a question about lost property, Sharee was the first person they needed to ask.

On game day Sharee was also a frequent go-to person for boundary umpires and waterboys to get their required uniform and supplies and helped players source uniforms when required.

Sharee had a vast array of fruit cut up and at the ready for players throughout the day and was delighted to take over the ordering of lollies in recent years as well. She gladly took on additional little roles as required and was the designated magnet creator for Trevor Ryan in recent years, printing name magnets for the Bulls and the opposition to go on the team boards.

Extra Curricular

Sharee was 100% committed to her role and as the years went by extracurricular activities would be available and grandchildren arrived to be visited and babysat. Regardless, it was extremely rare for Sharee to ever miss a game day. On those rare occasions, Sharee would give several weeks' notice and also provide

constant reminders in the lead up to her absence of what jobs would need to be done. Often it was not a hindrance to the players and committee at all, as Sharee would ensure there were extra trainers on deck and that all of them knew what additional roles they'd need to do.

Sundays

Sundays were big days for Sharee too, as she volunteered to wash the jumpers of many of the players. It was not uncommon for Sharee's bathtub to be filled with footy jumpers to soak off the dirt, then her washing line would be full to dry them off. These lucky players were presented with freshly washed and folded jumpers to play in the following Saturday.

It is estimated that when pre-season training, regular training and game days were all added up, Sharee would spend around 300 hours each year performing her trainer's duties.

Socially

In addition to her official roles within the club, Sharee was an active member of the club socially. Sharee was a regular attendee at Thursday night and Saturday night teas. She frequently volunteered to bartend at social events held outside the Leisure Centre and offered her house on multiple occasions to host meals at the Progressive Dinner.

Both during her time as a member of the Ladies' Committee and for many years afterwards, Sharee was always the kitchen leader for the casserole tea on Goods & Services Auction night. With players tasked with serving tea and doing dishes on these nights, there was no one better than Sharee at getting them all in line. Many past players would remember Sharee's efforts on those nights.

Off-Field

Sharee was passionate about the club off-field as well as on. She was present at every Annual General Meeting and Stephanie said, "I can certainly vouch over my time as secretary that there was rarely a general meeting where Sharee didn't catch up with me beforehand and give me a list of items she wanted discussed. If the matter was resolved to her liking I would gladly report back to her, if not, I had my excuses at the ready about why it didn't happen – or maybe I would pretend I forgot to bring it up".

Sharee loved talking about footy, whether it was the on-field selection and play or the off-field antics of the players. Many coaches will attest that Sharee would often share her thoughts with them at Thursday night training, on who should be selected and why.

"Best Club Person"

Sharee's contributions to the club saw her awarded the

prestigious "Best Club Person" award on three occasions. To put this into perspective, the Best Club Person is chosen by the footy club president from an extensive list of valuable volunteers, but three separate presidents could not look past Sharee as being the Best Club Person.

Coinciding with her work for BWFC and BWFC Ladies' Committee, Sharee was heavily involved with the Birchip-Watchem Hockey Club as a premiership player, premiership coach and committee member. Her contributions to BWFC saw her awarded life member of the club in 2019.

Although she retired from her role as a full time trainer this season, Sharee has still been involved behind the scenes. Prior to every home game, she messaged fellow trainers to let them know who the doctor on call was so that it could be written on the whiteboard in the trainers' rooms. Various other reminders have been texted through, and it was great to have her back on the sidelines for a couple of home games.

Throughout her tenure Sharee has always taken great pleasure when the players at the club procreate. It was a common sight during training for Sharee to be on the interchange bench on duty as a sports trainer, while at the same time voluntarily rocking

a couple of the footy and netball players' kids in a pram.

Sharee was happy to volunteer her services so that all players could train. It was also common at Thursday night tea to see Sharee sitting at a table with dinner in front of her and a baby in her arms.

Survival

Country sporting clubs don't survive on talent alone, they survive on people like Sharee – people willing to put in hours upon hours of work, year after year, with never a question or concern that they won't keep coming back. Sharee was never a football player, never a football coach, never on the football committee. Yet, her resume is as impressive as anyone's.

Sharee has given her heart and soul to the Birchip-Watchem football community and everyone who is and has been connected to the club is all the better for it.

The tribute that Stephanie Coffey had compiled and read out concluded with a video of good wishes and humorous anecdotes from former coaches and players, highlighting the esteem in which Sharee is held by the Birchip-Watchem community.

Sharee was greeted with a standing ovation and a large round of applause as Danny Lowry presented her with a Life Membership badge and a large caricature.

Five Hundred at BCG's Main Field Day:



• Over 500 farmers converged at BCG's Main Field Day to hear the latest research, and connect with their peers and the broader industry.

“Farming is the Art of the Possible”

BCG's Main Field Day on Wednesday, September 10, brought together more than 500 farmers and industry representatives from across north-west Victoria, with decision-making on farm at the heart of the program.

Attendees heard from leading researchers including Professor James Hunt (University of Melbourne), Professor Chris Preston (University of Adelaide), Dr James Nuttall (BCG), Dr Andrew Fletcher and Dr Greg Rebetzke (CSIRO), and Dr Grant Hollaway (Astute Ag).

Topics ranged from variety performance and nitrogen strategies through to alternative chemistries, to paraquat and using tools like BioScout to detect disease spikes.

Standout Sessions

Among the standout sessions was Dr James Nuttall's exploration of crop-soil interactions in the 20-metre soil pit, offering farmers a tangible view of how roots of wheat, barley, canola and pulses access water and nutrients, and the “Farming without paraquat” session, preparing growers for a future with restricted herbicide use. Beyond the formal presentations, networking and peer-to-peer conversations provided invaluable opportunities to

share insights and experiences.

BCG CEO Fiona Best officially opened the event, acknowledging both the challenges and opportunities of the season.

“Farmers are continually making decisions in complex environments,” she said.

“Our aim is to ensure that every decision point is supported by the right information at the right time, and that farmers feel connected to their peers and the wider research community.”

Collaboration

Chairman John Ferrier said the day reflected the strength of BCG's partnerships. “Collaboration is central to what BCG does. Bringing together world-class researchers, local knowledge, students and industry partners ensures our region is well placed to tackle challenges and embrace new opportunities.”

Local farmer Alan Bennett captured the spirit of the day on the afternoon's farmer panel, remarking, “Farming is the art of the possible, and you've got to find a solution to find a way through.”

Student Presence

This year's event also featured a strong student presence, with over 60 students from regional schools taking part in a dedicated stream facilitated by Joe Collins (BCG) and Claudia Cox (North Central LLEN).

Students explored career pathways in agriculture and engaged in an interactive trial, pulling plants from the ground to learn about crop growth stages.

Partners

BCG partnered with Agriculture Victoria, which deliv-

ered its GRDC Southern Pulse Agronomy field day alongside the Main Field Day. The North Central LLEN collaborated on the student program, while sponsors present on the day included Cloud-break Grain Marketing, GE Silos, Intergrain, WFI Insurance, Nutrien Ag Solutions, Grain Growers, RAGT, O'Connors, Balco, Action Steel and RB Sellar.

Challenges

Fiona Best summed up the sentiment of the day: “This season has presented its challenges, particularly with a dry start, but seeing farmers share knowledge, learn from researchers, and connect with peers reinforces the strength of our community.”

“Together, we're navigating rising costs, making informed decisions, and finding ways to achieve strong yields and healthy, resilient farm businesses.”

“Most Australians know someone who has been impacted by dementia. After a diagnosis, many people with dementia report losing contact with friends.

“Support can be as simple as starting conversations that foster empathy and awareness.”

Leading Cause

Dementia is the leading cause of death for Australians, according to the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare.



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
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Birchip Celebrates Youth Fest

As Government Wipes Its Hands...

Disability Housing Support Under Threat

Victoria's Minister for Disability, Lizzie Blandthorn, has refused to intervene in a stand-off that could lead to almost 2000 Victorians with profound disabilities having their supported independent living homes closed by January 1.

Shadow Minister for Disability, Ageing and Carers, Tim Bull, said it was disappointing the Minister had completely wiped her hands of being involved in resolving a funding impasse between the state and federal governments and private providers. "A large number of Victorian supported independent living homes that care for the state's most vulnerable residents face immediate closure unless this matter is resolved. The state is a key player as a provider of last resort, but the Minister is refusing to be involved," Mr Bull said.

No Negotiation

"Asked in question time if the Allan Labor Government would continue its 'transition funding' provided to keep these homes open and residents with a roof over their head until the matter is resolved, Minister Blandthorn said 'there is not a negotiation to continue that'.

"It is a disappointing commentary to hear that the Minister is point blank not prepared to entertain the state being part of the solution."

Disability workers, advocates, unions and housing providers say the situation will come to a head on January 1, when the Allan Labor Government's transition fund is cut off without the matter reaching resolution, leaving these homes unable to operate.

In 2015, the state government announced five organisations would take over Victoria's former government-run disability group homes as part of the transition to the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS).

Shortfall

NDIS funding left a shortfall in running costs for homes in Victoria, and the state agreed to transition funding to fill the gap while the matter was resolved in

line with the national framework.

This transition funding will come to an end on January 1, with federal and state Labor having been unable to resolve the matter. As a result, some of these homes have already announced closures with many more to follow.

The five providers – Aruma, Scope, Life Without Barriers, Melba Support Services and Possability – have issued a joint statement confirming that funding shortfalls will not allow them to continue current services.

Mr Bull said it disgraceful that the state and federal governments have not sorted this out by now, given they have had years to do so. He called on Ms Blandthorn to end the uncertainty facing these families and agree to be part of the solution, particularly in the short-term.

The hall was tastefully decorated with purple and gold streamers and foliage, the work of Miss A. Stephens and members. Mr W. Crutch was a most efficient MC. Prizes were awarded as follows: Most effective lady, Miss A. Liege (Valentine); Most effective

gent, Mr Stewart, (Quaker); Most original couple, Miss I. Edwards and Mr D. Smale (doctor and nurse). Best sustained character, Mr W. Crutch (professor); Special prize, Miss S. Haig (Argus); Some other costumes were:- Miss A. Larmour, Danger Signal; Miss M. Larmour, Pillar Box.

Dramatic Club: The Amateur Dramatic Club, which for the past four years had been discontinued, was reformed at a meeting held at the Mechanics' Institute. The following committee was formed: Rev. A. 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Register Your Burn-off Online: **Be Prepared!**

With Victorians across the state preparing their property for fire season, emergency services are urging landowners to register their burn-offs online, through the Fire Permits Victoria website.

Spring is a common time for landowners to take advantage of the favourable weather conditions to conduct burning off activities. However in most areas in Victoria, less than 50 per cent are registering their burn-offs online, with many unnecessarily waiting on hold to register over the phone.

The quickest and easiest way to register your burn-off is by using the Fire Permits Victoria website at www.firepermits.vic.gov.au/notify.

In some areas where the highest number of burn-offs are registered each year, such as Healesville, Olinda and Mt Evelyn in the Yarra Ranges, and Kyneton and Woodend in the Macedon Ranges, as many as 60 per cent of registrations are by phone, leading to longer wait times during busy periods.

Triple Zero Victoria Chief Operating Officer Nicole Ashworth said registering burn-offs online was fast,

easy and allowed call-takers to focus on higher priority calls.

Ideal Time

“Spring is the ideal time to prepare your property ahead of the fire danger period, which makes it one of the busiest times for people registering their burn-offs by phone,” Nicole said.

“That’s why we always urge landowners to plan ahead and save themselves some time by jumping on to the Fire Permits Victoria website and registering well in advance, especially when suitable weather conditions are forecast.”

Preferred Platform

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan said the Fire Permits Victoria website is the preferred platform for community members to register their burns.

“By registering your burn-off, it allows emergency services to verify the fire is not

an emergency before unnecessarily calling out local brigades,” Jason said.

“It also allows us to display burn-offs on the CFA website so the public can see where a burn-off is taking place, preventing needless calls to Triple Zero (000).

“Over the past year, CFA responded to nearly 900 escaped burn-offs, which utilised around 19,000 hours of our volunteers’ time. Please don’t leave your burn-off unattended and only burn-off when conditions are favourable.”

The website allows you to notify emergency services of your burn-off, and also check and apply for a permit, if necessary.

However, if your burn is taking place within the next two hours, you must register your burn via the phone line on 1800 668 511.

For more information about burning off safely, visit www.cfa.vic.gov.au/burnoff.

Make Sure

Before you notify us, make sure you:

- Follow regulations or laws by CFA and local council.
- Notify your neighbours if the burn will generate fire and smoke.

• Check the weather forecast for the day of the activity and a few days afterward.

• Postpone your activity if high fire risk conditions develop.

• Establish a gap in vegetation or fire break of no less

than three metres cleared of all flammable material.

• Have enough people to monitor, contain and extinguish the burn safely and effectively. Never leave a burn-off unattended.



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


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Charlton Golf Ladies Visit Club Barham

The meals served after Thursday night training are often described as restaurant quality, with menus that always feature a wide variety of choices. On an average Thursday, the catering committee serves around 120 adult meals and 30 children's meals, with those numbers swelling during the finals to about 150 adults and 40 children.

On behalf of the Russell family, Peter "Budgie" Russell proudly presented the award to Joshua, who said, "I hold the Russell family in high esteem, and I am chuffed to win this award."

In accepting the award, Joshua paid tribute to the cooperation and support shared across the three codes and thanked the Birchip Community Leisure Centre for its role in providing a first-class kitchen to work out of and a family friendly facility for everyone to come together.

Beyond the votes and awards, the day was about more than individual accolades. It highlighted the vital role of junior and senior


