Buloke Withdraws From Development Organization

At its ordinary meeting on Wednesday, June 18, Buloke Shire Council confirmed that it will withdraw its membership from the Wimmera Southern Mallee Development (WSMD).

Wimmera Southern Mallee Development Limited is a regional development organisation that aims to support economic growth and advocate for shared priorities across participating councils in north-western Victoria.

Buloke had joined WSMD on August 9, 2023, under a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), but councillors voted unanimously to withdraw after determining the Shire had yet to receive any funding or demonstrated benefit – particularly in relation to

WSMD's focus on addressing housing shortages across the region.

The financial contribution for WSMD membership for the 2025/2026 year is \$62,844, which has been allocated in the Council's newly adopted budget.

"The donation towards it (WSMD) could be very well spent in other places in the tight financial position we (the Council) are," Cr Graeme Milne said at the meeting.

Chief Executive Officer Wayne O'Toole will now provide WSMD with the required 12 months' notice of Council's intention to withdraw, as per the MOU.

Council also raised concerns about WSMD's public stance on renewables and transmission infrastructure, which did not reflect Buloke's neutral position.

"The open letter issued by the WSMD CEO in December 2024 relating to transmission lines, wind energy parks and mining was not reflective of Council's views," the report noted.

"This letter was developed without consultation and created significant concern throughout the Buloke community."

"It is felt that Council's feedback to WSMD on these matters has not been adequately responded to, therefore highlighting the inability of WSMD to accurately represent and advocate for Buloke Shire Council."



"No Show" From Transmission Company: Farmers Rally at Wycheaproof

Around 200 farmers rallied at Wycheaproof on Friday, June 20, outside the Buleke Shire Offices ready to greet TCV staff when they arrived to meet with Councillors from Buleke, Gannawarra and Loddon Shires.

Transmission Company Victoria (TCV) had requested Shire Councillors from Buleke, Gannawarra and Loddon Shires attend the meeting that was to precede a "big announcement".

Cr Alan Getley, Mayor of Buleke Shire read a statement to the crowd from the combined Councils which stated TCV had requested the meeting, the Councillors were unaware of what the meeting was about, nor did they know what the "big announcement" was to be.

Shortly before the meeting, TCV notified Cr Getley that they had concerns for their safety after receiving advice from Vic. Police and would no longer be attending, but would instead hold a closed "zoom" meeting with the Councillors. Surprisingly, the eight Victoria Police officers in attendance were unaware of the advice to TCV causing them to cancel the visit.

Cr Garner Smith, Mayor of Gannawarra Shire made a 3

hour round trip, only to be told that TCV was not attending due to the gathered local farmers and landowners protesting the VNI West transmission lines project.

James Burke (Dooboo-betic) and Ben Duxson (Wal-laloo), spoke about the impact the VNI West project would have on their farm land. Andrew Weidemann (Rupanyup), impacted by turbines and mining, spoke about farmers being under attack from the Victorian State Government through mining, turbines, transmission lines and the emergency services levy. Barry Batters (St. Arnaud), impacted by VNI West stated he had attended the TCV Community Reference Group meetings where he had raised many concerns with TCV only to have them completely ignored, many questions still unanswered.

Ross Johns (Warracknabeal), Chairman of the Wimmera Mallee Environmental and Agricultural Protection group who is impacted by

turbines, talked about food security. Victorian farmers hold 1.5% of agricultural land in Australia but produce 25% of the country's total food production, this makes up 14% of Australian Export revenue. With a global population of 8.2 billion people and the fact that Australia produces enough food to feed itself 3 times over, we are an important cog in the global food supply chain. The current Governments are intent on taking over productive farm land which produces wheat, canola, barley, fruits, nuts, vegetables, meat, fibre (cotton and wool) and milk to replace it with power production.

Speaking after the meeting Councillors Getley and Smith, joined by Cr Graeme Milne, told the crowd that the meeting had been a waste of time and they had been asked by TCV to persuade farmers and land owners that land access for the transmission lines would be in their best interests. The Councillors assured

farmers that their Shires' stance had not changed and they do not support VNI West in its current form.

The VNI West (Victoria New South Wales Interconnector) 500kv transmission line is required to link the wind turbine projects in the area to the power grid. Part of the \$600 Billion Rewiring the Nation project, this line is to transmit solar and wind generated electricity to the cities

of Melbourne and Sydney. According to Electrical Experts the line is unnecessary as there are already transmission lines in place that can be upgraded and utilised at a far cheaper cost. Despite claims made by TCV, there is no real benefit to our regional communities as specialised workers will be brought in for construction.

Landowners on the current VNI West corridor are angry

that their concerns are not being addressed and as a result, gates to their properties will be locked with access denied to TCV, Vicgrid and their contractors.

The State Government is trying to over ride their property rights with new legislation coming up in Parliament in July. Agriculture and Food are being sacrificed for power to the cities.

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
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

How Much CFA Funding?

The Victorian Government has once again refused to disclose how much funding the CFA will receive in the 2025-26 State Budget, confirming fears the budget is being cut again.

Today in Question Time, Minister for Emergency Services, Vicki Ward, dodged a straightforward question: what is the CFA's base budget for 2025–26 – a figure the Minister previously claimed would be outlined in the State Budget, but wasn't.

Instead of providing an answer, the Minister rambled and refused to give a figure.

Leader of The Nationals and Shadow Minister for Emergency Services, Danny O'Brien, said regional Victorians have every right to feel deeply concerned following Labor's CFA budget cuts, which the government has tried to sweep under the rug.

"It's outrageous. The Government Gazette released on May 30 shows a clear cut to CFA funding compared to previous years, but the State Government keeps denying the facts," Mr O'Brien said.

"The Minister won't confirm the figure, the Treasurer and Premier say it's wrong,

yet they can't answer Victorians a simple question – how much money will the CFA receive next financial year?

"The State Government's refusal to answer confirms what we already know: despite Victorians being slugged an extra \$3 billion in tax in the name of our emergency services, their budgets are actually being cut.

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As Fallen Livestock Concerns Grow...

Government Urged for Support

The Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) is urging the Victorian Government to step up and deliver immediate support to drought-affected livestock producers by introducing a targeted rebate scheme for fallen stock collection costs.

The VFF has made the request as it continues to work to ensure a long-term, sustainable solution for animal disposal across the state.

The call comes as a new user-pays trial for fallen stock services begins across western Victoria from June 2025, following sustained VFF advocacy to keep the service running in the face of mounting financial pressures.

Fee Structure

The trial will implement the following fee structure:

- \$50 per head paid to farmers for standing, live cows.

- \$200 per pickup paid by farmers for deceased stock.

(Pricing may vary depending on livestock size, volume, or circumstances. Discounts may be available.)

VFF Livestock president Scott Young said the VFF has actively worked with service provider Loc Rivett and Agriculture Victoria to prevent a complete collapse of the system, but now warns the government must intervene.

"We absolutely need this service and we've helped keep it operating. Clearly the provider has decided to introduce a service fee and we're calling on the government to step in and help cover the costs in this time of drought," said Mr Young.

Rebate Scheme

"We are calling for a rebate scheme to offset collection costs for producers in declared drought-affected areas. Anything less is a failure to support animal welfare and on-farm biosecurity during crisis conditions."

"It's a complex issue and we've been working with the provider, government and farmers behind the scenes for months to ensure there is a service for farmers to access. This vital service remains at an added cost and we think the government needs to step in and cover these added fees."

Risks

The VFF has consistently flagged the risks of inadequate fallen stock infrastructure,

including animal welfare breaches, biosecurity exposure, and environmental harm. The VFF is working closely with stakeholders to design a fit-for-purpose system, but insists producers must not be left carrying the financial burden alone.

UDV president, Bernie Free, said the trial is a step in the right direction, but it's missing the financial element to ensure drought-stricken farmers aren't made to absorb extra costs.

"We've worked hard to ensure producers still have access to a collection service, but affordability in times of drought remains a major concern and we can't lose focus of that," he said.

"We're asking the Government to commit funding for a rebate model that recognises the regional impact of drought and helps keep farmers compliant without punishing them financially," Mr Free said.

"Really?" my son asked. "Yes" the man replied.



Farmers Welcome New Water Projects

The Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) has welcomed the announcement by the Victorian and Federal Governments of new funding for water infrastructure and environmental projects in northern Victoria.

The Commonwealth Government will provide \$132 million for the Broken Reconfiguration Project, \$1.38 million for three new feasibility studies, and a further \$1.935 million for a detailed assessment of the Restoring Flows to the Mallee Floodplain initiative that aims at improving environmental outcomes by maximising the use of existing environmental water.

Long History

VFF Water Council chairman, Andrew Leahy, said the VFF has a long history of working with communities along the Broken system and is pleased this project, highlighted in the Victorian Government's Planning Our Basin Future Together prospectus, can progress.

"VFF members have worked tirelessly for many years to improve water reliability

bility on the Broken system, as well as to secure improved stock and domestic supply.

"A special thanks must go to former VFF Water Council Chairman and local irrigator Richard Anderson, who worked for years to help get this across the line," Mr Leahy said.

"This project is a direct result of years of grassroots advocacy and it's fantastic to see that hard work finally being recognised and realised,"

Feasibility Studies

The VFF also welcomed the new feasibility studies, which will enable further assessment of water projects identified in last year's Victorian water prospectus.

The VFF has long been critical of the Commonwealth's focus on arbitrary water recovery targets, often at the expense of genuine environmental benefit. The VFF is therefore pleased to see the Mallee Floodplain project assessing environmental outcomes.

"There's more to improving the environment than simply adding water. We need to look at the full picture, such as water quality, riverbank condition, ecosystem health, and native species recovery. Assessing overall environmental outcomes is an important first step."

"It's essential that farmers and local communities are consulted and actively involved in the planning and

implementation of these projects. The VFF will continue to work to ensure that farmers have a strong voice at the table as these projects progress.

"The VFF has written to the Commonwealth Water Minister, Murray Watt inviting him to the region and we look forward to the opportunity to discuss our local issues face to face", Mr Leahy added.

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Charlton 100 Years Ago

June 20 to 24, 1925.

Stamina: Rather a remarkable performance was Reg Curnow's win in the Harriers' Mile handicap on Saturday. He was playing for the football team against Narraport; and at first was disinclined to take the track for the race. But to help out the field he consented. As soon as the midway bell sounded, he took off his football boots, got into running pumps, and walked straight over to look for his mark. He won the race, got out of his running pumps into his football boots again, and played the second half of the football match. He certainly showed some stamina, and represents the sort of material for which Charlton Harriers are looking.

Buckrabanyule: The separation of the Woosang Juniors from their seniors on certain match days has been unfortunate but unavoidable. It has now been rendered unnecessary by the provision of a ground for the young Maroons at the rear of the Gladstone Hotel. Mr Watt, of that hostelry, consulted Mr James Hindson on behalf of Woosang Juniors, and Mr Hindson not only granted the ground without hesitation, but with Mr Hubert James carried out its preparation. They even went to the extent of neglecting their own work to get the ground ready in time for last Saturday's match. During the present week, they have put further labour on it, the aim being to make it a really good pitch. Mr Watt donated two guineas to the Woosang Juniors.

Inter-School Sport: The Higher Elementary School Basket-ball Second Team, accompanied by the Sports Mistress (Miss L. Soding) visited Wycheeproof to meet the local school. As it was Wycheeproof's first match, they were naturally handicapped by lack of experience. Charlton team was: Alice Chandler and Nellie Paterson, defenders; Mollie Grady, defending rover; Edith Paterson, centre; Rita Clark, attacking rover; Edna Arundell and Jean Clark, goal throwers. Charlton won by 16 goals to 4. Edith Paterson played a very big part in the win. Each member of the winning team was well worthy of her place.

Accident: The railway crossing at Dwyer's corner was the scene of an accident which happily was not attended by serious injury to any person. A car with six occupants was returning from the Teddywaddy Rovers-Woosang Juniors match, and just in front of it at the spot referred to was proceeding another car. The one in front exhibited signs of slowing down, the taillight automati-

cally showing. The car at the rear was unable to pull up in the distance, and in order to avoid the one in front the driver turned it to the side, crashing into and carrying away two 10 x 10 red gum posts. The only injury sustained was to Frank Gould, who received abrasions to the face. The front of the car was rather badly damaged. Gould was not at the wheel.

Parking Fee: The charge of 6d for each motor car entering the Football Reserve on match afternoons has not proved altogether popular. It was contended that, while the actual sum was a trifle, the principle was not sound. If there had been a grand stand on the ground, it was argued, the club would have had a better standing; but motor cars were practically portable grandstands, affording shelter for onlookers on wet days. Although no meeting has been held since the annual gathering, the club decided, rather than lose prospective members over the charge, to abrogate it in the case of members.

Call for Drought Relief

The Nationals Member for Mildura, Jade Benham, has called on the Minister for Agriculture to urgently deliver drought relief for farmers across the Mallee, warning that families and communities are facing one of the most challenging seasons in recent memory.

Speaking in Parliament this week, Ms Benham described a "different kind of dry" spreading across the region, with rainfall well below average and subsoil moisture rapidly disappearing.

"Our farmers are resilient, they always have been, but the reality on the ground right now is grim," Ms Benham said. "Feed and water costs are skyrocketing, farmers are being forced to destock, and many are questioning how they will get through the next few months, let alone the full season."

Ms Benham said farming families in communities like

Ouyen, Manangatang, Walpeup, Underbool and Patchewollock are doing it particularly tough, with some now also contending with the return of wild dogs following the removal of the non-protection order.

"There's been a deafening silence from the government while farming families are being pushed to the brink," she said.

Ms Benham is calling for immediate support including emergency financial assistance for primary producers experiencing severe crop and stock losses, council rate relief and freight subsidies to offset

the rising cost of fodder and water. She is also urging for improved mental health outreach for isolated and struggling farmers, and a simplified process for accessing support, without the bureaucracy.

"These aren't just numbers on a spreadsheet. They are people, families, and communities that underpin our state's food and fibre production," she said.

"Our farmers are not asking for handouts. They are simply asking for a hand up until the seasons turn. We owe it to them to act now, and I urge the Minister to visit the Mallee and see first hand the

severe conditions farmers are dealing with, and to understand the immediate need for practical support."

Free Camping Program Ends

The Victorian Government has ditched its disastrous free camping in national parks initiative after the program backfired.

Labor spruiked that the program would ease cost-of-living pressures, but the brutal reality was the complete opposite.

The poorly-designed program financially cruelled regional small businesses and left families disappointed by a lack of camping spots.

Labor's free camping policy resulted in people deliberately booking multiple camping sites and then failing to show up, knowing there are no consequences.

It led to low occupancy rates in popular national park campgrounds that would normally be fully booked.

Campsites sat empty during regional Victoria's peak tourist season, leading to the phrase "ghost camping" being penned.

Solutions Dismissed

Practical solutions to fix the multiple problems put forward by the Liberals and Nationals were dismissed by the Allan Labor Government which backed in its flawed program.

Free camping in national parks was heavily criticised by small business, peak tourist bodies, campers, and regional communities.

Shadow Minister for Public Land Management, Melina Bath, said Labor's failed free camping in national parks program has quietly been scrapped and instead replaced with "half price" camping fees in the state budget.

Enormous Damage

"From inception, Labor's policy was systematically flawed and did enormous damage to small businesses and the regional economy that relies on the peak tourism season for survival.

"The State Government said free camping in national parks would create more Victorians holidaying in the regions, it did the opposite.

"In a cost-of-living crisis, the program hurt regional sales and services and charged Victorian taxpayers \$9 million to deliver it.

"Free camping in national parks should have been abolished when the problems were first identified, yet the State Government refused to listen."

Be Prepared for the Cold and Flu Season Ahead

We all know how miserable and unpleasant it is to have a cold, or to suffer from the chills of influenza, which is why it is important to get in early and to build up the body's resistance to infection.

A whole-food diet that includes plenty of fresh fruit and vegetables and fresh herbs, including garlic, will help the body systems combat harmful bacteria and viruses.

Garlic is especially useful in building up the body's resistance, as it contains vitamins A, B and C, and copper, sulphur, manganese, iron and calcium. It is also considered to be a natural antibiotic if taken in large enough amounts.

The following garlic cold remedy is ideal for people who do not take garlic on a regular basis and begin to suffer from the symptoms of cold, or have a bad cold, the following garlic remedy may give relief. Put in a pre-warmed ceramic mug, two cloves of crushed garlic, half a teaspoon ground ginger, one tablespoon honey, the juice of one lemon and pinch of cayenne pepper. Add one cup of boiling water, cover and

allow to steep for 10 minutes. Strain, reheat and drink immediately.

A herbal tea made by combining equal parts peppermint, elder flower and yarrow will also help to alleviate the symptoms of cold, fever and influenza. Steep one teaspoon of the dried herb mixture in a cup of boiling water for 10 minutes, strain, reheat, sweeten with honey and drink as hot as possible 3 to 4 times daily.

Peppermint is rich in volatile oils, including menthol, which help to relieve head and chest congestion. Taken on its own, peppermint tea is very beneficial in reducing fever; its effect is increased when combined with yarrow flowers. Peppermint also helps to allay nausea and acts as a soothing sedative to induce relaxation and sleep.

Elder flowers are rich in the mineral salt potassium chloride - a vital salt for dealing with the second stage congestion of colds, flu and fevers. It has a relaxing, calming and blood purifying effect, and also helps to induce perspiration.

Yarrow is a tonic and stimulant, serving to reinforce the body's vitality and strength. It is useful in mild fevers, producing perspiration and opening the pores of the skin. Free perspiration encourages the elimination of toxins and waste products from the body. Poor elimination is one of the primary factors leading to the development of colds, fevers and flu. This herb also contains the mineral salt iron phosphate, which is especially effective in treating infectious colds and fevers that are aggravated by bacteria.



To accentuate the action of this herbal tea and speed up its beneficial effects, add a pinch of cayenne pepper, which is both stimulating and warming, and acts as a catalyst.

If you are already suffering from a mild cold, especially a shivery cold, a clove of garlic taken three times a day with meals will help to alleviate symptoms, and is even more effective when taken in conjunction with half a teaspoon of horseradish powder in some warm water. For feverish colds, put the juice of half a lemon into a cup of boiling water, add a peppermint tea bag and steep for five minutes, then sweeten with honey. Reheat if required and drink three to six times a day.

Diverse Farming Boosts Profits, Controls Weeds

(By Cindy Benjamin, WeedSmart)

Results from over a decade of farming systems research have illustrated that many factors need to be considered and implemented for a cropping enterprise to be profitable, manageable, and to minimise risk.

Tony Swan, a CSIRO farming systems researcher, says that decisions related to weed control vary depending on the crop rotation implemented. Multiple factors, including stubble management, nitrogen use, grain storage, and machinery cost, influence the profitability of the rotation.

"Field trials often focus on one or two critical factors, aiming to understand the effect between treatments," Tony says. "It is important when conducting trials at a small plot scale, that the researcher, agribusiness consultant and the grower are confident the results can be scaled up to commercial 'whole-farm' level."

With a large body of research findings on a wide range of weed management strategies, crop rotations, and stubble management options in the southern NSW region, the multidisciplinary team scaled up the results and tested them in real-world scenarios for farms with 3000, 5000 and 10,000 ha of crop.

"For example, when it comes to planting equipment, irrespective of opener type, we found no difference in the profitability or effect on weed numbers where more expensive herbicides were used," Tony said.

"Tyned openers were more effective when lower-cost herbicides, such as trifluralin, were used, mainly because fewer of these herbicides are on-label for a disc opener."

Growers who implement the WeedSmart Big 6 strategy, which includes both herbicide and non-herbicide tactics, should be able to achieve high profitability while keeping the weed seedbank low.

This year, Geraldton is hosting WeedSmart Week on July 29 and 30, showcasing how growers can develop a profitable farming system using the WeedSmart Big 6

framework to make sure that weeds are not calling the shots.

Good Stubble Management Control

Zero-till, stubble retention and fallow weed management have been widely adopted in Australian cropping systems – and for good reason. In combination, these farming system practices protect the soil from erosion, aid in moisture infiltration and storage, and reduce weed numbers in fallow.

However, it is important not to let heavy stubble compromise the timeliness of operations or hinder weed, disease or pest management. A stubble load of 2–3 t/ha (i.e. 70% ground cover) is enough to achieve erosion control and water infiltration outcomes.

If the stubble exceeds 3 t/ha, consider using any of these post-harvest management tactics to reduce the load: mulching, incorporation+nutrients, baling, grazing or late strategic burn (especially before a second wheat crop or before sowing canola). Including a legume in a diverse crop sequence will help manage stubble, improve nitrogen efficiency and assist in converting the cereal stubble into organic carbon.

Cereal stubble is a good source of carbon (C) but provides very little nitrogen (N) for subsequent crops. Therefore, when stubble is retained and incorporated, there can be significant N tie-up. To compensate, in a canola-wheat rotation, apply deep band N and add 5 kg N/t of cereal stubble at sowing. Alternatively, sow a pulse legume, such as faba bean, lentil, chickpea or vetch, into the wheat stubble, followed by a canola crop.

From a weed management perspective, be flexible and proactively manage stubble to suit your seeding system. Both tyned and disc systems

are equally effective for weed management and crop performance when stubble load is managed appropriately to allow for diversity in pre-emergent herbicide use.

Keeping Ryegrass Numbers Low

Initial testing of weeds for herbicide resistance is crucial to determine the most appropriate herbicide and the best management options available. A crop rotation that includes a double-break of two non-cereal crops, such as faba bean-canola or vetch-canola, was found to be the most effective tactic for reducing herbicide-resistant annual ryegrass numbers.

A "diverse-low-value" system (low-N, faba bean-canola-wheat) that includes a pulse crop in either a 3- or 4-year sequence matched or improved the profitability and reduced the financial volatility compared to the "baseline" systems (canola-cereal-cereal) at both the small plot and whole-farm scale.

Where there is an existing annual ryegrass weed issue, the "diverse mix" systems (low-N, vetch hay/BM-canola-wheat) where pulse crops can be brown manured or cut for hay may be more profitable than a "diverse" system with a pulse grain

crop, depending on how the resistant weed is managed. The combination of experimental and whole-farm data supports the agronomic value of including a pulse crop (e.g. faba bean, chickpea, lentil, vetch) in farming systems in southern NSW.

Other Management Systems

The profitability and sustainability of this system rely on the farming enterprise having adequate machinery and labour resources in place.

When scaling up to the "whole-farm" for a cropping operation that incorporated legume crops in the rotation, it was apparent that factors such as on-farm storage for pulse grain and adequate machinery and labour resources were critical to the profitability of the farm and the subsequent effectiveness of the weed-suppressive cropping program.

The economics easily stacked up for new grain storage facilities to enable better marketing of pulses such as lentils, chickpeas and faba beans. On the other hand, the rapid increase in machinery costs made it difficult to justify the investment in machinery for more timely operations. The recommendation is to carefully consider purchasing quality second-hand equipment.

Soil Action Plan Research Boost

Agriculture Victoria's soil research capabilities at its Horsham and Tatura SmartFarms have been boosted with a \$1.49 million investment from the Australian Government's National Soil Action Plan (NSAP).

Agriculture Victoria Research Scientist Dr Katherine Dunsford said the "Improving soil structure for resilient ecosystems" project will fund critical research into increasing drought resilience.

"In Australia soil is the basis for most agriculture, both food and fibre, and directly tied to our food security and economy," Dr Dunsford said.

"This project funding has helped us appoint a dedicated soil physicist Dr Anne Yusuf to our soil physics laboratory facility at the Tatura SmartFarm.

"Dr Yusuf will apply her soil science, hydrology and ecosystem knowledge to our project and make the most of the technology and facilities available at the soil physics lab and our SmartFarms.

"Poor soil structure limits rainfall capture and root access to water, shrinking the soil's water bucket.

"It can also lead to increased greenhouse gas emissions and reduced fertility, resulting in lower plant production and poor environmental outcomes.

"Soils can have naturally poor structure or as a result of management decisions, such as excessive tillage or trampling by cattle in wet conditions.

"Our research focuses on understanding how different soil amelioration strategies such as organic materials and gypsum can improve soil structure and soil function," she said.

Dr Dunsford said they are looking to expand understanding across a wider range of soil types and industries, particularly grains and dairy.

"The goal is to guide farmers to effective soil improvement strategies to maintain or boost productivity, enhance drought resilience, and increase environmental services in a changing climate.

NSAP is a 5-year plan under the 20-year National Soil Strategy. The funding aligns to priority actions which aim to improve Australia's soil health and long-term security.

Don't Sacrifice Perennial Pastures

(By Cindy Benjamin, WeedSmart)

Results from over a decade of farming systems research have illustrated that many factors need to be considered and implemented for a cropping enterprise to be profitable, manageable, and to minimise risk.

With good rain across most of Victoria, farmers may be looking to return stock to paddocks following months of containment feeding.

Agriculture Victoria Livestock and Land Management Extension Officer, Neil James, said returning stock too early may result in damage or death of deep-rooted perennials such as phalaris, cocksfoot and fescue.

"The loss of perennial pasture is primarily caused by over grazing, but when combined with extended dry periods, pasture decline can intensify.

"Perennial ryegrass, however, rarely survives prolonged dry periods, regardless of grazing pressure.

"Many pastures are already under stress due to the prolonged dry conditions. Late season rainfall will have triggered some green leaf growth.

"However, repeated grazing of these new shoots can deplete the plants' root reserves, ultimately leading to plant death.

"Ideally, livestock should be held in containment until pastures have grown sufficient leaf area to maximise photosynthesis and rebuild their root reserves.

"Resowing perennial pastures is extremely expensive, often exceeding \$200/ha, and producers planning to sow new pastures are encouraged to review how those species have performed in environments similar to their own.

"Where stock containment is not possible due to the onset of lambing, or excessively wet

conditions, farmers might consider containing stock in a paddock corner or using part of a laneway to form a small sacrifice paddock.

"Keeping the area small minimises paddock damage and reduces energy requirements of stock when compared with searching for feed over larger areas.

"Resowing perennial pastures is extremely expensive, often exceeding \$200/ha, and producers planning to sow new pastures are encouraged to review how those species have performed in environments similar to their own.

"The Pasture Trial Network developed and hosted by Meat

& Livestock Australia, compiles data from independent trial sites assessing a wide range of pasture varieties. It can be used to compare the performance (seasonal and total dry matter production) of tested varieties of legumes and grasses."

Most notable was jockey Will Gordon's four wins on the day; riding Star Canto for trainer Ciaron Maher in the second race, Plenty Of Grunt for Symon Wilde in the third, Itwasonlyakiss for Patrick and Michelle Payne in the sixth, and Naval Force for Andrew Payne in the seventh.

Something else to be celebrated in the seventh was apprentice jockey Ruby Lamont's first race ride, coming third in a close finish riding Cheeky Blinders for Daniel Williams. At twenty-one years old, Ruby was accompanied by Racing Victoria's apprentice jockey mentor, Darren Gauci, who, in his day, was one of Australia's top jockeys. The pair were found

watching the replay following the race and discussing Ruby's overall performance, to which Darren stated, "She did everything right; she could have won." Also celebrating Ruby's "nerves of steel" regardless of the place she rode, were her thrilled parents and extended family, all trackside on the day to show their support.

World-Wide Race Rides

International jockey Valentin Le Boeuf has the hit Australian racing circuit nearly 12 months ago, and had his first run at Donald on Saturday in the final race on Gusmao, having come from a ride at Casterton earlier in the day. Beginning in New South Wales, Valentin rode for Bjorn Baker and Ciaron Maher for roughly nine months before moving further south to Ballarat, where he has been riding for Victorian trainers in the past three months.

Remaining in Australia is his number one objective, and he hopes for some success on the track to ultimately gain sponsorship. In the meantime, in addition to Australian circuits, he has ridden

Racing Results

Five maiden races on the program kicked off with the Pacific Fuel Solutions short course over 1006 metres and the heavily supported Cool As Ice, trained by Maddie Raymond and Patrick Bell, ridden by Jake Duffy, took the win following a big run down the outside straight. In second place, Lots of Torque, ridden by Tom Madden for Simon Gebert. In third and fourth places came Te Awam Utu and Imacreedytwo respectively. There was roughly a half a length margin between each of the placegetters in this big finish, with a photo decider between third and fourth.

The Russ Studio Jewellers 1356 metre maiden was the first of Will Gordon's winning run, and it was a big run indeed. Star Canto came from the rear of the pack, breaking away to the outside and putting on an impressive burst of speed with 400 metres to go. More Give It had been steadily ridden by Brad Rawiller, sitting behind the lead

runner and looking to win, until overtaken at the last and defeated by a head and neck. A gap of nearly two lengths came before the next place getters with third taken by Supido's Littleone and fourth, Sungazer, with very little margin between them.

Will Gordon got his second win in the Donald Steel Metaland sponsored third, riding Plenty of Grunt in another big run to take a

comfortable win, over the 1356 metre distance. Two lengths behind in second place came the favourite Karasmatic, ridden by Brad Rawiller, with only a head margin between third placegetter, Two Cubed; Miss Maverick came two lengths behind in fourth.

The distance increased to 1628 metres for the Donald Megelec-sponsored fourth and Bruzani, ridden by Neil Farley, took the win by a close margin, in a first of a double for trainer Peter Chow. In second place, Tosen Impact, ridden by Mitchell Aitken followed half a length behind by one of the front runners, Judge Jenni, in third. A huge margin separated the top three from fourth placegetter, Russian Escape.

The Mackay's Family Jewellers fifth tested out the runners at the same distance and favourite punters had their moment of glory when favourite, High Tempo, ridden by Lachlan King for the Hayes racing stable, took the win coming from fifth place in the pack and to the delight of a local syndicate of owners present on the day for the event. Unleashed along the straight, High Tempo left second placegetter three lengths behind, the second-favourite Omamori, ridden by Ryan Hurdle. Third-favourite, Cliste, appropriately took third place (trifecta winners would be pleased) with a long shot Milady in fourth.

The sixth was the first handicap race of the day, sponsored by Donald Motor Lodge over the same distance as the last. Will Gordon gained his third win on Itwasonlyakiss, coming from sixth place to take the win along the straight, by a head on Late Harvest, ridden by Brad Rawiller in second place. Third and fourth places went to Moscow Red and favourite Morthan Efficient respectively.

The Goldacres Handicap was over 1356 metres and Will Gordon's fourth win for the day on Naval Force. This was a close finish at the post and a photo decider with the front runner, Lucinda Boyd's

Margins were close between all placegetters, with second place awarded to Villianesque, ridden by Lachlan King, Gusmao and his international jockey taking third, and Cavill Tycoon in fourth.




