## Birchip School Sets the Example

Birchip P-12 School is setting a powerful example for how rural schools can successfully prepare their students for life beyond the classroom, with a growing focus on career pathways, hands-on opportunities, and direct links with tertiary institutions.

Recently, Year 12 student Allie Knights made her mark by graduating from the prestigious Step-Up Program run by the Australian Catholic University (ACU).

The program, designed to give high school students a head start on university study, saw Allie attend ACU's Ballarat campus for two intensive six-day sessions – once in the July 2024 holidays and again in January 2025.

During her time on campus, Allie completed two first-year university units in Nursing, Midwifery and Paramedicine. These units count toward further study in a number of ACU degrees, including the Bachelor of Nursing, Bachelor of Midwifery, Bachelor of Paramedicine, and the combined Bachelor of Nursing/Paramedicine. By successfully completing these units, Allie has not only gained valuable insight to university life and academic expectations, but also strengthened her eligibility for early university entry.

Programs like ACU Step Up are helping students gain early exposure to academic writing, university-level coursework, and student support systems, all while still at school – an advantage that Birchip P-12 School actively promotes.

### Careers Expo

Meanwhile, Birchip's Year 11 students recently took part in the Western Victorian Careers Expo at the Wimmera Events Centre in Longerenong, where they explored a wide range of post-school options. From university degrees to apprenticeships and skilled trades, the expo offered something for everyone.

Students were able to meet representatives from universities across Australia, engaging in meaningful conversations about courses, campus life, and future careers. A wide variety of TAFE providers were also in attendance, opening students' eyes to vocational opportunities in sectors such as agriculture, hospitality, community services, and more.

### Displays

Perhaps the most exciting part of the day was the presence of interactive industry displays, where students got hands-on experience trying out different trades – from construction and electrical work to automotive technologies.

"We want students to leave school with a strong sense of direction and real-world knowledge," said a staff member from Birchip P-12. "Whether it's university, TAFE, apprenticeships or work, we are committed to giving them the tools and exposure to make informed decisions."

As Birchip P-12 School continues to invest in programs that support students' transition into adulthood, it's clear that their efforts are paying off. Through academic extension opportunities like Allie's Step-Up Program and practical experiences like the Careers Expo, students are gaining confidence and clarity about their futures.

## Council Seeks Improved Transparency

At its July Council Meeting, Buloke Shire Council moved a motion for Council to write to relevant Ministers and Departments to seek genuine engagement between Council, the Government and the Buloke Shire community following the recent visit of the Hon. Lily D'Ambrosio, MP, Minister for the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action on June 11, 2025.

The Notice of Motion expressed disappointment in the Minister for failing to inform Councillors of major legislative changes tabled just eight days later on June 19, when the National Electricity (Victoria) Amendment (VicGrid Stage 2 Reform) Bill 2025

was brought before Parliament.

This Bill grants authorised officers greater access to private land and issue infringement notices to facilitate electricity transmission projects, including the VNI West route through Buloke.

"This is not how a respectful partnership looks," said Mayor Cr Alan Getley.

### Grappling

"Our community is already grappling with the aftermath of multiple floods, deepening drought, rising emergency

levies, and now divisive energy projects."

The Mayor said that those present at the meeting with the Minister attended in good faith, expecting open and meaningful dialogue. However, no indication of the proposed legislation, which directly targets landowners including those in the Buloke Shire, was mentioned.

Council continues to take the position that they are against the VNI transmission line in its current form and that

these energy projects must not adversely impact neighbours or restrict their right to use and develop their land, and has called on the Minister, DEECA, VicGrid, Australian Energy Market Operator (AEMO) and Transmission Company Victoria to engage openly and constructively with Council and community.

### Serious Concerns

The Premier, Leader of the Opposition, and Western Victorian Parliamentarians will also be invited to meet with

Council to hear firsthand the serious concerns of the Buloke community.

"Being the closest tier of government to our community, we rely on trust and mutual respect to function effectively. When that trust is eroded, so too is the connection between state government and the very people it is meant to support and serve," the Mayor added.

"Sadly, this erosion has already begun."

# Council Takes Buloke Priorities To Canberra

Buloke Shire Council's Mayor Cr Alan Getley and CEO Wayne O'Toole recently joined over 1,200 local government leaders in Canberra for the 2025 National General Assembly of Local Government.

Their visit formed part of Council's broader advocacy to ensure Buloke Shire's needs are heard with a focus on four priority areas:

- Building Sustainable and Diverse Housing – a call for targeted investment and variable funding to address critical housing shortages that threaten the viability of workforce attraction, local services, and community stability.

- Drought Support Funding – a push for equitable access to federal drought

funding after recent rounds excluded Buloke, despite ongoing impacts to productivity, water security, and community wellbeing.

- Victorian Emergency Services Volunteer Levy – advocacy against cost burdens being passed to rural communities already supporting emergency response through volunteerism and fundraising.

- Renewable Energy Infrastructure – a strong message on the need for rural voices to be central in planning the energy transition,

with fair return and meaningful engagement.

"Whether it's securing drought funding, addressing the rural housing crisis or standing up for our volunteers, it is critical that Buloke's voice is heard at the national level," said the Mayor.

"Our aim is to work in partnership with all levels of government to secure the investment, recognition and policy support our communities deserve."

# Funding Opportunities for Rural Communities

Rural community organisations across Australia are invited to apply for funding to upgrade local hall and community centre facilities through Rabobank's newly-launched Community Hub Improvement Program.

The program – which is planned to run annually – has an overall pool of \$120,000 available, providing the opportunity for 12 selected applicants to receive funding of \$10,000 each to go towards improvements to their local rural hall or community centre.

The program is being funded by food and agribusiness banking specialist Rabobank's Rabo Community Fund, which – since launching in 2021 – has invested into initiatives designed to support the vitality and sustainability of rural and regional communities.

## Eligibility

To be eligible for consideration, the local hall or community centre must be: based in rural Australia, defined as a building or space that is open and accessible to the local community, provide services that the local population wants and needs, and is seen as playing a vital role in supporting vibrant and inclusive communities.

Launching the new program, Rabobank Australia

CEO Mark Wiessing said as a bank focussed on agriculture and rural communities, Rabobank recognised the important role community hubs and halls play in regional Australia, where halls and community centres can be far more than just buildings and can be the "heartbeat" of the community.

"The Rabobank Community Fund is very pleased to make this funding available to help local halls and community centres continue to function as key locations that foster community participation and engagement in rural areas," he said.

## Key Meeting Places

"These venues are often key meeting places for farming communities – providing safe, trusted spaces for locals to gather, especially in isolated areas. They can also serve as important places of refuge and recovery centres in times of emergency and natural disasters as well as venues for training sessions and workshops for local communities to access valuable education opportunities."

Mr Wiessing said many halls and hubs have deep roots in their communities, built by locals working co-operatively and pooling resources.

"As a bank which is a global co-operative, we recognise the value of working co-operatively in local communities," he said.

"These hubs and halls may be modest in size, but their impact can be monumental. They're where memories are made, resilience is built, and community spirit thrives."

Mr Wiessing said the Rabo Community Fund is funded by an annual contribution from Rabobank Australia and New Zealand and guided by the Rabo Client Councils (comprising 90 of the bank's farming clients, who are passionate about contributing to their local communities). The fund is focused on helping address key agribusiness industry and community challenges. These relate to six key themes, focusing on agri education, rural wellbeing, sustainability, adaption and creating rural/urban connections.

## Applications

Rabobank Community Hub Improvement Program applications open on Thursday, July 17, 2025, and close on Sunday, August 24, 2025. Funding recipients will be announced in early October 2025.

# Community Satisfaction Survey Results Released

Buloke Shire Council noted the 2024 Community Satisfaction Survey results at its July Meeting of Council, acknowledging the findings present valuable insights and highlight specific areas for improvement.

The Local Government Community Satisfaction Survey is conducted annually by JWS Research on behalf of the Department of Government Services.

It gathers feedback from a representative sample of residents across Victorian councils to measure performance

in key service areas, identify trends over time and benchmark results against councils of similar size and across the state.

While Council showed a notable improvement in unsealed road maintenance, historically Council's lowest-performing area, with a four-

point increase on the 2023 result, the performance across seven other key service areas have declined. These include: community decisions, local law enforcement, planning and building permits, lobbying, consultation and engagement, tourism and business and community development.

Council's best-performing area continues to be its recreational facilities, which were frequently mentioned by community members as the standout feature of Council service. Waste management and the appearance of public areas also rated relatively well, followed by emergency and disaster management.

## Best Areas

When benchmarked against other municipalities, Buloke

Shire performs in line with State and Small Rural group averages on recreational facilities and State averages on waste management, but overall fell 12 and 13 points below the State and Small Rural areas for overall performance (41) respectively.

## Commitment

"These results don't reflect the standard we want to meet," said Mayor Cr Alan

Getley, "And we are committed to doing better."

"We thank those who took the time to share their views. Your feedback doesn't fall on deaf ears. It drives the improvements we know we need to make."

## Temporary Hall Closure Explained

Recent testing at Charlton Shire Hall found deterioration in wall cavities within decorative brickwork, prompting safety concerns.

The testing followed a routine Hazardous Materials Audit in May 2025 by Safety Systems Bendigo Pty Ltd, which identified materials within the wall cavities as potentially containing friable asbestos-containing materials (ACM).

Council was advised of the laboratory analysis by a NATA-accredited facility on June 11, 2025, confirming the presence of Amosite asbestos within the cavity of the decorative brick work sections on the north, east and west walls of the hall.

Visual inspection indicated deterioration of the poorly bonded ACM surfaces within the cavity increasing the risk of airborne fibre release or transfer to other areas.

### Precaution

As a precaution, Buloke Shire Council temporarily closed the hall and commissioned further air and surface sample analysis testing by Safety Systems Bendigo on June 12, 2025. Settled dust samples were collected from the hall floor, stage floor, hall and wall vents, entrance, and library.

Laboratory results confirmed no asbestos was detected in the dust, nor any trace of respirable asbestos fibres.

Additionally, air monitoring conducted inside the hall at the north and south ends, as per the Certificate of Analysis for Asbestos Airborne Fibres for Volumetric Air Sampling, did not detect airborne asbestos fibres.


These findings indicate that hall users were unlikely to have been exposed to airborne asbestos from historical dust accumulation.

The hall's temporary closure has been extended while Council explores treatment options and ensures safe works. The Charlton RSL remains open and unaffected.

### Charlton Library

To minimise disruption, a mobile library will continue operating outside the Charlton Shire Office every Tuesday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., offering returns, pick-ups, and inter-library loans.

The program provides funding for equipment and uniforms, taking the financial burden off clubs and support for volunteers and officials to learn new skills and deliver new programs – helping local clubs grow.

Since 2014, The Sporting Club Grants Program has invested more than \$19.5 million in local communities to

support thousands of sport and recreation clubs across the state.

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## MASP Shines a (Night) Light

**MASP staff will don their PJs on Friday, July 25 – National Pyjama Day – to raise awareness of the barriers children in out of home care face when it comes to education.**

Statistics reported by the Pyjama Foundation, a not-for-profit that supports the educational outcomes of Children in Out of Home Care, show:

- More than 45,000 Australian Children are currently in out of home care.

- 92% of children in foster care are below the average reading level by age 7.

- 57% of young people who grow up in care manage to complete Year 12 or equivalent, compared to the national average of 85%.

### Challenges

MASP CEO Charmaine Calis said these statistics showed the need for better

understanding of the challenges faced by children in out of home care – such as the disruptive impact of placement changes and difficulty in educational engagement.

“These statistics are in no way reflective of our wonderful foster carers, who open their hearts and homes to vulnerable children in need,” she said.

“But they are a stark reminder of the barriers these children face to achieve the same level of education as their peers. We remain committed to supporting our carers and the children to get the best outcomes for their education and their futures.”

## For Older Victorians... Free RSV Vaccination

[From Royal Australian College of GPs]

**The Royal Australian College of GPs (RACGP) has welcomed a new Victorian Government program to provide free respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) vaccines to residents aged 60 and over in public and Aboriginal community controlled aged care services.**

“This is an important new initiative that’ll protect thousands of our most vulnerable patients,” said Deputy Chair of the RACGP Victoria Faculty, Dr Palmyra De Banks.

“Every year, a raft of respiratory infections, including RSV, sweeps through aged care centres, putting older Victorians at risk.

“Protecting aged care residents, who are often among the most vulnerable members of our communities, from these life-threatening illnesses is vital. This is an excellent move by the Victorian Government.”

This follows national advocacy for free RSV vaccinations for older patients by the RACGP.

RACGP President, Dr Michael Wright, said: “We continue to advocate for free RSV vaccines for all of our at-risk populations, and it’s fantastic to see programs like this being introduced.

“Respiratory syncytial virus has a huge impact on our communities each year. It’s highly contagious – babies are at greatest risk, but other children, seniors, and patients with chronic health conditions can experience a severe infection too.

“We welcomed free RSV immunisation for babies as a fantastic move last year, but we can keep more Victorians safe.

“Just this morning, I was on the radio with a Gippsland woman who’d had to take three-and-a-half weeks off work. She said it seemed like the worst virus she’d had in her life and was still experiencing exhaustion and other symptoms. As we say about the flu, it’s not just another cold.

“Nationally, we have already seen RSV case notifications to state health services pass 100,000 this year. More than 20,000 of those were in

Victoria, and around 20% of cases were in patients over 60 – so this program is very timely.

“While providing protection for around 5,000 older Victorians is an excellent start, vulnerable patients need governments to expand their vaccination programs further to ensure all at-risk populations can, and do, access recommended vaccines to keep all our communities safe.

“The other patients recommended for vaccination in the Australian Immunisation Handbook are patients with chronic conditions that increase the odds of a severe infection aged over 60, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people over 60, and all Victorians over 75. They should be able to get a recommended vaccination without facing financial hardship.

“Free RSV vaccines are available for pregnant women thanks to the Federal Government, complemented by state- and territory-funded immunisations for babies who do not already have protection from RSV through the mother’s vaccination.

“We continue to call on all governments to expand their programs to include all patients identified as being at risk in the Australian Immunisation Handbook.”

## Help Improve On Farm Connectivity Program

**The Australian Government is seeking input from community and industry stakeholders on the popular On Farm Connectivity Program to ensure it is delivering the best possible outcomes for primary producers through the upcoming third round.**

Through over \$30 million in rebates provided over the first two rounds, thousands of primary producers have been able to extend connectivity and take advantage of connected machinery and sensor technology.

The Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communications, Sport and the Arts has commenced public consultation on design aspects of Round 3, ahead of opening applications later this year.

The department is requesting feedback on options to adjust the Program to ensure opportunities are optimised for primary producers to address connectivity gaps, particularly in light of the unprecedented demand in Round 2.

### Changes

Proposed changes to the Program including refining the scope of equipment eligible for rebate, and streamlining processes by providing rebates directly to primary producers.

The public consultation builds on discussions already under way with state and Commonwealth government agencies and industry representatives, including the National Farmers’ Federation, as well as feedback already received following delivery of the first two rounds.

The Government has allocated \$53 million across all

three rounds of the Program over 2023-24 to 2025-26, as part of the Government’s Better Connectivity Plan for Regional and Rural Australia.

## Delay to New Aged Care Act: Win for Older Australians

“This decision is the result of months of intense discussions and calls for practical timelines for the sector. We know that rushed reforms would put levels of care at risk for older people,” Ageing Australia CEO, Tom Symondson, said.

“We applaud the Government for listening to the concerns of the aged care sector and putting the needs of older Australians first.

“We fully support the new rights-based Aged Care Act, but the simple truth is, we’re not ready to introduce all the sweeping reforms by July 1.

Providers have been working around the clock to ensure a smooth transition, but we just haven’t received all the information we need in order to proceed.

“The additional time will give us the critical space we need to finalise agreements, systems, and processes.

“This is a win for the 1.4 million older Australians, who rely on aged care. We need to do this reform once and do it right. We hope this extension will help us get closer to that goal.”

Ageing Australia congratulates the Albanese Government, new Aged Care Minister Sam Rae, and Minister for Health and Ageing and NDIS Mark Butler for this decision – which puts older Australians first.

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# ATO App Gives Protection

**As millions of Australians are preparing to lodge their tax returns, scammers are actively seeking new ways to exploit personal information.**

If successful, they can use stolen details not only to commit fraud against the Australian Taxation Office (ATO), but also carry out broader identity theft and financial crimes across the community.

The ATO has reported a sharp rise in impersonation scams, with a 150 per cent increase over the last 12 months; 90 per cent of ATO impersonation scams are currently being sent via email.

Scammers are constantly enhancing their methods to impersonate the ATO, making it increasingly difficult for individuals to recognise fraudulent messages. Staying informed and vigilant is essential to protecting personal information.

To help keep your personal information safe and protected, the ATO's app now has powerful new safety features designed to give users real-time control over their tax affairs, through alerts and instant account locking, to help stop fraudsters in their tracks.

The app enhancements bolster the ATO's existing fraud controls that have been in place for some time to detect unusual or out of pattern behaviour on taxpayers' accounts.

## Stop, Check, Protect

"This is the time of year when people are awaiting

their tax returns or expecting to hear from the ATO, and scammers know it," said ATO Assistant Commissioner, Rob Thomson.

"That's why we've strengthened the ATO app with new security features. It's fast, free, and puts security in your hands, giving you the power to monitor your account in real-time and instantly lock it if something doesn't feel right."

"Downloading the ATO app is a simple and effective way to stay one step ahead.

"If you receive a notification and something doesn't feel right, lock your account immediately in our app, and verify and report the interaction on the ATO website or by calling 1800 467 033 during business hours to discuss any suspicious activity."

## Fraudsters Getting Smarter

Fraudsters are getting smarter, but so are the protective features in the app. The ATO app now includes new security features designed to help you stay protected, such as:

- Real-time messages when changes are made to your ATO record.

- Quick account locking when you receive a real-time message to prevent unauthorised access or fraudulent refunds.

These features provide peace of mind, knowing your account is protected and you remain in control of your tax affairs anytime, anywhere.

The ATO works closely with the National Anti-Scam Centre (NASC), which operates under the ACCC, to protect Australian's identity information from scams through awareness and education that focuses on three simple steps – stop, check, protect. This partnership strengthens our ability to detect and respond to scam threats, especially during peak periods like tax time.

"If you receive an unsolicited contact claiming to be from the ATO and offering any of these options, it's very likely a scam. Scammers may also use spoofed phone numbers, fake caller IDs, and convincing email templates to appear legitimate," said ACCC Deputy Chair Catriona Lowe.

"Don't let scammers pressure you. We urge all Australians to 'stop, check and protect' before reacting to an unexpected call or message and keep front of mind that the ATO and myGov do not use links in their messages."

## Unique to You

Fraudsters and scammers plan on you being distracted and thrive on weak security. Your first line of defence is

the ATO app, followed by:

- Using a digital ID like myID to securely access online services. It's unique to you and helps protect you from identity theft and fraud across platforms like tax, education, and government services.

- Knowing how to spot and report scams impersonating the ATO. It only takes a few seconds to stop and check an interaction is legitimate. Remember, the ATO will never send you a link asking for your personal information or for you to log into online services.

- Turning on multi-factor authentication wherever possible.

- Using strong and unique passwords or passphrases.

- Keeping your devices and software updated to block the latest threats.

- And most importantly, never share your TFN, myGov login, or bank details even in private messages or emails. These are keys to your identity.

If you've received a suspicious call, SMS, email or social media message: Visit verify or report a scam to check or report it.

If you've shared personal information or paid a scammer, call the ATO immediately on 1800 008 540.


The plane used for this world renowned performance was the Grumman Ag. Cat aircraft powered by a 450 hp Pratt and Whitney engine.

While the Skycats do their presentation, a pyrotechnic smoke display exudes from the wing tips as the pilot manoeuvres the plane through a series of loops and barrel rolls. The "Skycats" in real life are two very athletic women, who perform skilfully on the aircraft wings while combating a 150 kph slipstream as the plane flies through the sky. This presentation by these women and pilot in their flying machine was a crowd favourite.

This airshow event reminds me of another even more unconventional flight, which comes not from an airshow, but a quiet back yard. The story is told of a 33-year-old truck driver Larry Walters who had a habit of spending his weekends in his Los Angeles backyard, just south of LA International airport, drinking Pepsi and eating peanut butter sandwiches. He would sit in his favourite deck chair staring at the houses around him in the subdivision where he lived.

## Balloons and Helium



# Charlton 100 Years Ago

(Information from "East Charlton Tribune")

July 4 to 8, 1925.

**Terrapée:** Successful was the dance held in aid of the local School funds. All concerned are to be congratulated on the result of their efforts.

**Fourteenth Annual Golf Open Tournament:** The Tournament is recognised as one of the leading fixtures of its kind in the State of Victoria. The number of entries has never been excelled. The links were in fine order, and the conditions, on the whole, were excellent for the pastime of the niblick, the cleek and the mashie. Metropolitan and provincial golfers were among the competitors. The Men's Championship was secured by F. Jennings. The convenience of the enlarged, remodelled Club House, with its dining room, kitchen and two dressing rooms, was greatly appreciated. The President, Mr John Windsor, and the Secretary, Mr C. O. Williams, carried out the arrangements. The Ball, held in the Victoria Hall, was enjoyable. The supper was something to write home about.

**Grand Going:** Motoring has its joys (many of them) and its sorrows – fortunately few. Singularly free from the latter has been Mr W. Crutch, who owns a fine Buick. Including the distance covered in taking it from Melbourne to Charlton, this automobile has done fully 10,500 miles to date; and never once in that distance has the pump had to be applied to the lefthand front tyre.

**Health Regulations:** In the Court of Petty Sessions Charles Hando and Leonard Cassell, butchers, were proceeded against. The first charge was that they had allowed certain swine to have access to offal which had not been boiled for at least one hour. The second charge was failure to keep their slaughtering premises in the condition required. Mr Crowe, for the defendants, pointed out that they were tenants of the property and the defects had since been remedied. A new concrete floor had been put in the killing pen. The offal had not been fed to the pigs, but they gained access to it owing to defects in the fence of the pig yard. The yard has now been completely enclosed with a pig-proof fence.

**Marmal's Brilliant Night:** For once the organiser and Committee of a social function were thankful for bad roads and showers which

prevented many people from attending the Marmal Fun Frolic held on behalf of the School. Otherwise, the Hall could not have held the number. As it was, the crowd was too dense to make dancing a pleasure, but some novelty dances and "Back to Childhood" games kept the fun ball rolling. It was the largest attendance seen in the Marmal Hall since the opening, over 20 years ago. Carnival novelties were distributed at the commencement of the evening. The costumes were varied and beautiful and the judges had a hard time. The prize of the night was secured by Miss M. A. O'Meara.

**Third in Motor Sales:** From Lane's Motors Pty Ltd, Melbourne, Messrs H. J. Jackson and Son, local agents for Buick cars, received a letter expressing satisfaction in regard to the sales of that celebrated make of car effected by the well-known Charlton firm during the past year. An abstract of the numbers of Buick cars sold and delivered in that period by all dealers in Victoria shows Charlton third on the list for the State. The placings are: Bendigo 1, Geelong 2, Charlton 3, Ultima 4, Horsham 5, Ballarat and Warrnambool equal 6, Warracknabeal 7, Jeparit 8, Casterton 9, Castlemaine and Nhill equal 10, Cobram 11, Colac 12. The position is one of which Messrs Jackson and Son have reason to be proud.

## Call for Eligible Criteria Review on Drought Funding

Northern Grampians Shire and Horsham Rural City councils are calling on the State Government to thoroughly review its eligibility criteria for its latest round of drought funding, which excludes the municipalities' farmers despite some of the most challenging conditions in recent memory.

Earlier this month, the government announced an additional \$75 million in drought support for farmers in Victoria's south-west, including \$35.8 million for Primary Producer Support Payments to provide eligible farmers with the equivalent of a 40 per cent reduction on their property rates.

The payments will provide much-needed cash-flow relief for farmers in 12 Local Government Areas (LGAs), including Ararat, Southern Grampians and southern parts of West Wimmera, but not Northern Grampians or Horsham Rural City.

### Inequitable Application

Northern Grampians Shire mayor, Karen Hyslop, said both councils were concerned and disappointed about the inequitable application of drought grants and assistance packages, including Farm Drought Support Grants (formerly On-Farm Drought Infrastructure Grants).

"The drought support grants provide farmers in our shire, and Horsham Rural City, with grants of up to \$5000, while farmers in neighbouring LGAs may access up to \$10,000," she said.

"Now the additional \$75 million drought assistance package, which includes rate rebates, and food and grocery support among other relief, is not available to us at all."

"Given both LGAs are experiencing ongoing drought conditions across the region, we are advocating for equitable access to financial support for all affected farming communities," he said.

Cr Hyslop and Horsham Rural City mayor Ian Ross have written letters to Premier Jacinta Allan and Agriculture Minister Ros Spence respectively, advocating for their municipalities to be made eligible for further drought relief.

### Soaring Costs

Cr Ross said livestock maintenance costs had soared, while the depletion of pasture and seed banks had made it nearly impossible for farmers to sustain their operations without external support.

"Our farmers are battling conditions far worse than we've seen in recent history," he said.

"With the high cost of maintaining livestock and the long-term implications for local farming families, we are deeply disappointed by the exclusion of our southern regions from the Primary Producer Support Payments.

"To have these areas excluded from the new support measures is a blow to our agricultural community, and council is calling for a review to address this oversight.

"These farmers need assistance now more than ever."

Cr Ross said he believed the exclusion of Horsham municipality's southern and western areas from the latest drought support measures, not only contradicted previous decisions, but also undermined the hard work and resilience of local farmers.

"The contradiction between being included in earlier drought relief programs and then being excluded from the latest support payments is creating unnecessary confusion," he said.

"We are calling on the government to ensure that all drought-affected farmers, regardless of location, receive the support they need."

### Latest Measures

The latest drought support measures, which along with the Primary Producer Support Payments, include \$2 million for Country Women's Association to deliver household payments of \$1000 in eligible LGAs; \$5.9 million to continue technical decision-making support, mental health services, farm-debt mediation and engagement activities for another 12 months; a \$6.3 million fee-and-duty-relief package; waiving indexation on biosecurity fees; and \$15 million towards extending the East Grampians Rural Pipeline, also known as the Mininera Rural Pipeline – stem from the government's new drought response taskforce.

Taskforce members include government ministers and representatives from local government, banks and the Victorian Farmers Federation.

Regional Cities Victoria and Rural Councils Victoria have also been advocating heavily on behalf of local councils, including Horsham Rural City and Northern Grampians Shire, and are represented on the taskforce.

In her letter to the premier, Cr Hyslop extended her appreciation and support for the taskforce, which she said she believed had strong potential to deliver meaningful and lasting outcomes.

"However, we are concerned by the absence of direct representation from the Wimmera region on the task-

force and the absence of communication to date regarding its activities, plans and opportunities for engagement," she said.

"Regular updates, clear lines of communication and access to any emerging support programs would greatly assist council in co-ordinating local efforts and ensuring our communities are informed and connected to the process."

### Invitation

Cr Hyslop said she would welcome an opportunity to work with the taskforce and extended an invitation to host a taskforce meeting in Northern Grampians Shire.

"Here, we could facilitate engagement with local farmers, enabling taskforce members to hear firsthand the concerns of our agricultural community and better understand how support packages can meet local needs," she said.

"As our areas have been experiencing the effects of drought for quite some time, our region is experiencing significant economic, social and mental health pressures.

"We welcome the government's commitment to supporting farming communities and believe the taskforce has strong potential to deliver meaningful and lasting outcomes."



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# Blast from the Past

(From the "Donald Times", July, 1925)

**"Common" for cows.** It will be remembered that, some time ago, the Council applied to the Lands Department for permission to use that piece of land between the cricket ground and the river as an enclosure where owners of cows within the town might place them at night. At last, after the usual amount of red-tape being unwound, the following communication has been received: "With reference to the water reserve area situated in the north of the town of Donald, we have to inform you that the offer of the Shire Council to pay £1 per annum for the right to graze this reserve is accepted". It was resolved to forward the fee at once.

**July 7. Unfortunate Accident.** While in Minyip on Saturday last, Mr. Alf. Lewis had an unfortunate experience while backing his lorry in the main street. When he commenced to back, the coast was clear, but a little boy who had been playing on the other side of the street must evidently have followed one of his companions across towards the moving lorry. Mr Lewis had no idea the lad was about until after the accident happened. The unfortunate youngster was negotiating a "scooter" at the time, and was evidently unable to get clear when he found himself running into the back of the vehicle. The wheel did not pass over him, but in some way he became entangled under the back axle with his scooter and suffered abrasions to the side of

the head. Later news has been received to the effect that the accident has ended fatally. (The boy was Philip Rowan, aged two-an-a-half, who was riding a trike.)

# The Many Uses of Vinegar

Over centuries vinegar has been used in various concoctions for a variety of purposes, but, not surprisingly, it still has a place within the modern home.

Commonly available white vinegar is a safe and natural product that can be used as an anti-mould agent, as a mild disinfectant, as a bleach or deodorant, as a general purpose cleaner and, in the garden, as a natural herbicide. Best of all, it

is environmentally safe and simple to use.

In the laundry vinegar can be used to fix the colour in new clothing by soaking the item in a weak vinegar solution for two hours before a normal wash. As a fabric softener it is excellent;

simply soak the garment overnight in a solution of one part vinegar to three parts water, then rinse well. By adding half-a-cup of vinegar to the wash and rinse cycles of your machine, you will remove all traces of soap from your clothes. To eliminate fluff or lint on your sheets add one cup of vinegar to the final rinse instead.

When it's time to give your washing machine and the hoses a good clean, add three cups of vinegar to a normal water cycle with no clothes in the machine. Repeat this procedure about every three months and you'll save on costly repair bills.

Vinegar also makes an excellent cleanser and disinfectant for use in the bathroom. To sanitise your toilet and leave it smelling fresh, just pour some


white vinegar in the bowl and leave overnight. It is completely safe to use in septic systems, since it won't harm the microbes that break down the sewerage in the tank.

Vinegar and cooking salt will clean baths and sinks, or use it on its own to clean shower curtains, to remove rust stains from baths and sinks, and to eliminate mould and mildew from bathroom surfaces. To remove mould, leave it overnight before scrubbing off and wiping clean.

Around the outside of the home, vinegar can be used as a weed killer due to the acetic acid it contains, which damages and dries out plant tissues. A common DIY recipe involves mixing white vinegar, salt, and liquid soap. The vinegar acts as a contact herbicide, meaning it

only affects the parts of the plant it touches. It's generally recommended for use on pathways, patios, and driveways where you want to avoid using chemical herbicides. In a bucket, combine two litres of white vinegar, half-a-cup of Epsom salts and one tablespoon of liquid soap, stirring until the salt has dissolved; use a garden sprayer to apply to weeds. You can adjust the recipe, depending on the quantity of the natural herbicide that you need. Spray the solution directly on to the weeds, ensuring thorough coverage of the leaves and stems. For best results, apply on a sunny day when the weeds are not wet from dew or rain.

quote to deliver practical advice on subjects such as feed budgeting, farm business and financial management and managing farm water shortages.

"We are looking for specialists to deliver our one-on-one service, which offers farmers the opportunity to sit down one-on-one with a consultant to discuss the best way forward for their business in the current season.

## Managing Kangaroos On Your Farm

The Victorian Government is providing \$1.8 million to help drought-affected farmers control eastern and western grey kangaroos under an approved authority to control wildlife (ATCW).

Farmers whose livestock are competing with kangaroos for fodder can apply for rebates to engage professional harvesters to manage kangaroos under an ATCW.

### Key Points

- Rebates of up to \$450 (ex-GST) per farm, up to 3 claims.
- Farmers to contribute at least 25% of the cost.
- Fast-track ATCW permit processing by the Conservation Regulator.
- Funding until June 30, 2026 or until funds are exhausted.

- Related costs, such as harvester travel and ammunition.
- On-farm disposal expenses. Guidelines can be found on the Agriculture Victoria website.

# Volunteer Fire Body Slams Lack of Answers

The key body supporting volunteer firefighters has slammed the Victorian Government's lack of budget transparency and cruel emergency services tax.

After the Liberals and Nationals called out Labor for refusing in Parliament to confirm cuts to the Country Fire Authority's budget, Volunteer Fire Brigades Victoria (VFBV) has launched its own stinging attack.

Budget cuts to the CFA, SES and Fire Rescue Victoria were revealed by the Treasurer in a Government Gazette, but the Minister and the Premier have refused to acknowledge them.

In its monthly newsletter, VFBV chief executive officer, Adam Barnett, has mocked Labor for secrecy on CFA budget cuts as it hits Victorians with a new emergency services tax.

"If I love you" are the three hardest words in the English language according to Hollywood and boybands,

then 'The CFA budget is....' must be the four hardest words for a Victorian MP to utter," Mr Barnett wrote in reference to Labor's secrecy.

In Question Time in Parliament and across two weeks of public estimates hearings, neither the Premier, Treasurer or Emergency Services Minister would confirm the CFA's budget – nor that of the SES or Fire Rescue Victoria.

## Handball

"Each handballed to the other, with the Premier's testimony, in particular, a sickening example of meaningless rhetoric dressed up as compassion and empathy that ultimately ignores the very people they claim to support," Mr Barnett wrote.

Labor is taking more – through the cruel emergency services – and giving less.

"Despite documenting a record tax hike under its new emergency services tax, less of that money is making its way to the CFA than ever before," Mr Barnett wrote.

"The extra money collected is now being diverted to government departments and public sector employees, making a mockery that this new tax would be supporting Victoria's front line emergency services.

## Reality

"This is the reality of the new emergency services tax. Gouging the eyes out of Victorian property owners without actually addressing the fundamental issues of Victoria's creaking old fire truck fleet."

Shadow Minister for Emergency Services, Danny O'Brien, said volunteers were being consistently short-changed.

"The VFBV is confirming what we all know – Labor is cutting the CFA budget while hitting us with a new tax," Mr O'Brien said.

"Labor keeps denying there's a cut to the CFA, but there's only one way to back up the denials – give us a straight answer to a simple question.

"The Nationals and Liberals will scrap the emergency services tax in government and will continue to fight for all volunteers."

# Call for Safety Around Schools

RACV is reminding all road users to exercise extra caution around school zones as students return to classrooms across the state.

RACV Head of Policy, James Williams said motorists need to be careful when driving and parking around schools.

"When we obey speed limits and exercise patience and caution, we are role-modelling road safety behaviours," he said.

According to the Transport Accident Commission (TAC), approximately seven children aged 0-15 die each year on Victorian roads. Children are particularly vulnerable around roads due to their reduced visibility, limited ability to judge speed and distance, and tendency to act impulsively.

RACV is highlighting the following road rules to prioritise safety around schools:

## School Speed Zones

Most Victorian schools have designated speed zones reducing limits to 40km/h where regular limits are below 80km/h, and to 60km/h where regular limits are 80km/h or higher.

Time-based school zones typically operate 8:00-9:30 a.m. and 2:30-4:00 p.m. on weekdays during school terms.

Research shows that pedestrians hit by a vehicle travelling at 40km/h have significantly higher survival rates than those hit at 50 or 60km/h.

Motorists face fines and demerit points for failing to comply with posted limits.

## Children's Crossings

- Recognisable by bright orange "Children Crossing" flags.

- All vehicles must stop for pedestrians waiting to cross when flags are displayed.

- Drivers must remain stopped until crossing is completely clear.

- Crossing supervisors may be present but the rules apply regardless.

## Parking and Drop-off Areas

- Parents should familiarise themselves with school-specific parking arrangements.

- "Kiss and Go" zones allow for quick drop-offs without leaving vehicles (two-minute maximum).

- Parking is prohibited within 20 metres before and 10 metres after school crossings.

- Double parking, stopping in bus zones, or in "No Stopping" areas is illegal.

- Safety tips for walking and cycling.

RACV notes a concerning decline in active transportation to schools. According to Victoria Walks, only about 15 per cent of Australian students regularly walk or ride to school today, compared to 45 per cent in 1974.

## Recommendations

For families choosing active transportation, RACV recommends:

- Supervising primary-aged children until around age 12.

- Holding hands with children under five near any roadway.

- Teaching children to remain alert and avoid distractions.

- Meeting children on the school side of the road during pick-up.

- Ensuring all cyclists wear helmets (children under 12 and accompanying adults may ride on footpaths).

- Ensuring children under the age of 16 do not ride on e-scooters outside of private property.

"School zones exist for the safety of our youngest and most vulnerable road users," added Mr Williams.

"Everyone shares responsibility for creating a safe environment around schools, whether you're a parent, teacher, or simply a passing motorist."

"Congestion at school drop off is a point of frustration for many parents and carers. It is worth considering parking a block away and walking the last part of the journey to the school. It's a great way to avoid congestion while increasing active travel."

Over the past 12 months RACV has educated 15,220 students from more than 140 schools as part of its RACV Safety Squad program. The program focuses on safety tips for pedestrians, passengers and bike-riders. Schools that aim to empower students to stay safe both at home and on the roads can learn more through the RACV Website.

# Global Appetites for Red Meat Continues

Australia's red meat industry exported new record volumes of beef and mutton in the 2024-2025 financial year.

According to Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA), total beef and veal exports for the financial year reached 1.4 million tonnes, the highest annual volume ever. Mutton exports also hit a new record at 256,104 tonnes. Lamb exports totalled 363,109 tonnes, making it the second-largest financial year for lamb exports.

June 2025 alone saw 134,593 tonnes of beef exported, marking the highest monthly beef export volume ever. This figure represents a 4% increase from May, and a 27% rise compared to June 2024.

According to MLA Managing Director Michael Crowley,

these results reflect the strength of global demand for Australia's red meat sector.

## Not Just a Milestone

"Achieving record exports across both beef and sheepmeat in a single financial year is not just a milestone – it's a reflection of Australia's resilience and agility in a competitive global market," Mr Crowley said.

"We've seen double-digit growth in chilled and frozen exports, strong performance across both grassfed and grainfed beef, and significant increases in key markets like Mainland China, South Korea, and the United States.

"These results are underpinned by the industry's commitment to quality, sustainability, and innovation, as well as the strength of our trade relationships."

Total red meat exports in June 2025 reached 209,074 tonnes, 20% higher than the same month last year. Chilled exports rose 11% year-on-year to 44,715 tonnes, while frozen exports increased 22% to 164,359 tonnes.

Beef exports to the United States were particularly strong, totalling 35,343 tonnes in June, which is 23% higher than the same month last year.

## Strong Demand

"Despite facing the 10% imposed tariff by the United States, Australian red meat continues to command strong demand, enhanced by our international reputation for product quality, safety, and supply chain integrity," Mr Crowley said.

Other key markets also saw significant growth in June, including South Korea and South-East Asia which recorded increases of 16% and 20% respectively.

Lamb exports in June totalled 32,437 tonnes, 4% higher than June 2024 despite a seasonal dip from May. Exports to Greater China rose 53% year-on-year, and exports to Canada jumped 93%.

Grainfed beef exports rose 29% year-on-year to 39,886

tonnes, and grassfed exports climbed 26% to 94,707 tonnes.

## Global Leader

"These figures show that Australia is maintaining its position as a global leader in red meat exports but expanding upon it," Mr Crowley said.

"With continued focus in sustainability, quality assurance, and strategic market access, Australia is well-positioned to build on this momentum through the second half of 2025 and beyond."

# Tips to Protect Farm Waterways

Sensible decisions to protect farm waterways, and the farm as a business, are among a new set of practical tips from EPA Victoria and Agriculture Victoria.

EPA Director of Operations for Regional Victoria Jessica Bandiera, says if your farm fronts a creek, stream or body of water, the document "Reducing the impacts of grazing on water quality" is a collection of what works best in preventing erosion, sediment and loss of vegetation.

"This is about making choices on managing stock, land and vegetation that become lasting, passive protections for the waterway," Ms Bandiera said.

"It explains the risks to waterways from grazing and offers practical measures to prevent them without hampering normal operations of the farm," she said.

## The Risks

The risks to riparian land can include:

- Overgrazing, especially during winter or drought.

• Feeding stock too close to waterways.

• Allowing animals with calves or lambs on to riparian land.

• Allowing stock to directly access waterways.

• Allowing runoff with sediment, nutrients and contaminants to flow into waterways.

The practical tips include:

• Fencing to keep stock away from river or creek banks.

• Installing of off-stream watering.

• Revegetation to stabilise banks and fight erosion.

- Carefully managing grazing rates.

• Keeping stock feed, fertiliser and manure away from waterways.

## The Signs

The guidance also explains the signs to watch out for, so you can protect the waterway, native plants and wildlife, and your land, before the problem becomes critical.

It was produced to support farmers and build their understanding of how to comply with the Environment Protection legislation, and minimise their environmental risks so far as reasonably practicable.

"Reducing the impacts of grazing on water quality" is an easy download from the EPA website.
