In the Beginning . . .

"The Times" newspaper printed in Donald will turn 150 near the end of this month. While time and space prevent us from going into too much detail, we must at least pay tribute to the founder of the publication, the late Godfrey Morgan, pictured here all those years ago with members of the staff and young family members.

In succeeding years, for reasons of necessity, the newspaper has progressed from being the "Donald Times" to the "Donald Birchip Times" and now the "Buleke Times".

"Past and Present", a 113-page publication by the "Donald Times" in June, 1926, contained an historical record of the Donald and district from 1845 to 1925. Included is a detailed history of the "Donald Times" in its first 50 years, beginning with the arrival in Australia of Godfrey Morgan, at the age of about 16 years.

First obtaining a position with the Melbourne "Argus", he later became associated, in turn, with the Maryborough "Advertiser", the Moonabel "Pioneer", and the "Landsborough Times".

From there, with his wife and family, he found his way to Donald, where, in a small premises at the northern end of the main street, the first edition of the "Donald Times" was printed on July 29, 1875.

For 49 years, the business was conducted by the Morgan family. In 1922, it was sold to its new editor Godfrey (Goff) Letts and foreman Charles E. Chells, both of whom were at that time members of the "Times" office staff.

Born at Kalgoorlie, Mr Letts was a grandson of the founder of the newspaper, while Mr. Chells was a native of Shepparton, where he learned his trade as printer and press operator.

At the time of his death, in 1987, at the age of 89, Goff Letts had served 66 years as editor of the "Times", after having begun his career as a journalist with the "Kalgoorlie Miner" newspaper.

Currently the "Times" staff includes two more members of the Godfrey Morgan newspaper dynasty, great-grandson Robin Letts and great-great-grandson David Letts.

Recently retiring after a highly-valued lifetime career with the "Times" are Donald residents Brian Bayles and Shane O'Shea, while further along the

Sunraysia Highway, Simone Christie has followed in the footsteps of her cousin, the late Janet Lee, as indispensable manager of the Birchip office.

With country newspapers being largely dependent upon members of surrounding communities for reports of local events, the "Times" is also most appreciative of the writing and photographic skills of Jenny Pollard of Teddywaddy West, as well as the co-operation of many other contributors.

The "Times" management expresses its heartfelt thanks to all who have been associated with the progress of its bi-weekly publication since 1875.

As today's issue goes to press, those directly involved in making it possible in most recent times include staff members Patsy Dunstan, Candece Jay, Carmen Bath, Quill McQuilty, Alyssa Walker, Daniel Puentes and racing writer Peter Hibberd.

Which brings us back to the man whose vision made it all possible – the late Godfrey Morgan. No recollections would be complete without references to two of his other great grandsons Ewan Letts and the late Godfrey (Goff) Letts Jnr., whose brilliantly-written editorials featured regularly in the "Times" until this year.

MASP CEO Charmaine Calis said the plan would empower MASP to move forward and create better cohesion with Aboriginal communities across its service area.

"Developing our first ever RAP has been an eye-opening and thought-provoking process for MASP," she said.

"MASP looks forward to strengthening our ties with our local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community members as we continue our purpose to empower our community to be free from homelessness, abuse, poverty and disadvantage."

Reconciliation Australia oversees four different RAP types – Reflect, Innovate, Stretch and Elevate – to allow organisations to continuously develop their reconciliation commitments.

MASP has completed a Reflect RAP – which included engaging staff and leaders to understand the

importance of reconciliation while developing relationships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander stakeholders.

"MASP's Reflect RAP is the first step towards MASP engaging in reconciliation

meaningfully," Mrs Calis said.

"We acknowledge this is only the beginning of MASP's reconciliation journey and we look forward to continuing to progress as an organisation into the future."

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

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Seasonal Firefighter Applications Now Open

Applications are now open for seasonal firefighter roles across Victoria.

Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) is employing 500 seasonal firefighters prior to the summer bushfire season.

FFMVic Chief Fire Officer, Chris Hardman, said seasonal firefighters boost Victoria's firefighting capacity in the lead-up to summer and during the peak fire season.

"New recruits will train and work alongside our permanent firefighting staff, responding to bushfires rapidly

to keep communities safe this summer," Mr Hardman said.

"They will be part of a team of close to 1800 frontline personnel and 1200 accredited incident management staff this bushfire season."

Last year Forest Fire Management Victoria firefighters responded to more than 1265 bushfires across the state, and delivered priority planned burns which will help reduce the impact of bushfires this summer.

"Emergency response deployments can occur anywhere across the state, providing opportunities to travel and work in different locations," Mr Hardman said.

"In previous seasons, some recruits have also been deployed to support firefighting efforts across Australia and internationally."

Loddon Mallee Region Deputy Chief Fire Officer, Scott Falconer, said seasonal firefighter roles provide

rewarding career opportunities for those with a passion for the outdoors, learning new skills and making a difference.

"In addition to responding to bushfires and helping to deliver planned burns, new recruits will also undertake pest and weed control works, and maintain recreational reserves, strategic fire breaks and forest roads," Mr Falconer said.

"They can also be called on to support other emergencies such as major floods, storms and biosecurity incidents.

"Many of the firefighters deployed to the current Canadian bushfires started their careers as project firefighters," he said.

Applications are now open for seasonal firefighter roles across 16 locations in the Loddon Mallee region including: Bendigo, Heathcote, Maryborough, Rushworth, St Arnaud, Castlemaine, Co-huna, Inglewood, Macedon, Mildura, Hattah, Hopetoun,

Robinvale, Swan Hill, Underbool and Werrimull.

FFMVic is committed to a diverse and inclusive workplace that reflects the Victorian community. As part of its ongoing commitment to support meaningful careers for current and future First Nations staff, designated positions are available.

Applications close July 27 and employment occurs between October and May, with some variations depending on seasonal requirements.

In a move to support a cleaner, safer community, Horsham Rural City Council has introduced a more affordable option for residents to dispose of unwanted tyres – helping to reduce illegal dumping and protect the local environment.

The initiative has been introduced to tackle the significant rise in tyre dumping across bushland, rural roadsides, and waterways observed over the past twelve months. To address this, the reduced disposal fee is now available at the Horsham Transfer Station.

Director Infrastructure, John Martin, said the change is part of council's broader effort to make responsible waste disposal more accessible for everyone.

"We know that the cost of disposal can be a barrier for some people, so we're doing

our part by lowering the fee for residents to drop off tyres at our waste facility," Mr Martin said.

"This is about making it easier for people to do the right thing. We want to give our community practical solutions – not just penalties.

"Dumping tyres not only looks terrible – it can leach chemicals into the soil, create fire hazards, and attract vermin," Mr Martin added. "We all benefit when our parks, roadsides and natural areas are clean and cared for."

In addition, Council is closely monitoring known

dumping hotspots and continuing to work with the Environment Protection Authority (EPA) to investigate and fine offenders.

To further support safe waste practices, council has also introduced a small charge for the disposal of white-goods, particularly refrigerators. This covers the cost of professionally removing harmful gases from fridges before recycling, preventing environmental damage.

Her topic on the morning was “Safety In Your Home”.

Clients over 65 notice their senses decline and balance becomes an issue, including driving. There are simple precautions which can be taken, especially to prevent falls and specialist equipment is available.

Home is most important. Front and back doorways, bathroom lighting, and level paths. Enclosed doorways for carrying groceries in inclement weather, retractable hoses, level landings, doorbells, railings and ramps, are just a few, plus sliding doors. Emma then spoke about individual rooms and their needs for safety.

Bathroom: A stepless shower, chair or stool, slipper mats, railing and handles, a big enough shower to move

around in. Shower floor should dry quickly.

Bedroom: close to bathroom. Solid mattress. Telephone close by. Extras available if needed such as lift beds, bed stick, overhead pole.

Hallway: Nothing obstructive, good lighting.

Loungeroom: Suitable chair – maybe recliner.

Kitchen: Drawers instead of cupboards, keep frequently used items on bench. Use aids to open jars etc. Bigger cutlery, kettle tippers, armrest on chairs, heat resistant mats under plates.

Advised to REGISTER WITH MY AGED CARE.

Self: Personal alarm, suitable footwear, not slippers because of looseness, scooters, fire safety, fire plan – cooking and heating. Eating and sleeping well. Good exercise.

Medication: See doctor regularly. Balance and mobility.

Donald is well catered for with 2 podiatrists, 2 dieticians (who recommend eating lots of protein/meat); District nursing, trying to keep people in their homes; continence nurse; mental health social workers; grief counselling; home care-cleaning, helping shower; meals on wheels; home maintenance; speech pathology; housing; carers support and respite; and palliative care.

If you need any of the above contact the hospital, which will put you in touch with the correct person.

Emma gave a very informative talk to our age group and was thanked by Enid Brasier.

Following lunch, the usual birthday cake cutting ceremony was carried out by president Ian assisted by two of the club's long-standing members, Betty Wood and Lorraine Pearse, which concluded another enjoyable event.

Drought Relief Package “Too Little, Too Late”

(Statement from the Shadow Minister for Agriculture, Emma Kealy.)

The relief package for drought-hit farmers announced by the Allan Labor Government is a sad case of too little, too late.

It is no more than a starting point and has come far too slowly, given farmers in the state's south-west have been battling the big dry for two years.

After so much hardship, farmers have been handed financial relief that falls well short of recommendations by the Drought Relief Taskforce.

Although farmers are now eligible for a 40 per cent reduction in their rates, the taskforce recommended a 100 per cent reduction – total rate relief.

Despite recent rain, access to affordable water and feed remains a priority.

The package includes funding for the East Grampians Rural Pipeline. The government must now get on with the job of finishing the project in full – with no more delays.

The pipeline was promised in 2018 to supply the region with water year-round. There are no more excuses – this latest investment must finally finish the project.

Overall, this financial assistance package clearly doesn't go far enough.

All Labor has managed, after months of dragging its

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Keep Your Home Fragrantly Fresh in Winter

During the winter months most homes are invariably kept shut tight to keep warm air in and cold air from entering. However, usually by the middle of winter, this can often lead to an accumulation of not-so-pleasant odours, especially cooking smells that have become stale.

The refreshing and aromatic properties of herbs and flowers can be used in many different ways to keep your home fragrantly fresh. They will not only remove those stale and unwanted odours, but will also make your surroundings pleasant. Their natural disinfectant properties will help to control airborne bacteria and viruses

that are prevalent during winter. This is especially important when homes are kept shut up for long periods.

In my home one of our favourite ways to keep our surroundings fresh and aromatic is to burn homemade herbal incense. It is not only easy to make, but can be custom-made to suit your personal circumstance. Herb

mixtures, such as rosemary and lavender, mint, lavender or sage, and rosemary and thyme are suitable to use. They will not only impart a delightful fragrance but will also help to eliminate mustiness and staleness.

To make your incense, reduce one tablespoon of dried fragrant herb, or herb mixture, of your choice to a powder by rubbing it through a fine wire sieve. Next, thoroughly mix the powdered herb with one tablespoon of very fine sawdust, then add one tablespoon of water in which has been dissolved one teaspoon of Gum Arabic (available from artists' suppliers, craft shops and some chemists). When all ingredients have been mixed together, shape it into small cones and allow them to dry.

Place the incense cones on small metal or ceramic dishes, or other suitable objects, and light them. The incense will slowly smoulder, filling the room with its delightful fragrance.

Burning essential oils in a simmering pot (oil burner) is another simple way to keep your home smelling fragrantly fresh, while at the same time killing airborne bacteria and fungi. A simmering pot is a small ceramic vessel with a candle inside. A saucer containing a mixture of essential oil and water sits on top and the burning candle releases its fragrant vapours.

To use your simmering pot, 10 drops of your chosen essential oil to one cup of boiling water. Preheat the saucer by

lighting the little tea-light candle, then three-quarters fill the saucer with the fragrant water, topping up as required. Essential oils that have antibacterial properties and a fresh fragrance are thyme, lavender, pine, rosemary and eucalyptus.

You can also add a delicious fragrance to your wash by putting three to five drops of lemon grass or lavender oil on a face cloth and then dropping it into the washing machine with your laundry. For a more exotic perfume, try the essential oil ylang-ylang and neroli. When cold and influenza is about, add eucalyptus, rosemary or pine oil to the wash.

During this year's colder months, keep your home

Bolstered Drought Cash... A Step in the Right Direction

The Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) says additional \$75m in Victorian Government drought support funding is a step in the right direction as parts of the state continue to face record drought conditions.

VFF President Brett Hosking said the continued support is sorely needed and testament to the sustained advocacy from VFF, farmers and the wider regional community.

"You can't overstate how devastating this drought has been to our regional communities and the only certainty we know is the recovery will take years," said Mr Hosking.

"Genuine support is what's needed and this announcement is a step in the right direction."

Highlights of the additional Victorian Government drought support include:

- \$35.8m for 12 South West Victoria councils to administer targeted drought relief.

- \$15m investment for the East Grampians Rural Pipeline.

- \$2m for the Country Women's Association to roll out food and grocery support of up to \$1000 per household.

- \$6.3m to cover the cost of farmer exemptions on government fees and charges, such as livestock transaction fees.

- \$5.5m for standpipes, emergency and private bores.

- \$3.5m towards a South-

West water strategy.

- \$1m for Catchment Management Authority employment programs.
- \$5.9m to continue the Look over the Farm Gate program and continue funding of Agriculture Victoria's farm technical decision making program.

Mr Hosking added it's the VFF's expectation that the entirety of funding allocations to local councils is fully and promptly passed on to drought-hit communities without delay.

"Our communities are hurting right now and it's my expectation that this money goes directly to drought-hit farmers straight away and paid in full. Immediate rate relief is a good example of how that can be done and is something we've been calling for," Mr Hosking said.

Increased investment to complete the East Grampians Rural Pipeline is a welcome move and will help ensure the region is better placed to respond to future droughts.

"We've been calling for this for some time and have been working hard to make this key infrastructure a reality. We are now just waiting for the Federal Water Minister, Murray Watt, to

confirm their co-contribution and work can commence on getting this done.

"Government support is vital to help the industry at this time. We've seen initial support from the Victorian Government and now we need the Federal Government to step in and do their bit," Mr Hosking said.

"We're in this for the long haul and whilst we thank the Victorian Government for their support, by no means are we out of the woods just yet. VFF has employed a Drought Support Officer to be on the ground speak to speak with farmers and rural communities and we will continue to monitor conditions and ensure government is informed to provide further support to farmers as the season continues."

Digging Deep into Microbiome Research

This World Microbiome Day, Agriculture Victoria is launching an expression of interest campaign to encourage farmers to donate soil samples to a National Soil Action Plan funded research project.

Funded by the Australian and Victorian governments, the "Soil biodiversity across landscapes" project will seek to implement priority actions from the plan under the National Soil Strategy.

Agriculture Victoria Principal Scientist, Tim Sawbridge, said he hoped to attract interest from at least 50 farmers statewide.

"We are looking at what microbiomes exist in soil and how they function across natural and farmed environments.

"A soil microbiome is a community of microbes, bacteria, invertebrates and other life forms that live within soil.

"To gain a deep understanding of their role in soil health, we're wanting a broad range of samples from various production zones and agricultural industries in Victoria," he said.

AVR is working alongside the Arthur Rylah Institute for Environmental Research (ARI) on the project to collect and analyse samples of soil from across the state.

such as state forests and parks and reserves, to AVR for analysis.

Samples are being taken at Agriculture Victoria's SmartFarms including over time at the existing DairySoils study at Ellinbank SmartFarm.

"We anticipate that farmers who express interest in submitting samples to the project will have a natural curiosity about what is living within their soil," Dr Sawbridge said.

"Everyone is set to gain from this project – researchers, farmers and land conservationists will learn more about the benefits of this microscopic subterranean world.

"We may discover ways to influence the microbiome's effect on soil productivity, nutrient uptake, soil carbon and soil capacity to recover and maintain resilience in a changing climate."

To express interest in participating in the project, farmers should email soil.microbiome@agriculture.vic.gov.au by 5 p.m., Tuesday, September 30.

Soil samples will be taken from a single geo-location to a depth of 10 cm and 30 cm from a small area on the farm.

The soil structure, chemistry, botanical information and DNA will be analysed and barcoded for comparison with other samples in the dataset.

Kicking off Breakthrough Research and Development

The Grains Research and Development Corporation (GRDC) is kick-starting engagement to shape the next phase of research, development and extension (RD&E) investment aimed at tackling long-term challenges and unlocking breakthrough opportunities for Australia's grain industry.

The engagement follows the completion of an expert, independent review to determine the "right-size" RD&E investment to continue the remarkable progress driven by Australian grain growers alongside GRDC.

The comprehensive review was instigated by GRDC in September 2024 and focused on levy revenue modelling, an RD&E capacity and ability assessment, and implications of changes to GRDC's RD&E investment levels.

GRDC Chair and South Australian primary producer Sharon Starick said the organisation and the broader Australian grains industry continued to be the beneficiaries of productivity growth, strong seasons and commodity prices and this was the driving motivator for the "right-size" review.

"GRDC is in an extremely favourable financial position. After a number of outstanding seasons coupled with strong prices, GRDC now has strong cash reserves of \$680 million," Mrs Starick said.

GRDC Chair and South Australian grower Sharon Starick said the GRDC reserves were a result of the shared success of the grains industry and GRDC RD&E. She said this was an opportunity for growers and GRDC to work together to utilise the reserves for greater investment in RD&E that was innovative, transformational and delivering productivity and profitability for growers today and into the future.

"This extraordinary position was without question made possible by growers, whose readiness to adopt practice changes and embrace innovative technologies demonstrates the immense value of RD&E to the productivity and profitability of Australian farming enterprises. Independent analysis shows

that for every dollar GRDC invests growers receive a \$6-9 return on investment.

"Critically the 'right-size' review, which was completed on schedule in June, provides strong direction on how GRDC's reserves may be strategically invested, aligned to GRDC's remit and purpose to ensure RD&E investment continues to drive growth and success for the grains sector."

Mrs Starick said GRDC would begin industry consultation later this month by liaising with growers' representative organisations, GrainGrowers Limited and Grain Producers Australia, before going out more broadly to growers over the next three months.

She said the industry consultation would build on the extensive work already undertaken by GRDC to inform the current RD&E Plan 2023-28, as well as the substantive investment areas and priorities already identified by grain growers.

"GRDC has just released our Annual Operational Plan 2025-26 which highlights the focus areas for RD&E investment for the next year and reflects our future-focused

approach. If you want to understand where we are investing, the AOP provides an overview of our extensive portfolio of RD&E projects and signals the priority areas for new investment," she said.

"We have already increased our annual RD&E investment from \$180 million to just over \$240 million per year over the past three years to meet the rising cost of delivering high-quality research. Like farm inputs research costs have continued to increase. Our RD&E investment is indexed to maintain investment in real terms and will increase to \$275 million or more over the next four years.

"Importantly, as part of our RD&E Plan 2023-28 we also have more than \$525 million in forward commitments. These research investments have been shaped by grower priorities, including direct input from our Regional Panels, and focus on delivering practical, on-farm impact."

Mrs Starick said, as part of the "right-size" review consultation, GRDC will ask grain growers and industry for their input into opportunities to identify "what's next" when it comes to strategic, transformational research.

She said it was important that GRDC continues to fill the front-end of the R&D pipeline, investing in new science and building the next generation of talent.

"GRDC reserves are a result of the shared success of the grains industry and GRDC RD&E. By working in partnership with growers and building on what we have achieved together, we can utilise the reserves to enable greater investment in RD&E that is innovative, transformational and delivering productivity and profitability for growers today and into the future," Mrs Starick said.

Charlton's defenders, led by Jed Thompson, with Elliott Fitzpatrick and Pat Soulsby in support, were doing a great job of quashing forward entries. However, with the Redbacks' midfielders, Hamish Lockhart, Mitch and Jackson McEwen getting on top, and with Zach Pallpratt providing important link between defence and attack, the Navies' defence was under constant pressure.

Lack of a key forward clearly didn't do the Navies

any favours, with forward entries often rushed; high balls not suiting Charlton's brigade of mid-sized attackers. Jensen got the ball rolling for the 'Burn, scoring the first of the day, keeping the Navies in it. The Redbacks were wasteful for the next period of play, Charlton's Ben Xiriha left ruing a golden opportunity to level up after the Navies' best passage of play in the quarter.

Mitch McEwen finally straightened up the Redbacks before Charlton debutant Ethan Needs marked on a strong lead, unfortunately unable to convert with his first kick in senior football.

Not to be outdone, the Redbacks own debutant Aaron Smith did so shortly after, goaling after finding himself in space inside fifty, that kicked off a run of three goals in "red" time for the visitors, blowing the lead out to 28 points at the first change.

An opening second quarter goal to Charlton's Liam O'Keefe, his and Charlton's second momentarily broke the Wedderburn run; from there though, all red and black.

As has been the case on many occasions this season, Charlton was unable to stem the run and ball carry of its

opposition, often allowing opponents far too much latitude and paying dearly as a result.

Wedderburn exploded during the second term, slamming through eight unanswered goals in the run to halftime. Such was the domination from the visiting side, that early O'Keefe goal was Charlton's only score in the term as their opponents ran riot, kicking five behinds to go with the eight goals for the quarter. The Navies' hard work in the opening term counted for little as lapses in concentration hurt on the scoreboard. Wedderburn was the halftime leader to the tune of 75 points.

With the game as good as decided at the main break, Wedderburn piled on further pain for Navies' supporters early in the third term. A further two goals stretched the run of unanswered goals to 10, four of which came from the boot of Jensen, and could have been another four if not for the spoiling work of Dixon and the third man up provided by Jed Thompson.

The back half of the third term proved Charlton's most productive of the afternoon, finally showing some respect to its opposition and shutting down the numerous outlets Wedderburn had previously

been able to find with ease; ball movement for the visitors became difficult. Charlton goaled through two of Charlton's best for the day, Rhys Thompson and Ben Lanyon, toiling tirelessly in the ruck against the Redbacks' twin towers, brothers from other mothers. The lead grew slightly to 82 points by the end of the third.

The last quarter somewhat replicated the second, kicking to the town end with the breeze at their backs, after Charlton kicked the first of the term. A strong mark to young Seb Zagame, a wasteful Wedderburn then had all the play, bursting into space and running hard (a trademark of the Redbacks' day), they could easily have put through a further 10 goals in the last quarter except for inaccurate kicking. Smith kicked his third in an encouragingly lively first game.
