## Wycheeproof Asks, "Why?"

**Broadway turned into a boardroom as Wycheeproof locals – business owners, customers, and yes, even a four-legged friend – were photographed gathered outside of the Bendigo Bank agency to voice their concerns regarding the recent announcement that the agency is set for closure.**

With signs raised declaring "Where is the community in Bendigo Bank?" and "WHY are you leaving us when we need YOU?", the passionate group collaborated, shared stories, and stood united; reminding all who passed by that country voices carry, and this town counts.

The community of Wycheeproof has plenty to say and wants the bank to reconsider.

The people of Wycheeproof are deeply concerned by the recent announcement that Bendigo Bank will fully close its agency in the town. This decision, made without broad

community consultation, has significant implications for residents, local businesses, and the liveability of the rural community.

### More Than An Inconvenience

For Wycheeproof, the loss of banking services is more than an inconvenience. It means:

- Elderly residents without easy transport face barriers to accessing their money.
- Local businesses managing cash takings will be forced

## Throwing Good Money After Bad

**The Nationals' Member for Mildura, Jade Benham, has criticised the State Government for wasting taxpayer money on short-term fixes at Mildura West Primary School (MWPS) instead of delivering long-overdue new classrooms.**

Ms Benham said the Government announced that \$637,433.39 would be provided to MWPS through its 2025–26 Planned Maintenance Funding program.

"That's over half a million dollars being poured into tired, outdated buildings when we should be focused on providing new, fit-for-purpose classrooms, not repairing tired, white-ant damaged classrooms," she said.

"Expert architects have recommended demolishing five classrooms, but instead an incredible amount of money is being spent just to patch them up."

"I first visited MWPS in 2023 and saw firsthand the conditions students are forced

to learn in. It is absolutely appalling that children are learning in buildings that should have been demolished years ago. If this was a city-based school, there would have been action already.

## Only a Patch

"These upgrades are only a patch. The buildings will soon deteriorate again, leaving the school back in the same position, relying on chipboard and plywood to repair the damage," she said.

Ms Benham praised the persistence of the school community in advocating for new classrooms.

"Together with the school, I have long been campaigning for proper upgrades. For too long, the Labor Government has ignored the needs of regional schools and families. I will continue to fight to ensure every child, no matter where they live, has access to safe, modern learning environments."

## Master Plans

MWPS has had two master plans, the most recent in 2018. Students are currently learning in the main building, which has been divided up by the school itself and is being held together with plywood. The only parts of the master plans completed are one building and a renovated toilet block.

"There have been master plans but what we need now is action. Our schools deserve more than just cosmetic fixes. They need real investment in their infrastructure," Ms Benham said.

## VicGrid Sets New Requirements

**VicGrid is setting new requirements for renewable project developers to meet minimum standards of engagement and benefit sharing with regional communities and landholders.**

Recently released for consultation were draft Community Engagement and Social Value Guidelines that set out 48 expectations on engagement and the sharing of benefits with locals.

Developers will need to demonstrate how they will meet these expectations as a condition of being granted access to the grid in Victoria.

These expectations cover a lot of the things communities have been telling VicGrid are of concern to them, including impacts on neighbours, non-disclosure agreements, insurance, and decommissioning.

There's a chance now for people to have their say on this draft guide and on the standards they think developers should be held to.

"This is about setting the standards of behaviour we want to see from solar, wind and battery developers in Victoria," said VicGrid Chief Executive Alistair Parker.

"Developers who want to access the grid will need to show they are doing the right thing by regional communities and meeting government standards for community engagement and benefits."

## Proposed New Rules

Also released for community and industry feedback are proposed new rules that will manage how renewable energy projects gain access to the state's transmission network:

**Access and Connections Consultation Paper:** an overview of the proposed new

network access arrangements including proposed transitional arrangements for projects under development.

**Draft Grid Impact Assessment (GIA) Guidelines:** details of the assessment that will apply to projects outside renewable energy zones.

These reforms are all part of the Victorian Access Regime and aim to encourage development in renewable energy zones and increase transparency about what projects must do to gain access.

• Families and community groups who rely on personal service will be left behind.

## Abandoned

"Wycheeproof has always supported Bendigo Bank, but right now we feel abandoned," said Martin Duke, President of Wyche Alive (the Town Forum).

"We are asking Bendigo Bank to pause and rethink this decision. Small rural communities like ours cannot absorb blow after blow to essential services."

The community is calling on:

• Bendigo Bank to engage directly with locals and explore alternatives before finalising the full closure.

• Buleoke Shire Council and local MPs to advocate strongly on behalf of Wycheeproof.

• Residents and supporters to stand together and voice their concerns.

Wycheeproof may be a small town but is committed to voicing strong opinion on the closure.

The community is proud and resilient and know that access to basic banking is not a privilege – it is a right.

# To Tackle Victoria's Crime Crisis... Nationals Unveil \$100 Million Plan

The Nationals' Member for Mildura, Jade Benham, has backed The Nationals' \$100 million Safer Communities Plan to crack down on crime and restore safety across Victoria.

The Nationals have unveiled a comprehensive plan to crack down on crime and make Victorian communities safer.

"Labor's soft-on-crime approach is failing all Victorians," Ms Benham said.

The Safer Communities Plan will introduce tough new laws alongside targeted prevention programs to make a real difference in every community.

The plan builds on The Nationals' Break Bail, Face Jail policy, ensuring offenders face real consequences. Key initiatives include:

- Jack's Law for Victoria – giving police powers to conduct random searches in public areas to remove weapons such as machetes from our streets.

- Restart – a Victorian-first

residential responsibility and discipline program for serious and repeat offenders.

- Youthstart – co-ordinated community-based interventions to help at-risk young people make better choices.

Ms Benham said the Allan Labor Government had cut youth crime prevention funding from nearly \$13 million a year under the previous Liberal Nationals Government to just \$541,000 annually over the past three years.

The Shire no doubt have their issues. Staff morale and turnover being one of them.

In my view, the Shire have failed Beautify Charlton, and therefore Charlton, in understanding what community engagement and communication really require.

In our region I had never been a fan of Shire amalgamation. It has delivered our towns bureaucracy, and we deserve better. 
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
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# Scholarships for Regional Students

## Keep Game Day Fire On Field

As Victorians prepare to celebrate the AFL Grand Final long weekend, Victorian fire services are urging residents to prioritise safety when using barbecues and fire pits.

Whether you're firing up the barbecue, lighting a celebratory fire pit, or just kicking back with mates, make sure your fire safety game is as strong as your team's backline, because when it comes to protecting your home and community, we're all on the same team.

This warning comes as firefighters recently battled a house fire in Sorrento which was caused by an electric smoker.

On Friday, September 5, CFA and FRV crews responded to reports of a house fire just after 10 p.m. on Vision Avenue.

Crews arrived to find a newly built house well alight where several firefighters worked on the fire for many hours before it was brought under control at 2.53 a.m. on Saturday morning.

Sorrento Fire Brigade Captain Michelle Croad said the incident was a good reminder to ensure every precaution is taken when using barbecues and fire pits this long weekend.

"You might think you have used a barbecue many times and that there is no or minimal risk, but they can become really dangerous," Michelle said.

A few simple safety steps could prevent you from losing everything."

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan reminds Victorians this Grand Final long weekend that safety should never take a back seat.

"Fire pits are great for warmth and atmosphere, but they need to be placed on a flat, fireproof surface and kept well clear of anything flammable," he said.

"Always allow at least three metres of space around the fire, keep a hose or 10 liters of water nearby, and ensure an adult is supervising at all times."

Barbecues are another footy favourite, but they're also a common source of fire incidents.

Last financial year, Fire Rescue Victoria and CFA responded to more than 960 barbecue and recreational fires across Victoria.

FRV Deputy Commissioner Community Safety Joshua Fischer says the long weekend often marks the first barbecue of the season for many households.

"Before you kick off your first snag of the season, make sure your barbecue is match fit!"

"Don't drop the ball on safety this long weekend! Just like in footy, one careless move can cost you the game and put your team (and family) at risk."

Energy Safe Victoria CEO Leanne Hughson echoed the call to prioritise safety, reminding Victorians to check their gas barbecues before use with three simple steps.

"Nothing beats great food and company on grand final day, but safety has to come first," she said.

"Before firing up your barbecue, always inspect the gas cylinder, hose, and connections for damage; ensure all fittings are tight and secure; and do a quick soapy-water test to check for leaks. Taking a few minutes to check could make all the difference."

### Fire Pit Safety Tips

- Place fire pits on stable, non-flammable surfaces with three metres of clearance around and above.
- Check local fire restrictions and avoid lighting fires during CFA's Fire Danger Period or on Total Fire Ban days.
- Never leave a fire pit unattended. Fully extinguish it with water before leaving or going inside.
- Keep at least 10 litres of water or a hose nearby, and ensure adult supervision at all times.
- Using fire pits or solid-fuel devices on Total Fire Ban days is illegal and can result in heavy fines.
- Never use petrol or accelerants on open flames.

### Barbecue Safety Tips

- Test for gas leaks by spraying soapy water on connections and hoses – bubbles mean trouble.
- Use LPG appliances with modern safety fittings and always exchange cylinders through reputable suppliers.
- Never barbecue indoors. Maintain safe clearance from walls, fences, and flammable materials.
- If a fire starts, turn off the gas at the cylinder or meter – only if it's safe to do so.
- If the fire can't be controlled, call Triple Zero (000) immediately.

# Shadow Member Calls Out "Hollow Words"

Shadow Minister for Regional Development, Local Government, Territories and Regional Communications, Dr Anne Webster, says the Albanese Labor Government's response to a "REAL Deal" proposal for local benefits from "renewable" projects was as hollow as the way Labor are hollowing out regional Australia.

"I can't believe the hide of the Minister to talk about community benefit when Labor at federal and state levels is railroading regional communities, like many of my own in Mallee, hell bent on reaching political targets so they can strut the global climate stage," Dr Webster said.

"This isn't regional development, it's regional exploitation for political gain."

The Regional Australia Institute is today launching its "Regional Energy and Legacy Deal" aka "REAL Deal" alongside a report, "Towards Net Zero: Building a Legacy". The proposal suggests "social benefit" payments from energy project developers ought to be required to ensure genuine negotiations to communities.

### Sceptical

"I am very sceptical about today's announcement, which aims to also provide 'certainty to investors'. Of course Australia wants to eliminate sovereign risk, but there is also a bigger risk to Australian taxpayers in picking winners. Wind projects are not progressing in Australia for at least two very sound regions," Dr Webster, the member for Mallee in north-western Victoria, said.

"First of all, local councils like many in my electorate – and I commend them wholeheartedly for it – have spoken up for their communities saying they are not getting a good deal.

### Obscene

It is obscene that farmers and landowners now face fines of up to \$12,000 for refusing access for the Victorian government's transmission line. That is bad model corporate behaviour by the government, and the Albanese Labor Government are cheering Victorian Labor on.

"Secondly, the market is getting cold feet on onshore wind projects. Some say solar and batteries might dampen interest in wind investment. Hardly any wind projects have been approved this year, leading to Labor's "Chicken Little" alarmism last week to scare Australians into accepting a quadrupling of the wind turbine rollout, a tripling of the utility solar rollout and sextupling of the battery rollout. Where will that rollout happen? In regional communities.

"The RAI needs to go back to regional communities and ask them whether any amount of money will be acceptable payoff for blighting their landscapes and turning regions into industrial wastelands of mines, lines and turbines on what will be former prime agricultural land.

"Labor has not lifted a finger to enable community benefit. Throwing chicken feed to community groups to buy off 'social licence' is not acceptable, true social licence or genuine investment in communities. Federal Labor have the levers but back in authoritarian Labor state governments that treat private property rights like tissue paper.

### Railroading

"Labor are railroading communities as the PM and Mr Bowen are hell bent on political targets no expert (outside those under the government thumb) truly believes are achievable."

communities, to properly remunerate these landowners and to make sure that they are working with community to understand what the best line is going to be and how that will have an impact on our community long term.

However, Minister McBain herself faces a "REAL Monaro" campaign against the Coonarrang Wind Farm (near Cooma, NSW) in her own electorate. The group admin posted on February 15.

"The Monaro community doesn't want the Coonarrang Wind Farm either! There is No social licence for this."

Dr Webster said the Minister needs to lift her game for genuine regional development.

"I confess I did a double take after reading the Minister talking about her Government being 'committed to ensuring regional communities are empowered to participate in the energy transition and experience its benefits'. That's condescending nonsense and it's certainly not what Minister Bowen and the Prime Minister are doing to regional communities.

"Labor's aggressive rollout and railroading regional communities is why farmers in tractors chased the Prime Minister out of Ballarat in late August, and why Labor ministers are getting hostile receptions in regional communities."



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

"You can jump on the bike and pedal to make a fruity concoction," she said.


"There will also be free pizza and an opportunity to decorate cupcakes – there is something for everyone."

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# A Century for Culgoa Church

The Sacred Heart Church Culgoa is celebrating its 100th year shortly on October 19.

Much of the following information was taken from a book published by Justine Severin called "A journey in Faith".

Culgoa (Kaniera) was the first of the parish townships to build a Catholic Church. For at least 12 years prior to this, Masses had been celebrated in both the hall and school. The wooden Sacred Heart Church stood immediately on the north side of the present church. It was officially opened by Bishop Higgins on June 24, 1906.

The first Baptism recorded in Culgoa was Considine, Kathleen Kaniera daughter of Michael and Maria July 30, 1894. She later became Sister John of the St John of God order and died in her hundredth year, January 31, 1994.

The Sea Lake Parish was formed in March 1907 with Culgoa part of it, and Father Michael Quinn Parish Priest. In 1926 after 20 years the present brick church was built to replace the wooden one. Bishop Foley laid the foundation stone and the laborious task of carting materials from the railway station by horse and dray began.

## Big Impact

Fr Davis, the Parish's longest serving pastor (33 years) died in 1949, Fr Payne was appointed Parish Priest and he was to have a big impact on the parish, Culgoa in particular.

In 1950 Fr Payne began the annual Eucharistic Procession to honour Christ the King. These continued for 41 years bringing many blessings to the district. Up to 2000 people attended some years, but these numbers gradually dwindled to about 600.

Fr Payne had a special regard for Culgoa, and at his request, when he died in 1968, his body was brought back for burial there.

The Church continued as part of the Sea Lake parish, often having visiting priests come from Ballarat and surrounds to provide Masses in the area. Lay led assemblies began in the church in 1999 when priests were unavailable. The Culgoa Church became part of the Swan Hill parish in 2018 with a new parish name "Holy Family Parish Northeast Mallee" and includes Swan Hill, Lake Boga, Lalbert, Sea Lake, and Nandaly churches. Mass is offered once a month at Culgoa.

## Culgoa Eucharistic Procession, 1950–1990

The inaugural Eucharistic Procession took place in 1950 under the direction of the late Fr. Gerald G. Payne, who had succeeded the late Fr. William J. Davis, Parish Priest at Sea Lake for some 33 years.

This spiritual occasion, held to honour Christ the King, was advertised and promoted far and wide by Fr. Payne using an amplifier attached to his Dodge sedan. After early Mass, almost the entire Catholic community of all ages "swung into action", removing pews to the outside and erecting the outdoor altar, organ, pulpit, and the huge cross base.

Colourful aerial bunting and flags fluttered in the breeze. Two 20-foot wire netting crosses at the north and east ends were decorated with vibrant spring flowers and greenery. In front of the altar, a huge cross was marked out and filled with thousands of individual flower petals. The children were mainly responsible for stripping the flower heads and placing the petals, resulting in a spectacular floral cross. Friends from other denominations kindly donated flowers for the crosses.

Fr. Payne also had bomb shells painted silver and used them as markers for the Procession course. As the Rosary was recited, a visiting priest had the honour of carrying the Monstrance, which held the Blessed Sacrament. The canopy bearers were members of the Holy Name Society and local parishioners. Children of Mary and young women were present, along with a large number of priests, altar boys, nuns, banner bearers, and flower girls wearing white frocks and veils, who scattered petals along the Procession course.

I can recall, as a teenager and banner bearer, wearing a shot taffeta ballerina frock—as did many other girls. Everyone complied with Fr. Payne's requests without exception.

Usually, a Redemptorist priest preached an inspiring homily to the large crowd. Some arrived by bus, bringing with them many nuns from various orders, the Children of Mary, clergy, and altar boys.

This public display of faith concluded with Benediction.

Afterwards, the crowds adjourned to the Culgoa Public Hall to enjoy a complementary afternoon tea amidst much fellowship. The late Anne Walsh organised a delectable and "special" afternoon tea for the nuns, served in the hall's cloakrooms.

The final Procession was held in 1990, inside the church due to inclement weather. Over the course of 40 years, thousands of devout

and loyal Christians and their families paid homage to Christ the King, receiving many blessings through their enduring faith and loyalty. For those who attended annually, the Eucharistic Procession was something of a reunion.

Fr. Payne was a man of great faith and vision. Culgoa's Sacred Heart parishioners are indeed honoured to have him at rest in their cemetery.

During his time in the parish, Fr. Payne undertook a wide variety of work. His whole purpose was to teach the young the right path to God.

In addition to establishing the school, he also initiated the Culgoa Eucharistic Festival, which united Catholics from miles around. Buses transported people from as far

away as Swan Hill and Charlton.

Nuns and priests were invited to participate in the procession. Younger girls wore their First Communion dresses and scattered rose petals in front of the Monstrance, while the older girls carried the banners.

Following the procession, everyone was provided with afternoon tea at the Culgoa Hall, generously hosted by the Ladies of the Guilds.

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# A Footballer's Story

The proud son of Wycheeproof, football legend Mervyn Keane, was the Probus Club's September meeting speaker.

Merv played junior football with Wycheeproof-Naraport before being recruited to Richmond, and playing VFL grand finals with that club.

Merv began by explaining his recent busy week, with Saturday in St Arnaud getting a feel for the opponents for the coming footy grand final.

Then the highlight of the week on Tuesday being a guest at the awarding of Mancel Giddings's OAM at Government House in Melbourne. Merv divulged that he had been helpful (by the advocacy of Peta Credlin) in fast tracking Mancel's nomination, reducing the processing time from years to one year.

Wednesday he was back at his new farmhouse at Wycheeproof South. The old house had succumbed to the termites with only the chimney and dunny remaining. Now he has both a brand new house and full-size tennis court. He invited his old tennis mates in attendance to come and play any time.

Merv loves Wycheeproof, which he left 55 years ago to follow his football dream, after a long time of kicking the football at home. His forefathers began settlement here in 1876 with a 30 acre allotment, but it took another 20 years before they could buy more land in the area. Merv spoke fondly of the many historic buildings in the town and hopes that the future will see them both retained and restored as necessary.

## Books and Anecdotes

Merv has written two books – "You don't understand" and "Playing with the Field". He described the lad Anthony McDonald-Tipungwuti who is the subject of the first book. Anthony is from the Tiwi Islands, near Darwin, and his father had died when he was 2 years old, leaving

him with Anthony's alcoholic mother. He met a white lady, Jane McDonald, at school in Tiwi and when her husband died Anthony asked her to take him back to Gippsland, Victoria, with her. She virtually adopted Anthony, teaching him English and helping him attend school. He struggled with education and only passed some year 11 subjects, which was similar to Merv.

Merv recruited Anthony to the Essendon football club and he played his first AFL game in 2016. Merv visited the Tiwi Islands three times while writing his book. He believed that their shared experiences of isolation, spending all their time kicking the footy and lack of education bonded him to Anthony.

Merv also told some of the anecdotes in his book including the one called "Fire on Grassy Hill" where after a very hot summer day playing tennis (which had been suspended due to heat), Merv and his mates decided to go up Mount Wycheeproof. Horsing around they started to clump grass together and put a match to it and then stamp out the fire. Unfortunately, the whole thing took off and despite all attempts it continued to burn. With the fire out of control the group ran away. Merv ended up under his Nanna's bed. He could hear the sirens starting and imagined the fire burning down the houses in Mount Street and the school. However, eventually when he stuck his head out, the place was all quiet. Apparently, the fire had been put out by the competent Fire Brigade.

## Richmond

His last tale described when he was recruited to Richmond footy club in the late 1970s. Richmond legend Alan Schwab drove up to

## While Working at Heights... Firefighter Safety Enhanced

CFA is further enhancing the safety of its firefighters while working at heights with five new props recently added to its training centres across the state.

The \$8 million project included the construction of Safe Work at Heights props at CFA's Victorian Emergency Management Training Centres (VEMTC) at Sunraysia, West Sale, Longerenong, Penshurst and Central Highlands.

The existing prop at Hunty VEMTC has also been upgraded and plans are underway for Bangholme VEMTC to receive the new prop soon.

Acting Deputy Chief Officer Operational Doctrine and Training David Maxwell joined other dignitaries to officially handover the five new props at Central Highlands VEMTC.

## Roof Access

"Safe Work at Heights training allows CFA members to safely access roofs that

aren't already fire affected," David said.

"The prop involves the use of a harness, ropes and anchoring to create a safe system for our members to access areas above two metres high.

"It allows the rigging of the system in a controlled environment under supervision, preparing our members for real-life scenarios.

"The training also closely aligns with other emergency services, allowing for cross agency support in multi-agency situations.

"This not only improves our safety and capability at incidents in Victoria; it also allows us to further support our interstate partners by deploying our

members to emergencies interstate when required.

## Training Courses

"We've proudly delivered more than 160 of these specialised training courses to more than 900 members across the state, which accredited 140 brigades for Safe Work at Heights operations."

The training prop also has the ability to conduct Low Voltage Fuse Removal training which enables our members to disconnect overhead mains power to a structure at an emergency with specialist equipment.

CFA's VEMTC sites and props are also widely utilised by other emergency services and agencies, providing a broad range of practical skills and services to train members in a safe environment.

# New Crop of Contenders: Wheat Varieties for 2026

Growers are seeking wheat varieties that deliver both high yields and good disease resistance.

Many indicated at BCG's Main Field Day on Wednesday, September 10, that they plan to move beyond the popular Scepter and introduce new wheat varieties into their 2026 cropping rotations across north-west Victoria.

In the cereal variety session, "Top performers & ones to watch", BCG Research Agronomist Anna Marcus said, "Scepter is our baseline variety and most of the time, when a new variety is released, a common question is 'Is it better than Scepter?'"

Forty-eight wheat varieties were on display in the Grains Research and Development Corporation's (GRDC) funded wheat National Variety Trial (NVT) at BCG's Main Field Day. Wheat breeders from RAGT, Longreach, Intergrain and AGT were also in attendance to speak about the new varieties they have coming through.

During the session, growers reported they are considering varieties such as Shotgun, Matador, Calibre, Rockstar and Tomahawk CL next year, and keeping a portion of Scepter due to its high and reliable yield returns.

## Important Consideration

Residue management is an important consideration when selecting a new variety. Due to a late start in many regions this year, the nine-month plantback period requirement for some residual chemicals applied this year may cause damage to emerging crops next year.

"If you're looking for a Clearfield variety, Tomahawk might be a good option," Ms Marcus added. "It has high yielding APW quality and a similar disease package to Scepter."

## Highlighted

Some of the highlighted varieties and their characteristics presented by Ms Marcus:

- Murray: has one year's worth of data but showing promising yield results across the Wimmera, Mallee and North Central. APW quality.

- Matador: a few growers have already made the switch in the North Central. It's high yielding and has a slightly better disease rating than Scepter.

- Shotgun: a high yielding alternative to Scepter for the Wimmera.

- Rockstar: a high yielding alternative to Scepter for the North Central.

- Colt: A Yitpi type variety. AH quality and a good disease package. Has provisional triple rust resistance (stem, leaf and stripe). Flexibility around sowing time.

## Grower Engagement

The high level of grower engagement at BCG's Main Field Day highlighted both the appetite for innovation and the careful consideration required when selecting new wheat varieties. With so many options on the table, decisions will ultimately come down to striking the right balance between yield, disease resistance, market opportunities and agronomic fit.

BCG's ongoing variety evaluation and extension work, supported by GRDC, will continue to provide growers with independent insights to guide confident decision making for future seasons.

# Don't Let Your Campfire Ruin Everyone's Grand Final

This Grand Final Long Weekend is a great opportunity for Victorians – and maybe even some inter-staters – to show off their ball skills at the MCG and campfire skills in our parks and forests.

The Conservation Regulator Victoria, CFA, Parks Victoria, and Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) are reminding campers about the importance of knowing the rules around campfire safety to protect fellow footy fans and the environment from the dangers of an escaped campfire.

"Anyone planning to have a campfire must check the weather conditions before

they go camping. They need to know if a Total Fire Ban is in place and what they can and can't do wherever they are going," said CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan.

Many people try to put out campfires incorrectly with soil, or not enough water to extinguish them completely. Fires that haven't been properly extinguished can smoulder under soil for days and reignite in the right conditions.

## Make Sure

If you are building a campfire, make sure you know how to build a safe one, don't leave it unattended while it is alight, put it out with water, not soil, and remember – if you light, you own it!" said Chris Hardman, Chief Fire Officer, Forest Fire Management Victoria.

To ensure campfires are safe:

- Before you light a fire always check fire restrictions, including whether a Total Fire

Ban is in place. Download the VicEmergency app or go to <https://www.emv.vic.gov.au/>

- Plan ahead and consider alternatives for cooking such as a portable butane cooktop.

- Always follow the designated rules of your campsite. In national parks, fires can only be lit in purpose-built fireplaces unless marked otherwise.

- The campfire must not exceed one square metre, and three metres above and around your fire must be clear of flammable material.

- Branches and logs on your campfire must be no

longer than one metre.

- Don't leave a campfire unattended. An adult must stay within a 50-metre line of sight.

- Extinguish a campfire with at least 10 litres of water every time you leave the site.

- All rubbish must be taken home with you, not burned.

Report unattended campfires to DEECA at 136 186 or call 000 to report a bushfire.



Damien currently is a domestic coach for the Williamstown Cannons and is also a current high level rep coach with the Altona Gators in the Victorian Junior Basketball League.




