Jade Joins Students on Kokoda Trail

The Nationals' Member for Mildura, Jade Benham, has joined scholarship recipients, Hannah Saunders and Rhiannon Jack, in successfully completing the Kokoda Trail, marking the end of a profound journey honouring Australia's wartime history and the enduring values of courage, mateship, endurance, and sacrifice.

The trio returned from Papua New Guinea this week after trekking the historic 138 kilometre Kokoda Trail, as part of the Farnsworth Lochhead Lowe Scholarship—an initiative auspiced by the Mildura RSL Sub-Branch and proudly supported by Ms Benham, the Mildura Gateway

Tavern, Sunraysia Petroleum and Wentworth Military Museum.

The scholarship is named in honour of local soldiers Private Raymond Farnsworth, Warrant Officer John Lochhead and Lance Corporal Edward Lowe, who each made the ultimate sacrifice. It

holds special significance for scholarship winner, Rhiannon Jack, who is the great granddaughter of Warrant Officer Lochhead.

Rhiannon was privileged to be the first member of her family to visit her great grandfather's final resting

place and pay tribute to his remarkable service.

"It was deeply meaningful to pay tribute to someone who gave so much," Rhiannon said. "I felt proud to stand there and honour his memory on behalf of my family."

Ms Benham said the experience was both physically and emotionally demanding but deeply rewarding.

Challenging

"This was one of the most challenging and moving experiences of my life," Ms

Benham said. "To complete the trek alongside Hannah and Rhiannon, and to honour the memory of our fallen soldiers from Sunraysia, was incredibly powerful. These young women displayed remarkable resilience, teamwork, and a deep respect for the significance of Kokoda."

Hannah and Rhiannon were selected for their outstanding community involvement and strong connection to the values embodied by the Kokoda Trail.

"Walking the Kokoda Trail challenged me in every way," Hannah said.

"It taught me so much about resilience, leadership, and the strength that comes from supporting others."

Ms Benham praised both students for representing the region with pride and integrity.

"They have made our community proud," she said. "This experience has shaped them in ways that will last a lifetime."

Police Mental Health Must Be a Priority

The Nationals' Member for Mildura, Jade Benham, has called on the Victorian Government to reinstate funding for the Western Region Health and Wellbeing Hub.

Speaking in Parliament, Ms Benham said the vital mental health service was scrapped just 12 months after being established, despite strong evidence it was delivering real, measurable outcomes for police officers across regional Victoria.

"I am dumbfounded by this decision. It shows complete

disregard for the mental health of our police officers," Ms Benham said. "Pulling the plug now is not just irresponsible, it is dangerous."

The hub embedded mental health clinicians within regional police stations, providing early, trusted and confidential support for officers experiencing the daily

trauma and pressure that comes with frontline policing.

Never a Luxury

"This was never a luxury, it was a necessary service that helped keep our officers safe and well," Ms Benham said. "If we are going to require our police to be subject to confronting and traumatic situations, we must offer them the appropriate support."

"The decision to scrap the hub flies in the face of Victoria Police's own business case, which showed the embedded model reduced WorkCover claims, improved wellbeing outcomes, and created a culture where members felt supported to speak up and seek help."

Not a Priority

"By removing this support, Labor is sending a clear message that the mental health of our regional police officers is not a priority."

Ms Benham said the Well-being Hub was backed by recommendations from the Royal Commission into Victoria's Mental Health System, Beyond Blue, and leading experts, all of whom have championed embedded, localised mental health services for first responders.

"To take it away now will only lead to more burnout, more resignations, and fewer officers available to protect our communities."

Salvos Homelessness Week

Dear Editor.— August 4-10 marks Homelessness Week in Australia – a time to take a moment to think about those in our community who are facing some of the most challenging circumstances and realise that it may be affecting people that we don't expect.

The Salvation Army is one of the largest providers of homelessness services in the country, and in our over 140-year history in Australia, we have seen it all.

We support over 8,000 people every month across Australia who are experiencing homelessness, but what can sometimes shock me more than these numbers is the individual stories behind each person who reaches out to us for help.

We have seen people reach out to our homelessness services who have been donors to the Salvos in the past. We have seen people who are perceivably "well off", but due to one unforeseen personal crisis, like a family member falling ill, they have slipped into homelessness.

Recently, we have started to see increased numbers of women and children reaching out to us. In fact, one in seven people who reached out to us for homelessness support this year have been children under 14. This breaks our hearts.

Homelessness isn't just sleeping rough on the streets. It manifests in a number of ways, like couch surfing, staying in emergency accommodation or sleeping in your car. In a recent survey of people who reached out to the Salvos for financial support, one in five (19%) had couch surfed or lived in their car at some point in the past 12 months.

That is why, this Homelessness Week, we want to shine a light on what homelessness really looks like in Australia. At the Salvos, we want to encourage people to reach out to their friends and family, notice the signs, and know where to go if you or someone you know is experiencing homelessness.

And where can you go? The Salvos are a great place to start. The Salvation Army are here for those experiencing hardship, including those at risk of or currently experiencing homelessness. We don't judge and don't discriminate. It has been our privilege to come alongside Aussies in their time of need for the past 140 years, and we look forward to doing so in the future.

Noted Chef Shares Culinary Wisdom with Birchip Students

Recently, the first and second-year cookery students at Birchip P-12 School were incredibly fortunate to spend two days learning the foundations of traditional Italian cooking under his expert guidance.

Stefano's connection to Birchip spans several decades, beginning from his friendship with Eddie and Frances Lee. His affinity for championing regional tourism and showcasing locally grown produce eventually led him to being a board member of the Birchip Cropping Group (BCG) between 2020-2023.

It was through this connection, at the BCG's 50-year celebration dinner, that Birchip P-12 School VETiS Cookery Teacher, Kristy Knights, had the opportunity to meet Stefano. Stefano was catering for the event at the Birchip

Leisure Centre in 2022 and, in need of some help in the kitchen, Stefano engaged Kristy and her hospitality students. That evening sparked a conversation that inspired Stefano to offer a return visit to Birchip, to spend a few days cooking with, and teaching, Birchip P-12 School students.

Return Visit

The visit began in the classroom with warm introductions, followed by a discussion led by Stefano on what he considers to be the ideal pantry. He spoke passionately about the importance of preparing affordable, nutritious meals, especially relevant for students as they look towards independence and life beyond home-cooked meals.

Together, the group took a short walk to the local IGA and Bourke's Butcher, where

Stefano spoke about locally-sourced produce including cereals, meats, and the seasonal availability of fruits and vegetables. His immense knowledge, paired with his relaxed and friendly nature, made everyone feel immediately comfortable and engaged.

All Hands On Deck

Back in the kitchen, it was all hands on deck. Students were each given a task and got straight into cooking a range of delicious dishes: traditional Bolognese, potato gnocchi, potato soup, handmade pasta, mushroom risotto, Santiago cake, bread rolls and focaccia, lamb ragù, and farfalle with broccoli.

Highlight

A highlight of the lessons was learning about sofrito, a base mixture of onions, carrots, and celery that forms the foundation of many Italian dishes. This technique, along with many others, was not only demonstrated but actively practised and enjoyed by all.

The two days passed with lots of laughter, learning, and the joy of sharing food. Cooking together created a powerful sense of connection and community and highlighted one of the most meaningful ways we build relationships with family and friends.

Appreciation

Birchip P-12 School is incredibly grateful for this opportunity. Kristy said: "We deeply appreciate Stefano's generosity, not only with his time, but also with his passion for food, his willingness to share his vast knowledge, and his genuine warmth. It was an enriching and tasty experience for our students, who don't have the luxury of visiting fine dining establishments in Birchip."

"We certainly hope this isn't the last visit from Stefano, and with a bit of luck, we'll welcome him back to Birchip again in the future.

Inaction Puts Children at Risk

The Nationals' Member for Mildura, Jade Benham, has condemned the Victorian Government's failure to address serious and ongoing issues within Victoria's childcare sector, saying children are being placed at risk while families are left in the dark.

Ms Benham said repeated warnings have been ignored and critical safety concerns remain unresolved, with alarming figures revealing a 45 per cent increase in complaints to the state's childcare regulator since 2018, while enforcement actions have dropped by 67 per cent over the same period.

“This is completely unacceptable. Parents deserve answers, children deserve protection, and Victorians

deserve leadership,” Ms Benham said.

“Instead of taking responsibility, Labor is yet again launching another review while refusing to take immediate action.”

Six-point Plan

In response, The Victorian Nationals and Liberals have put forward a clear six-point plan to deliver urgent and practical reforms aimed at improving safety and restoring trust in early learning settings.

The plan includes:

- Fixing Working With Children Check loopholes by giving assessors the power to act on all relevant information.



- Providing parents access to live safety and compliance data for individual centres.

- Creating a central register of all early childhood workers to raise workforce standards.

- Establishing an independent childcare safety watchdog to investigate, enforce, and report transparently.

- Banning personal phones and supporting secure CCTV installation in childcare centres.

- Linking federal funding to safety performance, as already done in aged care and schools.

Practical Measures

immediately. We are ready to legislate reforms that put the safety of children first,” Ms Benham said.

“The time for reviews and excuses is over. If Labor won't act, we will.”

At BCG's Main Field Day on September 10 . . .

Lunchbox Legends Will Serve Healthier Choices

Visitors to BCG's flagship Main Field Day at Birchip on Wednesday 10 September won't just take home the latest insights in agronomy and farming systems – they'll also take home ideas for healthier lunchboxes.

As part of the Lunchbox Legends initiative, BCG will partner with Birchip P-12 School to deliver healthy, affordable lunches to field day attendees.

Hospitality students, led by teacher Kristy Knights, will prepare a fresh menu based on National Centre for Farmer Health (NCFH) guidelines, helping fuel conversations about diet, wellbeing, and the critical role of health on-farm.

BCG's Main Field Day attracts 500 growers, advisers, researchers and secondary students each year, to explore

research trials and network with experts and other farmers.

"We know the most valuable asset on any farm is its people," said Louisa Ferrier, BCG project manager and Main Field Day co-ordinator. "Lunchbox Legends is about starting conversations around making small, healthier choices during busy periods like sowing and harvest, that can have a big impact over time."

The initiative builds on other BCG health-focused efforts, including free water refills, sunscreen stations, free

Free Fishing Forums Coming Up

The Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) will host 11 free fishing forums at angling clubs across the state, connecting recreational fishers with the latest on topics tailored to their patch.

VFA CEO Travis Dowling said the popular annual forums provide a great chance for fishers and their families to pick up new information, while building relationships with a local club and sharing ideas to make fishing even better.

Each forum will highlight how the VFA is reinvesting recreational fishing licence

fees locally, and details on the Victorian Government's \$96 million Go Fishing and Boating plan to improve fishing, boating, piers and aquaculture.

"We always look forward to catching up with locals, who know their waterways best, and hearing what matters most to them," Mr Dowling said.

Ten Million Fish

"We've just stocked 10 million fish again, more than all other states and territories combined, we've removed commercial nets from Port Phillip and the Gippsland Lakes and we've made it free to launch and park at all of Victoria's public boat ramps.

"On top of that we're tripling the size of our Arcadia hatchery and undertaking fascinating monitoring of much-loved recreational species like black bream, snapper, King George whiting and Murray cod – so there's plenty to discuss.

"The forums are also a great chance to ask our experts those burning questions and settle any longstanding debates with mates."

Held on weeknights in August and September between 7 and 9 p.m., the forums will open with expert presentations from VFA staff, followed by audience questions and discussion.

First Forum

The first of the forums will be hosted at Werribee on Tuesday, August 5, followed by others at Frankston, Casterton, Warrnambool, Mount Beauty, Nathalia, Mildura, Bendigo, Preston, Loch Sport and Marlo.

Presentation topics will include Victoria's record-breaking fish stocking program, Gippsland's estuarine fisheries, the science behind offshore species, and the VFA's efforts to bring back iconic native species such as Macquarie perch, trout cod, blackfish and catfish.

Each forum will also include information about how the VFA's Better Boating division is progressing the state's biggest ever boat ramp construction program.

Charlton 100 Years Ago

July 18 to 22, 1925.

Friendly Rivalry: The Presbyterian Hall was the scene of an interesting miniature rifle contest between teams representing the Charlton Branch A.N.A. & Tent Austral I.O.R. The shooters numbered 13 a side, the best 8 in each team to count. Mr A. C. Dabron returned the best individual score. The total for A.N.A. was 326 and for I.O.R. 322.

Dainty Dresses at the Band Ball: Never in the history of the band has the town got behind the organisation as it has done this year. The Victoria Hall was decorated with wedding bells and vari-coloured streamers. From start to finish the floor was thronged. The ball should clear over £40. The preparation of the floor included the use of candle grease and "elbow grease". The music fitted into the scheme of things perfectly. The supper was on an elaborate scale and included fruit salads, trifles, jellies, sausage rolls, ham and tongue sandwiches, cream lilies and puffs and devilled almonds. A feature of the ball was the number of beautiful dresses worn eg. Miss M. Bennett – flame charmeuse, with handmade flowers, and cabochon at waist.

Jeffcott: A meeting of the local Football Club took place at the North School. Mr R. Clements being in the chair. The chief topic concerned the medal donated to the club by Mr R. N. Wadsworth. After lengthy discussion it was resolved to award it to the best player for the season, the honour to be decided at the end of the campaign by a vote of the members of the club. Voting tickets will shortly be distributed by Messrs J. Brennan and R. Clements.

Wooroonook: The Secretary of the Wycheeproof Hospital notified that Mr M. Mulquin, of Wooroonook had forwarded him a cheque for £13 13/6, being money collected for the upkeep of the institution. Thoughts on Organ Donor Week

To be a donor of one's organs is not something very prevalent in most of our minds. And yet if you are on a waiting list for one, it is very foremost in your thinking.

To promote the concept of being an Organ Donor, the Donald Learning Group hosted a Morning Tea, last Wednesday, 30th July. It was Organ Donor Week. The four speakers enlightened the group gathered to hear what is involved in being an organ donor.

Ambulance Victoria was represented by Elliot Walton. He was reassuring that everyone is resuscitated. Every attempt is made to resuscitate a patient. If it is believed that the patient may not respond, resuscitation and life support have the important value of enabling the family of the patient to be able to be present to say good-bye. However, resuscitation is very dramatic on the person and so Elliot encouraged older persons to talk to their GP on whether they wish to be resuscitated or not. This decision is recorded and becomes known as NFR – Not For Resuscitation. It is important to have the conversation with the family, stating what you prefer and whether you have registered as an

organ donor. Elliot encouraged each person to register as an organ and tissue donor and no one is too old to register. It doesn't matter how old you are, your medical history, your lifestyle, what country you're from or how healthy you are – you can still register as an organ and tissue donor. The group was told of one 90-year old deceased lady who was able to donate one of her eyes.

Decision

Anne Maree Wright shared that she and her family were able to decide to donate her husband, Greg's organs. Greg died of an aneurysm in the brain. There was time – a number of hours on life support to enable the family to decide whether the person's organs and tissues would or not be donated. It takes time to match compatibility of the donor with the recipient. Anne Marie shared that six people received organs that Greg was able to donate. Six people from 17 to 74 years old with renewed life. She received thank you letters from five.

One, 30 year old man received both lungs and had 10 more years of good quality of life. He was a father of 4 and so the children were able to grow, knowing their father. The question was asked, "After the donations, was it possible to have 'a viewing of the person' at the time of the funeral?" The answer was, "of course". The donor person is treated with the utmost dignity and respect, as is the recipient.

Each year a thanksgiving service is held in Melbourne where the donors' families and the recipients are able to gather and be thankful for the people who gave their organs and for the renewed lives of those who received the organs.

Yearly Test

David Thomas spoke of his life on the waiting list for a donor kidney and on dialysis in the meanwhile. His message to everyone is to have a yearly blood and urine test. The fact is that one kidney can lose 90% of its function and there be no

symptoms. David spoke of being called twice to come to Melbourne – a kidney was available – only to receive a phone call to say that the donor organ was not suitable, or was diseased. The operating surgeon has the final say. One kidney was flown from Perth! David has been on the waiting list for three years. He also spoke of people donating a healthy kidney as it is possible to live with one kidney. A family member or friend or someone not known to the recipient can decide to donate. It is called "pairing". Although dialysis – cleaning of the toxins from the blood stream – enables the patient to live a better life, it is very limiting as it requires the procedure to be done 3 times a week for 4 hours at a time. It is a very physically and mentally draining procedure.

Blood Pressure

Margaret Arnold spoke of her daughter-in-law, Lisa, being diagnosed with a lung condition described in layman's terms as high blood pressure in the lungs. This was at the time of her pregnancy. Lisa was on the waiting list for 4 and half years. She had her lung transplant in 2007. Overnight Lisa's colour turned from yellow to pink.

Lisa had good quality of life for 17 months, but unfortunately was diagnosed with pneumonia and died. Margaret spoke of the wonderful community spirit with the fundraising and support that assisted Lisa and Shane.

Margaret encouraged everyone to register as an organ and tissue donor. One 40-year-old man received a kidney and lived to 80 years. Anne Maree advised that we need to check our registration as the change over from Vic-

Roads receiving the registrations to Medicare seems to have caused the loss of registered names as she had to re-register and has received her card. Amazingly, having heard this on the Wednesday and thinking we must check our registration, Ian and I received our new cards the next day, on the Thursday! How did that happen?

The message is: Please register as an organ and tissue donor and give life to someone else.

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Victorian Students Top NAPLAN Class

Victorian students have achieved their strongest NAPLAN results ever, leading the nation and proving Victoria truly is the Education State.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Education, Ben Carroll, this week announced that Victorian students are top of the class – ranking first or second in 18 of 20 measures and significantly improving on 2024 results.

Victorian students are smashing records with an average of 70 per cent falling in the “strong” or “exceeding” bands, while all age groups ranked first or second in all 10 domains.

In the Education State high performing students are supported to further excel, and this year more students reached the two highest bands.

Thanks to our hardworking teachers and education support staff, the 2025 results

also show that fewer students are needing additional support – with less students in the bottom band than in 2024 on 16 of 20 measures.

Victoria achieved its highest NAPLAN participation rate since 2008, with 96.6 per cent of students completing at least one assessment in 2025.

These outcomes are a testament to the rollout of key reforms by the Victorian Government – including the introduction of mandatory phonics and the grade 1 phonics check in government primary schools. The statewide government school rollout of explicit teaching will further strengthen student learning.

The Government is also funding the essentials so that

no student misses out with free school dental checkups, free glasses and vision checks for young students and free school breakfasts.

While celebrating these excellent results, work continues in lifting outcomes for disadvantaged students and to close the attainment gap for First Nations students – the Government is rolling out targeted programs including the \$18.5 million Koorie Literacy and Numeracy Program.

The Government has invested more than \$38 billion to support student learning, health and wellbeing and our school workforce – to ensure every Victorian student has access to a world-class education in the Education State.

VNI West Blowouts Means... “Rewiring the Nation” Plan Must Be Dumped

Mallee residents – both energy customers and farmers alike – should be protected by Labor dumping its “Rewiring the Nation” plans, Member for Mallee Dr Anne Webster said at the weekend after the latest massive blowout in the cost of the Victoria-New South Wales Interconnector – West (VNI-West) transmission project.

“The Australian Energy Market Operator (AEMO) released a report late this week indicating VNI-West could cost up to \$11.4 billion, a huge increase on the \$3.6 billion in the 2024 grid blueprint,” Dr Webster said.

“Labor’s radical rewiring plans are now an evident failure after VNI West recently also pushed back its completion date by two years.

“No matter what spin and diversion Energy Minister Chris Bowen tries in Question Time, such as citing wholesale not retail, i.e. household energy prices, power prices are going up and will keep climbing rapidly if the Albanese Government backs the Allan Victorian Labor Government’s aggressive push to build VNI-West, come hell or high water.”

Victorian Energy Police Centre director Bruce Mountain told “The Australian” VNI-West’s cost revisions could increase power bills for households by at least 50 per cent, and for large customers between 2.5 to 3.5 times current levels.

Fines

The Allan Government’s National Electricity (Victoria) Amendment (VicGrid Stage 2 Reform) Bill 2025, carrying fines of over \$12,000 for farmers who lock their gate to

the government’s Transmission Company Victoria obstructing construction of VNI-West, passed Victoria’s House of Assembly last night and is now before the Legislative Council.

Protest

A thousand farmers and Melbourne residents protested on the steps of Parliament House on Spring Street, Melbourne, against the draconian measures in the Bill, following previous protests against the Allan Government’s new farm land tax, called an ‘Emergency Services Volunteer Fund’ Levy.

“I am so proud of Mallee farmers and their supporters in Wimmera, Grampians and other regions – and now in the city – who are joining my fight to make their voices heard in Melbourne,” Dr Webster said.

“Sadly we have to fight Labor’s condescending attitude to regional Australia on two fronts, in Canberra and in Melbourne, but the message is getting through – not only for the sake of our farmers and food security, but for the affordability of electricity, which impacts everyone.

Still Processing

“I’m still processing the 5,000+ Mallee’s Biggest Survey responses and well over 50 per cent so far have said they prefer affordability as a

priority in our energy grid, ahead of reliability and reducing emissions at less than 9 per cent.” (Mallee’s Biggest Survey responses can still be posted in or entered at www.annewebster.com.au)

Origin Energy chief executive Frank Calabria said on Wednesday that transmission and distribution costs make up about 40 per cent of household power bills.

VNI West still faces energy regulator approval, where it must demonstrate a net benefit to consumers.

While VNI West comprises 240 kilometres of 500 kilovolt transmission lines from Bulgana to Kerang – entirely within the Mallee electorate – Labor’s “Rewiring the Nation” plans require 28,000 kilometres of transmission lines to be built across the nation in pursuit of “net zero” emissions by 2050.

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

Bulls Steamroll the Saints:

Birchip-Watchem's brilliant undefeated season continued apace on the wide expanses of St Arnaud's Lord Nelson Park.

Under glorious winter sunshine local crops were starting to burst away after magnificent season saving rain the weekend before, just as the Bulls did out on the park, putting the torch to the Saints with a scintillating 11 goal first quarter. Purring are the Bulls as they roll towards September.

The day, however, was much about their big forward, Ben Edwards. He capped a remarkable goal kicking season to hit the magical 100, equalling the fastest 100 kicked in North Central history in just 14 games (13 and a half to be technical), with 15 goals for the day if you don't mind, 10 of them in a brilliant first half effort with the 100 up just before half-time as he gobbled up the neat pass from youngster Austin Dean and cool as a cat, slotted the 35-metre angle set shot.

Take a bow Big Ben, becoming only the fourteenth player in North Central history to have shot 100 in a home and away season (Edwards achieved the 100 mark in 2024 during the finals series), yes that's only the fourteenth in history, rarefied air is the 100 Club and even more so now with flooding defenders and seven up defences often played. Emphasising the point further is that Edwards's 100 is almost 20 years since last achieved by the mercurial Mark Perryman of Boort way back in 2008. Goes without saying that he's had a tremendous year in front of the big sticks.

Poor Max Hungerford, no slouch either, commenced with the task to curtail Edwards and for a while had his measure, for the Bulls had 3 goals on the board before the Benny show took over and once it did, wow, bang, bang, bang before a clever Nick Rippon roved off Edwards's hands, (who else?) interrupted the sequence and then again bang, bang with another just before half-time. Six to open proceedings, business he

meant, his Mum and partner Abbie had travelled the long road from Adelaide in expectation, and he was going to make their drive worthwhile. Just four to go with three quarters to get it done. And with a 10-goal wide margin already that's where the crowd interest was focused. Former Bull Cliff Ryan's fastest league one hundred under threat, though fair to say Cliff had more far more shots on goal to get his hundred; wonderful player but he could spray them.

Whilst the Saints were being clinically torn apart by rapid ball movement one who was doing his utmost to stop the momentum was unheralded big man Simon Elliot up against Bulls monster Hamish Hosking, Elliot giving away inches but just prepared to shoulder in to the contest and go pound for pound against the big man, Hosking not getting things all his own way. However, the fleet footed Bulls mids, particularly Nick Rippon and Daniel Bell, were able to win the contested ball once it hit the ground regularly and pump it forward.

A clever intercept mark by Rhona Conboy across half-forward and a hop, step and jump around a couple of Saints then goal showcased what this tough high marking forward can do, (it's not just the Benny show on display), before Edwards stepped up to the plate again with two in a row, the Bulls powering away, 14 goals the margin and only halfway through the second quarter. Getting ugly was the scoreboard, but the Saints plugged away, their mids stepped up, Jay Kirwood with a flash of blond locks hard to miss around the stoppages, Darby Schilder a power built tall midfielder also under notice getting active as they needed to for it was the Bulls mids that were pumping ball inwards, for Edwards and Co to reap the rewards.

Zac Phillips was able to get on the end of some good

work by the Saints mids and rewarded the harder work with a goal.

It wasn't that the Saints weren't trying, just a gulf between the high end talent of both sides. Really pleasing for both sides was the form and willingness of their respective younger group of players, the Bulls four eighteen-year-olds in Austin Dean, Charlie Frank, Harry Cook and Riley Hogan Jr shining, Cook and Dean's pace from out on the wing providing drive and energy, a rundown tackle from afar by Cook reminiscent of a leopard stealthily its prey, out of nowhere and then gotcha, Hogan's gutsy efforts in and under as well as forward pressure on the ball carrier, Frank cool under pressure. Likewise for the Saints' young Sam Male off half back or a wing cool under pressure, smart at the fall of the ball, Owen Lowe who showed plenty last year as an under-age continues to develop into a class player right in amongst the midfield action, and there's no better opposition in the league than the Bulls' elite group to go up against, Jackson Needs down back in amongst the contested pack marks with plenty of skill belying his young years, Austin Lowe thrown in at centre half-back just kept throwing himself into the fray. Lots to like.

Edwards's third for the quarter at the 20-minute mark bought him ever so close, just get it done lad, the Bulls young supporters had gathered behind the goal to help celebrate and then at the 23 minute mark Dean won the ball across half forward, burst through and hit up the fast lead of Edwards. Thirty-five out, slight angle, not a breath of wind but the mind to deal with, Edwards nonchalantly heads in and slots the shot, in front of Mum and Abbie parked on the fence, kids out onto the ground, momentous, swamped by his teammates. Bulls out by 90 points, just

prepared to run, spread and pepper the forward arc. Impressive. Contest effectively over.

Except the Saints kept plugging away, so easy to not continue to have a crack when getting slammed but have a crack they did. Bailey Durward down back to assist his brother stem Edwards found plenty as the ball hit the deck, Austin Lowe continued to contest the marking contests as the ball continued to rain in, Hungerford without Edwards as his direct opponent able to be second up at the contest and cause the ball to hit the ground, the ball constantly in the Bulls' forward arc, scoring continued but shared around as the Saints attention turned to contain Edwards.

With focus on Edwards, Tom Gibson was able to revel, dancing around half-forward, sure hands and amongst the goals, his first of the quarter bought up his fourth, Conboy shouldering the contests making life easier for him, young Riley Hogan rewarded for his hard work slotted a nice set shot before the hard working Kurt Torney broke the Bulls sequence, the Saints

working harder around the contests, making space and sharing the ball frustrating the Bulls. Just they couldn't get it across their half forward line with the Bulls backs impenetrable. Captain Dale Hinkley across half-back had leather poisoning, he just kept finding the ball. How he gets in and around players a sight to behold and then able to deliver further afield, breaking the contest wide open. That he has such solid support from the likes of Ben Lakin and Angus Butterfield just allows him to get off the chain and into attack mode.

And then Edwards entered the fray again, quiet on the goal front for fifteen minutes, better get back to action and righted the order with three more if you don't mind, doing it every way, plucking them out of the air, off the ground, hit up leads, 13 for the game, three quarters down, Allan Jackson's league record of 18 for decades under some threat, Bulls mids still powering through, Rippon the little brother leading the way, Bell up and about, Cook and Dean continuing to shine, Hicks and Hosking relishing the contest against one another, despite the wide margin

still entertaining, especially on such a glorious day. Even stalwart Brett Douglas had found his way out from the bar on the hill, that stool not part of his anatomy after all, word must have got around that the Birchip Nutrien man was poking around looking at some crops in his St Arnaud patch, better up the game, Dougo. The hills of Sutherland looked rather enticing to Rick.

With the match well and truly cooked as a contest most interest lay in whether Edwards could achieve the impossible and nab a long held league record but alas wasn't to be, Durward continued to harass, Hungerford there to assist making life difficult and the foot came off the Bulls pedal but in fairness it would have been difficult to maintain the rampant relentless pressure they had been displaying throughout. Bulls home by a massive 183 points.

The Bulls' march towards September glory which has been somewhat elusive for them despite their long held top end positioning throughout the last 20 years continues apace, they have two weeks of

Call for Fairer ESVF Levy

Northern Grampians Shire Council will continue to advocate for a fairer way to fund emergency services amid ongoing concerns about the impact the State Government's controversial new tax will have on the region's residents.

Council updates rates notices; continues to advocate for fairer ESVF levy July 31, 2025

The Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund, ESVF, levy came into effect on July 1, 2025, with local government mandated to collect the tax on behalf of the State Government despite many councils opposing it.

Northern Grampians Shire rates notices – to be delivered from mid-August – will feature a new structure this financial year to help ratepayers differentiate between council fees, including general rates and rubbish, and State Government tax.

Cr Hyslop said despite the widespread protesting of the ESVF, which replaces the Fire Services Property Levy, FSPL, ratepayers were mandated to pay it.

No Control

"It is important to understand that we don't have any control over how the money our residents pay towards their rate notices is distributed," she said.

"Legally, council is obligated to pay a portion of your rates money to the State Government. So, while the ESVF tax amount is clearly differentiated from council's general rates and kerbside collection charges on your rates notice, it isn't possible to charge the ESVF separately.

"Ratepayers would also risk falling into arrears, which council is then legally obligated to retrieve, and it will cost them more in the long run."

Cr Hyslop said under the direction of the State Government, the levy would be applied to all council rates notices; however, rebates were available for volunteers of the Country Fire Authority and Victorian State Emergency Service.

"We have also had some success with the lobbying we have done for the farming

community, which was to be hardest hit by the new levy," she said.

Levy Cap

"The government has agreed to cap the levy at the 2024/25 rate for primary production properties this financial year. It's a small win, but the concern is what happens after that."

Cr Hyslop said councillors had advocated against the introduction of the ESVF for months and would continue to push for a fairer way to fund emergency services.

"Our council has joined many others in protesting the ESVF due to our concerns about residents' capacity to pay, council's ability to collect it and the region's already-stressed economy," she said.

Several councillors attended various rallies and protests in the lead-up to the official implementation of the levy on July 1. At the June council meeting, councillors resolved to write to the Premier, outlining their concerns and asking her to 'scrap' the unjust new ESVF. They also called on the Premier to have the ESVF collected by the State Revenue Office and not be the responsibility of local government.

At the weekend, Cr Jack Blake attended a meeting with representatives of 21 other councils from across the state, organised by United Fire-fighters Union Victoria, in a bid to co-ordinate further opposition and joint advocacy efforts.

"We will continue to advocate for a fairer way to fund emergency services, however, councils are currently mandated to collect the ESVF," Cr Hyslop said.

"All money collected through ESVF charges will go directly to the State Revenue Office – no ESVF money will be retained by council."

Cr Hyslop said council's 2025/26 Budget included a

rate rise of three per cent, in line with the State Government's rate cap for this financial year.

She said people could visit www.ngshire.vic.gov.au/Residents/Rates-and-valuations/How-rates-are-calculated for more information about how rates were calculated.

Waste collection charges are also increasing, which will be clearly identified on rates notices.

Collection Costs

Collection costs for 2025/26 (compared with 2024/25) are as follows:

Compulsory bins (one waste and one recycling): \$480 per annum (previously \$467).

Additional waste: \$164 per annum per bin (previously \$159).

Additional recycling: \$195 per annum per bin (previously \$190).

At St. Arnaud

FOGO (Food Organics/Garden Organics), St Arnaud residents only: \$52 per bin. Previously at no cost due to trial period, which has now ended. Council is keeping the fee below the full cost of delivering the service to support St Arnaud households during the transition period. Cr Hyslop said she understood many residents were feeling financial pressures and reminded people that council offered hardship support.

"We encourage anyone needing assistance to reach out and have a conversation with our team," she said.

"We have payment options available that can be customised depending on your individual circumstances and can also help with referrals to financial counselling services in the event you need additional support."
